SAVE COAL BY CUTTING TRAIN SERVICE THIRD

CHICAGO, Dec. 5.—Railroad officials in the middle west today are rearranging their schedules to meet the on-third reduction ordered in passenger train service in the central, southwestern, and northwestern divisions, effective Monday and which is expected to save about 13,000 tons of coal daily.

The midwest's 14,000,000 territories over which the curtailment has been ordered totals 18,162,000 square miles, it is expected to save about 13,000 tons of coal daily.

Railroad officials today predicted that the one-third reduction order would be applied to the entire country within the coming week. They estimated the nation's train mileage per month at 45,500,000, of which 14,250,000 miles, or more than enough to reach half way around the world, would be cut in case the curtailment order is applied throughout the country.

These officials denied a nationwide embargo on nonessential freight was contemplated. "There is an automatic embargo of freight in effect now," said M. J. Gormley, assistant director of the Northwestern region. "This automatic embargo is increasing in proportion every day.
