## WAR-THE PROHIBITION LAW UPHOLD BY SUPREME COURT Saturday, December 20 Is Last Day to Pay Taxes

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—The United States supreme court today held the war-time prohibition law constitutional. The supreme court reversed the decision of the district court of Kentucky permitting the removal of whiskey from bond for beverage purposes. The decision of the New York court declaring the law unconstitutional was affirmed.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—The Ohio Indians of Oage county, Ohio, won the case against the county commissioners of Oage county and prevented the sale of their lands for delinquent state and county taxes under a decision rendered today by the supreme court of the United States reversing decisions of the Ohio courts. The United States rejected the case that complaining the Indians. It was charged by the government that excessive taxes were levied for a period of ten years to force the Indians to sell their lands.

### Outrages on Ireland Are Duly Catalogued

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—The Irish national bureau in a statement issued today declared that between May 1, 1916, and September 30, 1919, there have been the following "outrages committed by the British government in Ireland": 55 murders, 2,076 deportations, 432 arrested, 100,000 injured civilians, 5,500 raids on private houses, 5,395 arrests, 1,938 sentences, 292 proclamations and suppressions, 6 suppressions of newspapers, and 524 court-martials.

PLAY AND CRIME

The records of 5000 delinquents in a large city were studied carefully. Three out of every four of those boys and girls showed that the investigator called a "direct connection between delinquency and habitual use of spare time." That is to say, they had no activities for wholesome play out of school or working hours, or the play impulse took unwholesome forms, and the end of it was delinquency and minor crime. Or rather, the end is not yet. There is a hope that the tide may be turned, but that is a difficult matter.

It is in time that the people of Twin Falls learned a few fundamental facts about children. They must have play, and in fact they will have play. The adult has no choice about the matter at all, this will be served. The adult has choice, however, of what kind of play the youngsters of our town will have. Shall it be baseball and hockey, and fishing and camping parties or community "sings" under friendly auspices, or shall it be window-breaking and garden digging and petty pilfering and cigaret-smoking and all the other things that lead to evil development?

Twin Falls has certain facilities for recreation. But has it what it needs? Does every boy and girl in it have a chance to work off his play-impulse in a way that leads to good health and good citizenship? Or is the only chance for fun a morbid one? Playgrounds cost money. Supervisors for them cost money. But cost far less than jails and juvies. And does the community really prefer the jail with its sullen inmates and the furtive gang of boys loafers forming its preparatory school, or the great big playground with its horde of happy, yelling, undangered youngsters?

SEA POWER

Less interest is taken now in the American merchant fleet than the days when the nation was bending every effort to build the ships and check the German success. Ships and tonnage have much of their power to change. Anyone who goes abroad, however, is in little danger of forgetting this big American achievement, comes to travelers with almost magical power in the sight of the American flag flouting in the breeze in every ocean lane and in every important harbor in the world. Before the war, an American ship was such a rarity in foreign waters as to cause comment. There is magic, too, in the mere figures. One-fourth of all the ships of all the nations now flies the Stars and Stripes. The United States is second to Great Britain, with over 13,000,000 tons to Britain's 18,600,000. Before the war Germany was ahead of us; now we nearly four times her tonnage. In two years we have built thirty 1100 ocean-going ships. During the war we have gained 7,800,000 tons, and the fleet is still growing.

It still continues to grow? There is a tendency at present to discount this great enterprise, to count all the ship-building as a mere incident of the war. There is danger of ignoring the practical benefits that were looked forward to no eagerly when the building program was undertaken. It would be a big mistake, of course, to let up now in the great building program. These transports and freighters may seem less valuable now, now soldiers to ferry and provision, and with so heavy a demand for foodstuffs and other commodities that exports are viewed as missivings. But that might fly, if preserved and added to come into full and final appreciation in more normal and quiet times.

RESULTS MUST FOLLOW THRIFT

Secretary Carter Glass told the school children of the country at the observance of Thrift day that the habit of saving "will lay the foundation for your personal happiness and usefulness, and ultimately a bigger and better America." It is counteracting power to the forces of anarchy, there can be better than that the great majority of the people have accumulated economy and thrift. The man with a tidy sum in the bank as the result of his personal efforts will not be the man kindly to another hand, let the profiteers make impossible the saving by them by Mr. Average Citizen, and nothing in the world can spread that howling mob of protestants against the economic practices adopted among them. The world needs not only thrift, but conditions which will make possible some tangible gain that thrift.

EDUCATION IN SCHOOL

A teacher of long experience recently remarked that the most ignorant children she had to deal with came from the two best extensive families in homes in which the mothers had to be away from home working, and from those in which the mothers were so busy with society that they had little time for their children. The point of this remark is that an essential part of the ordinary child's education must be done in the home, says Kansas City Star. With this part missing, the school is under a severe, often fatal handicap. Many families act on the assumption, although they may not express it, that the school alone is responsible for the children's education. They assume no responsibility in the home. They make no effort to see that the children have a chance to become interested in good books. They do not foster the educational possibilities of intelligent conversation at the dinner table.
