TRUSTS ENGLAND TO FREE EGYPT

State Department Assumes It Is Purpose of Britain to Carry Out King's Assurances

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—In a definite interpretation upon its qualified recognition of the war-time British Proclamation over Egypt, the state department made it clear today that it assumes Great Britain intends to carry out its pledge of Egyptian independence on terms by King George to the late Sultan of Egypt on December 20, 1914. This statement of policy is contained in a letter from the secretary of state to Senator Robert L. Owen of Oklahoma. Senator Owen recently requested the secretary of state to provide an explicit confirmation of America's qualified assent to the proclamaion.

It is assumed that it is the purpose of Great Britain to carry out the assurances given by King George of Egypt to the late Sultan of Egypt as published in London Times of December 21, 1914.

Secretary Lansing pointed out the significance of the British recognition of April, 1915, was to acknowledge, with the restoration set forth at that time, only such part of the British offer as was set forth in the notice of the British government transmitted to the department on December 18, 1914.

FIVE CRUISERS MORE DEMANDED

Runs Must Give Up Additional Spoils to Allies—Duty Excessiveness of Shipping

PARIS, Dec. 18.—Germany must give up five more cruisers to the allies under the terms of the protocol which is now in dispute, it was learned today.

Further delay in the negotiations for final ratification of the treaty was denied by the German government today. They denied the existence of 5000 tons of shipping at Danzig which had been listed by the allies. The government may send a commission to investigate.

U. S. ARSENAL SUFFERS HEAVY LOSS BY FIRE

One Dead and Seven Injured in Blaze Accompanied by Explosions

DOVER, N. J., Dec. 18.—Fire started by explosion of shells ignited the government's Picatinny, N. V. arsenal today, doing damage estimated at between \$750,000 and \$1,000,000. Oliver McCormick, of Madison, Mass., a member of the marines, was fatally wounded by the fire, and died later in the hospital. Seven others were injured.

Services were rendered to the scene from a nearby naval powder depot, and worked bravely against a veritable barrage of exploding projectiles which they deflected the fire fighters. Between fifteen and twenty shells were destroyed. It was stated this afternoon.

The most seriously injured in the hospital are: Private Edward H. Butler of Memphis, Tennessee; Private John M. Mitchell, Connecticut; and the head and body.

These related mainly to the submarine warfare and attacks on merchant ships.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—The railroad situation today is considerably tangled. Strong opposition to the Cummins bill for the sale of the railroads has developed in the senate and there is now doubt as to whether that measure can be passed before the Christmas holiday.

Many of the members of the senate are returning from the president before they will consent to a final vote on the bill. The president is putting a message on the railroad question, but there is no indication as to when it will be sent before the Christmas recess.

There is strong likelihood that the bill will be sent before the Christmas recess is deferred. While the president's attitude is being carefully guarded there is every indication that the railroads will not go back to private ownership on January 1 as had been reported.

Director General Hines of the railroad administration is constantly taking the position that the roads must be returned until there has been protective legislation passed. He has been in contact with representatives to the president on the situation and it is understood that he has advised that the president keep control of the roads until there is definite action of the passage of railroad legislation.

The fact bill which has passed the house and the senate bill are widely different measures and it will take many weeks in conference to iron out the differences. Even if the Cummins bill is passed before the Christmas holidays there is slight hope that a final bill could be sent to the president before February.

Trust Company in Boston Is Closed

BOSTON, Dec. 18.—The Old South Trust company, which numbers among its directors prominent Bostonians and city officials, was closed today by order of State Bank Commissioner Thorndyke.

It was stated that the bank was closed because it had failed to make collection on its loans, clearing house officials said depositors probably would be paid in full.

Urges Passage of Law Against Strike

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—Passage of anti-strike legislation by the Cummins-railroad bill was advocated in the senate today by Senator Underwood, Democrat of Alabama.

"It is a good thing to prevent a strike temporarily, but it is not a good thing to prevent it entirely," Senator Underwood asked.

"There is nothing in the bill to prevent a man quitting work to get a better position. There is no possibility of the government being unjust to the strikers. This is a citizens government in which employees of the railroads can't make a vote."

Communist Editor Is in Federal Dragnet

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Dec. 18.—Trained for the state law following the provisions of the Lever act, Kansas City, Kan. last night, James P. Cannon, 32, editor of the Workers World, a communist newspaper, published here, was arrested by federal officials when they started a round-up of alleged radicals last yesterday afternoon.

At least seven more arrests, are expected today. Cannon is said to be the active head of the communist party in Nebraska, Missouri and Kansas, is charged with engaging in a conspiracy to evade provisions of the Lever act, and Missouri striking coal miners to remain idle in defiance of federal Judge Anderson's Indianapolis order.

MANY FRIENDS WOULD PATCH UP FARM LOAN ACT

Congress Is Asked to Make Fundamental Changes in System of Rural Credits

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.—American rural credit system is up for general inspection and possibly a general re-organization, it is stated in a report from the House committee on agriculture. The committee is asked to pass upon the constitutionality of certain of its provisions and congress is asked to make fundamental changes in the system.

All this, despite the fact that it has been in existence and operation only a little more than two years. To be sure this rural credit system is rather a lumpy two-year-old for there are at this writing about \$25,000,000 in loans in various states under subject to the provisions of the federal farm loan act. Hundreds of thousands of farmers now get loans at lower rates than before, no matter what the market rate of interest is.

But, make no mistake, no one who has introduced a bill to amend the farm loan act is regarded as a proponent of the system. Each one adjusts his hand and proclaims himself to be an opponent. 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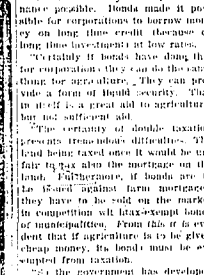

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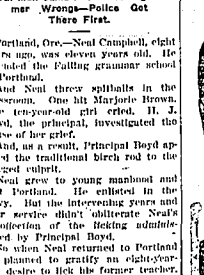
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FIND BONES OF 32-FOOT GIANT

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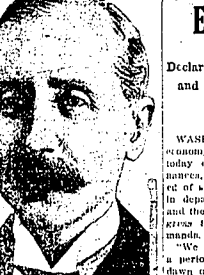

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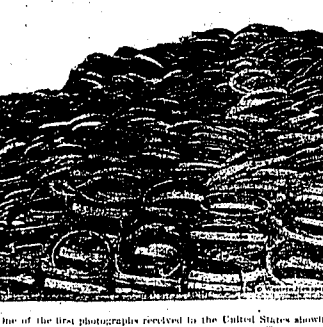
