Power to Make War Will Be Stripped From Italian King

MONTENEGRO IS FACING FAME Making Effort to Conserve Supplies Till Spring, When Better Conditions Hoped For

PODGORITZA, Montenegro, Dec. 20 (Delayed).—Montenegro faces the grave danger of a food famine before the winter is over. Every effort is being made to conserve the small supplies of cereals and meats within the country until February or March when it is hoped more stable conditions throughout the world will bring more crops of food up the Adriatic. The stacks which looked very satisfactory in September, were practically ruined by a long drought. A grain-hopper plague ravaged thousands of acres in the Black mountain country and left the peasants in despair. Very few supplies have found their way into the country since the signing of the armistice. For a time Montenegro was threatened with another typhus epidemic, but the American Red Cross mission, under Lieutenant Colonel H. R. Partridge of St. Paul, Minnesota, has kept the disease well away.

LONDON, Dec. 22.—A cabinet meeting was held this morning to consider the details of the new Irish plan which the British Government is to outline to the house of commons this afternoon. Sir Gordon Howart, the attorney general, and Ian MacDonnell, chief secretary for Ireland, were among those present. WASHINGTON, Dec. 22.—The party of Washington city New York speculators involved in the alleged "leak" in the supreme court decision cases today are in a state of panic, while secret service agents are putting the finishing touches in the chain of evidence connecting them with the affair. Confronted by witnesses who came to Washington from New York, some of those implicated have made a clean breast of their share in the deal, while Wall street on information which the principal in the case claimed he had from a minor stocker of the supreme court already under development, are now contending as a clean-up of the whole matter is merely a question of days.

CARRY FREIGHT TO ALASKA BY NEW AIR ROUTE

Canadian Arctic Traveler and Explorer Tells About Best Route in His Opinion

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22.—Attempts to carry freight to Alaska by the train and air route have been made by the training and operations group of the air service. It was announced recently three routes are now being considered.

J. W. Tyrell of Hamilton, Canada, a noted submarine explorer, made the following observations on the project.

"It is at least partly due to my repeated intimate knowledge of our north country that I am in a better position to make a judgment on this and the proposed enterprise would seem to me to be extremely unprofitable if not a dangerous undertaking.

"The many reasons the answer to a question of course appear to be the most suitable time for attempting an aerial trip to Alaska or and district in the Arctic, but from my personal knowledge of the country which does not extend beyond Dawson City, I believe it would be difficult during the summer season to obtain reliable landings in the north country.

"The most serious danger is the danger of storms and stormy weather that I would consider a successful air journey to the Arctic extremely hazardous if not altogether impossible.

"As to your route of travel, one month in the year which offers many favorable conditions to your project, and that is the month of April. By the first of April the storms of winter have passed and the north country enjoys a condition of continuous daylight, and by that time the weather has become somewhat better.

"By the first of April the snow covering the ice has either greatly melted or entirely disappeared, leaving a hard even surface of ice upon the lakes, ponds and rivers. The river, however, has a tendency to break up much earlier than the lakes, and less at soft meetings of the streams the ice is often treacherous and unsafe, even throughout the winter, and for these reasons the lakes would afford a safer route than the rivers, although with care they might also be made use of for such purposes.

"As to your route of travel, I presume one of the chief considerations would be the possibilities of obtaining your necessary supplies of high-grade gasoline. These supplies, of course, are of the most important factors requiring careful consideration as well.

THE TEST OF A MAN.
The test is to be in peace what it was in the time of war. You are fitted to it. The man who knew how knowledge could be converted into power was the man for whom there was no limit. So it is increasingly to be. To be useful is to be the test that society will put. Each man's rights are to be measured, not by what he has, but by what he does with what he has, says a writer in an exchange.

Chip Chilli from the map of South America and the continent would not look much deformed, yet that sliver of a country is as big to the United States as the United States is to the rest of the world. It is as big as all the other people put together, says New York Globe. Some \$200,000,000, or almost half the total American capital employed in South America, is invested in the republic. TINKERERS WITH TARIFF LAY OFF

Republicans Think There Is Small Likelihood of Many Changes During Present Session

Decision of the tariff laws during the present session of congress is not considered possible by the Republican leaders.
There are several bills before the senate finance committee providing for specific cases where adjustment is being considered," Senator Watson of Indiana said. Watson is in charge of tariff and other financial legislation in the senate. Senator Forrester, chairman of the Finance committee, has been forced to give up his senatorial duties for several months because of illness.

The businessmen of the country are opposed to any revision in the tariff. Legislation for such a purpose in the iron industry, passed by the house will according to the views of Senator Forrester, as made known to the committee here by the senator. He is in touch by phone with Senator Watson on financial matters. It is expected that his will in a great measure will be followed. The pending bill is known as the Longworth anti-dumping bill. It prevents Germany and other European countries from flooding the American market with goods which would ruin the industry here.

The wishes of the president, as expressed in his message to congress that the income tax rates with other taxes should be revised to make them more workable, is receiving careful attention.
The situation as regards the tariff may be summarized as follows: Foreign nations owe the United States large sums of money. Nations of Europe are in a position to pay. They find it hard to meet the obligation of interest.
The countries with which we were at war must pay their debts to the European enemies.

To do this they must have money. To have money they must export and sell their goods. To increase the tariff would be to curtail this export.
For a time until Europe, especially our allies, find their feet, "the business" demands that we permit their goods to enter without the high protective tariff. This will be followed in as far as American industry will not be injured.
The committee is considering the bills in territory made by our former allies. The American market with its resources is felt in Europe. The Republican congress will increase the tariff. It is not expected that the increase will take place in the immediate future.

ELINOR GLYN ON THE WILD SPIRIT OF AGE
LONDON, Dec. 22—"The wild spirit of breaking from control and convention in the music throwing off the shackles of the past in its dancing," states Mrs. Elinor Glyn in an article in the Ladies' Field, discussing the license and restraint of the century.
"There is no use in being shocked and agitated at it," she continues. "It will pass—nothing remains which is not of use in the general scheme of things. We are all so apt to take a panemal view, so to speak, of everything which is new to us, instead of trying to climb a stage higher before we judge and see the further peaks beyond."

"So now as I sat at dinner at the little table which one unctious woman coming in after another, quite, at ease and pleased with herself, it no longer shocks me, and I can even smile, whatever bit of news of them I see which is beautiful.

Cordwood as Fuel Is Compared With Coal

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23—In heating value, one pound of coal may be taken as the equivalent of two pounds of seasoned wood, says the bureau of standards, department of commerce. Allowing 50 solid feet of wood to an average cord and assuming the sticks to be well seasoned, a cord of hickory or other heavy wood is equivalent in heat value to one ton of coal. For lighter woods, a cord is equivalent to one ton of coal.

Equal weights of dry non-resinous woods give off practically the same amount of heat in burning; that is, a ton of dry cottonwood will give off as much heat on burning as a ton of white oak. Highly resinous woods like some of our pines and firs, have an appreciably greater heating value per ton, because a pound of resin gives off twice as much heat during combustion as a pound of wood.

When burning wood by the cord, it must be remembered that different species vary greatly in weight per cubic foot, so that a cord of soft maple has considerably less fuel value than a cord of hickory. A cord of seasoned wood contains more wood than a cord of green wood because of the shrinkage which takes place in seasoning.

The amount of moisture in firewood influences not only the vigor with which it burns but the amount of heat actually given off. Therefore, to obtain a standard cord of wood, the wettest fuel value, thoroughly dry wood of the heaviest kind, straight in growth, cut into short lengths and with the largest diameter, should be selected. As a rule, the soft woods burn more readily than the hard woods and the lighter woods burn more readily than the heavier ones.
