ASK CONFERENCE FOR NEXT WEEK

Railroad Administration Asked to Meet Shoppers While They Are in Washington

WASHINGTON, Dec. 27.—Director-General Hines of the railroad administration will be asked to hold his promised conference on the wage demands of the strikers either Tuesday or Wednesday of next week, while the out-of-town members of the executive board of the railway employees' department of the American Federation of Labor are in Washington.

The strikers executive board will meet Monday morning to attract the conference called by Samuel Gumpers to plan action on railroad legislation. The board, it was announced today, will meet some time Monday morning to discuss wage demands and other matters.

The strikers, as well as all other railroad craft, will press their demands before the railroads are returned to private ownership. It is the answer of the government is unsatisfactory, plan of action will be decided after the conference with Director Hines.

No threat of strike are being made, but it is admitted there is a danger of strike action on the part of all the railroad crafts to enforce wage demands after the railroads go out of government control.

The railroad "brotherhood" chiefs have notified representatives here that they will arrive in Washington in time to attend a meeting of all union railroad heads preliminary to the Gumpers conference, which has been set for 3 o'clock in the afternoon.

Wild-Weat Pistol Duel In New York

NEW YORK, Dec. 27.—In a thrilling pistol duel in the streets of lower New York today, a man, said to be a member of the "Hoops" band of holdup men, was shot and fatally killed by Policeman J. E. Wimmer. The man, who was identified as La Hood, had attempted to hold up a restaurant at 95 Washington street.

The policeman saw La Hood run out of the restaurant with an automatic pistol in his hand. Wimmer gave chase drawing his own pistol as he ran. La Hood turned and opened fire and the running fight continued through Washington and Greenwich streets to Tector, where La Hood stopped to get better aim. As he stood with his pistol pointed at the policeman, the latter fired a bullet into his breast. La Hood died on his way to the hospital.

Prison Reformer Is Sued for \$25,000

PORTSMOUTH, N. H., Dec. 27.—Lieutenant Commander Thomas Osborne, prison reformer and commandant of the United States navy prison here, was today named as defendant in a suit for \$25,000 damages by Julian Mullane of Portsmouth who charges Commander Osborne with seduction of her husband's affection. She declares in papers in her suit filed today that after she had been only two days married to Chief Yeoman William J. Duffy, who is said to be a close friend of Commander Osborne, the latter influenced Duffy to leave her. Duffy later married Miss Mullane and she claims Duffy and his second wife were living together as man and wife when both were arrested, and they are now under bail.

SELLS WHISKY BY CARLOAD

Chicago Department Store Does Large Business on Doctors' Prescriptions

CHICAGO, Dec. 27.—Embodied in a report on the liquor situation in Chicago which "George C. Dunlap, chief field deputy of the internal revenue agent's office, forwarded to Washington today, is a complaint that the twenty-first century, in this city, has department stores in this city, which are selling between two and three carloads of whisky a day at 45 cents an "doctor's prescription."

Attached to the report is a recommendation that the stores' permit to sell liquor on doctors' prescriptions be revoked immediately.

At the same time United States District Attorney Clegg sent for officials of the company operating the store to call at his office with all records of whisky sold by their firm.

Revenue agents who for the past month have been active in running down whisky runners in this district (it is known today that great quantities of liquor are being smuggled into Chicago daily from St. Louis).

According to these agents, whisky has been smuggled in on drainage canal barges. Several arrests in connection with this traffic are expected this today.
