CHICAGO, Dec. 28.—The protesters who won't listen to reason may feel a rolling pin hammering from the east. Two Illinois women asserted tonight, The 7,000 are setting out to bring down prices—not by tears, arguments or boycotts, but by punishment.

REVOLUTIONS.

The term revolution in its proper sense implies no real change in politics or social conditions and not merely domestic violence, as so many appear to think. About the only certain thing in the world is that all things are constantly changing. When social change comes, whether with or without force, we call it revolution or "overthrowing." Also in looking back on a period in which a marked change has come slowly, like the change from feudalism to industrialism, historians speak of it as revolution.

Again the press writers almost always try to give the impression that revolution is something sinister from the bottom by wicked working-class "agitators." Wherein history shows two examples of revolution by the upper classes to one like the French revolution, originating with the common people. The Roman republic is overthrown by upper-class politicians and subjugated by Julius Caesar. Napoleon I. sets aside the political effect of the French revolution. Napoleon III. overthrows the French republic. Pan-German imperialists capture control of Germany. English imperialists subjugate England's democratic ideas and subjugate vast territories, such as India, and overthrow republics like the Transvaal and the Orange Free State. In fact, the way all the old nations of Europe caught the virus of democracy and died out is proof of how autocrats have succeeded in revolution either by force suddenly or by the constant growth of concentrated wealth.

And no careful observer can doubt that the United States has been in the throes of a real revolution since the Civil war. He has seen little corporations become big and big corporations become trusts and the trusts gradually acquire practically complete domination of government and the press. He knows what the failure to tax war profits properly and the failure to curb war profiteering implies as to our actual condition. He has seen consummated what Abraham Lincoln saw as the grave danger to the future of the republic.

Will the common people be able to undo this successful revolution of plutocracy?

REDUCED CROPS—ANSWER TO RAIDS.

Government figures show that the farmers in the winter wheat areas have reduced their wheat average by 12,000,000 acres. Present average is about 3,000,000 less than that of 1915. We have here the silent answer of the neglected producer to unfavorable conditions. This answer also meets the stories about great farm prosperity of fictitiousity.

If the farmers had done well with winter wheat last year and had the means now they would plant a larger rather than a smaller acreage. But there is no way by which the farmer can continue putting more into the ground than he takes out. The rice average is smaller by 1,700,000 acres. In fact, we shall find reductions in all lines of farm products in which price-fixing or "cost-of-living" raids have resulted in unfair returns. The consumers must pay for the smaller production with higher prices next year.

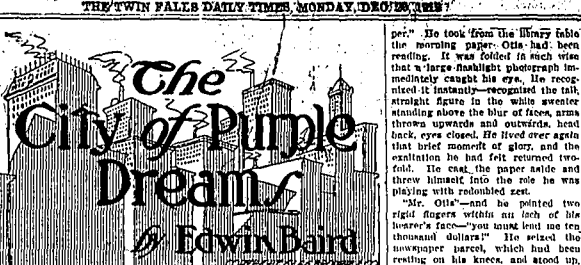
Allowing 10 bushels to the acre, we shall be short 120,000,000 bushels of winter wheat next year.

GOOD FLOUR FOR LESS, BUT BEWARE OF SUBSTITUTES.

Our government grain corporation asks public support for a method that really reduces the margin between producer and consumer. Few will question that our marketing costs have mounted, because we have gotten away from bulk goods and have been "educated" to special brands and expensive packages.

The grain corporation offers what it says is a good flour much cheaper than the producers of "brands" can sell it for; that is, it will retail for about 75 cents per bushel of a barrel, as opposed to the 85 cents or more asked by the dealers with fancy labels and big profits. This government flour, purchased on detailed specifications from the millers, is marked "United States Grain Corporation Standard Pure Wheat Flour."

The milling combine may be able to put a crimp into this flour-marketing reform. Time will tell. But it is certainly in the right direction. If the government would guarantee the quality of the bulk goods in the important lines and if the people could learn their "education" on brands, marketing costs could be considerably reduced.


