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SALTON SEA'S RAPIDLY RECEDING

Waters are Retreating at Rate of About a Mile Yearly.

SETTLERS GRAB THE LAND

Opens Up Largest Area of Date Producing Land in the Country—Big Vin Canery Planned by Arizona Capitalists.

Los Angeles, Cal.—The Salton sea, in the Imperial valley, one of the natural wonders of the West, is constantly shrinking. At present it is about 100 miles long and nine miles wide at the greatest point. During the last five years the water in Salton sea has receded about a mile a year leaving a salt-encrusted arid plain, which is eagerly seized by homesteaders, when their location stakes are placed for out in the water.

The sea, which lies 120 feet below the level of the ocean, although it must not carry, which land and Arizona capitalists are planning to utilize by the creation of a great canary.

The United States department of agriculture reports that about the Salton sea lies the largest area of date-producing land in the country.

It is estimated that about 100,000 acres of this land are now being cultivated. As it once was known, in prehistoric times has changed from desert to sea and from sea to desert 20 times or more.

UNITED STATES STILL AT WAR

Trade Relations Have Been Renewed, but Armistice Terms Are Still Binding

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10.—The United States is still at war with Germany, although trade relations have been renewed, and the armistice terms are still binding, according to a statement issued here today by the State department.

The announcement was made in reply to a question as to what the status of the country's relations are as a result of the formal exchange of ratifications of the armistice between Germany and the allies of Paris today.

The negotiation to Germany was transmitted a few days ago to Baron Hans Luther, head of the German peace delegation at Paris, by American Ambassador Hugh Wallace. The purpose was clearly to define the position of this government as the result of the armistice failure to ratify the peace treaty.

The State department was notified Thursday that Paris tonight of the exchange of ratifications of the armistice.

At this moment the status of peace was restored between Germany and those of the allied and associated powers which ratified the peace, the first part of an announcement said.

While the state of war existing between the United States and Germany is unchanged and trade relations have been renewed, no diplomatic and consular officers will be appointed until there is actual peace.

BECOMES ISLAND SEA

For centuries the Colorado river would flow gradually into the Gulf of California until it built up a sandbar across its mouth. NAVY OFFERS CASH FOR IDEAS

Useful Ones Submitted by Civilians Will Be Rewarded by the Department.

Washington.—The navy will pay a cash reward on the ideas of civilians submitted by civilian employees or persons in civil life.

Regulations to carry out the act of Congress authorizing such payments have been based on the methods adopted by industrial establishments. The naval invention office will require forms on request for the submission of suggestions.

The act states that "reward is to be paid where, due to a suggestion or a series of suggestions, there results an improvement or economy in manufacturing processes, plant or naval installation."

Of this vast amount something like \$1,500,000, or \$1,700,000 worth has been recovered, leaving the burglars with a profit of \$1,200,000.

LEGION CHARGES POWER COMPANY WITH GRAFTING

Pans Wealthy California-Oregon Corporation for Alleged Corruption

PORTLAND, Jan. 10.—First floor in what promises to be a bitter war of money and muscle was drawn here today for the closing session of the Oregon Irrigation Congress convention here this evening by returned soldiers, when they secured a recommendation against leasing Upper Klamath Lake, Oregon, marsh lands to a subsidiary of the wealthy California-Oregon Power company.

Represented by the American Legion and supported by a majority of the congress delegates, friends of Congressman N. J. Slonick's house bill No. 11381 hurled defiance at the power company's wealth and laid out the charges of corrupted, political, widespread and general government scandal at the feet of the company and its subsidiaries.

The cork popped out of the bottle when W. T. Mason, director of the Klamath Falls Record, presented an amendment to the resolution submitted by the Klamath Falls American Legion. The amendment asked the restoration to entry of marsh lands "in so far as it will not interfere with reclamation" administered by private interests.

SCOPE OF FOOD LAW

Misunderstanding as to Application of Act. Does Not Affect Foods or Drugs Consumed in State Where Manufactured.

Washington.—The Federal Food and Drug act does not apply, as many people suppose, to foods and drugs which are manufactured and consumed in one state and not thereafter shipped out of that state, that is, that are consumed within the state where produced. Such foods and drugs are subject to state laws.

The provisions of the Federal Food and Drug act do apply to foods and drugs which are shipped or delivered for shipment from any state or territory or the District of Columbia to any other state or territory or the District of Columbia; (2) are shipped or delivered for shipment from any state or territory or the District of Columbia to any foreign country; (3) are being imported into the United States; or (4) are manufactured in one state and transported to another state or territory or the District of Columbia or any territory of the United States.

The words "food" and "drug" as they are used in the Federal food and drug act have a somewhat different meaning from the popular understanding of those words. Under the act, the word "food" includes all articles which are intended for use as food, whether simple, mixed or compound. The term "drug" includes all articles which are prepared or compounded in the United States pharmaceutical or national pharmacy for use in the diagnosis, cure, mitigation, prevention or preparation of disease of either man or the animals.

UNITED STATES WAR RECORD IS MARVEL OF AGE

Democratic Administration Put More Than Million Overseas With No Ships Lost. Washington, Jan. 12.—An appreciation of America's greatness is beginning to make itself felt here as details of American program and its accomplishment come to light through reports being furnished to congress. With the perspective that is now possible looking back on the days of little more than a year ago men are beginning to understand the vast task that was set out for the government to accomplish and the practical efficiency with which the country has met every essential demand.

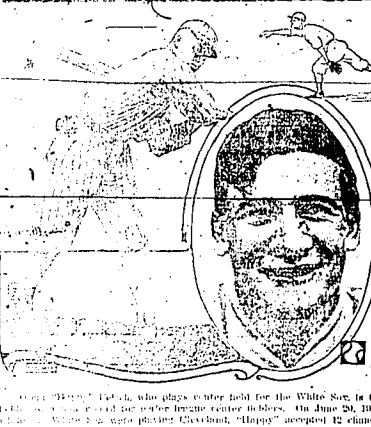

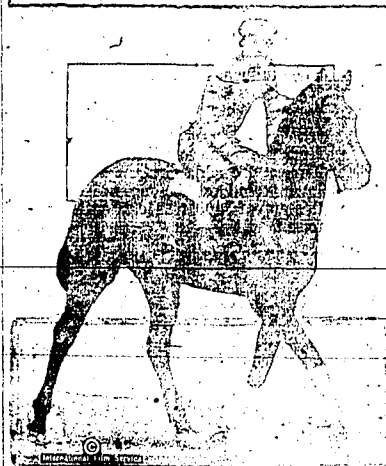

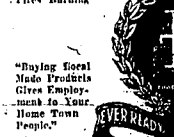
