PUBLIC AND STEEL STRIKE.

Officially calling off the steel strike, the strike leaders say they have been compelled to take this step because the steel corporation had the active assistance of the press, the courts, federal troops, state police and many public officials, and that this combination had denied steel workers their rights of free speech, free assemblage and the right to organize.

It is a specious statement, ingeniously designed to hide the leaders' own responsibility for failure. There is just enough truth in it to make unthinking and prejudiced strikers, perhaps, take it all to try. It will hardly deceive any logical and unprejudiced mind.

There was in some places, an unjust limitation of assemblage and no speech so far as the steel strikers are concerned. There was not much of that, however, and it had little to do with killing the strike. The big majority of strikers had as much freedom as strikers usually have, and as much as they could have asked. In some industrial centers, as in Cleveland, they even had the active cooperation of the authorities, who protected them and barred strike-breakers from the city.

What this statement really amounts to is a complaint that the public as a whole, was against the strike. That is very true; and, better than white against it, the strike leaders should learn a lesson from it.

Why was the public opposed to this strike more unanimously, perhaps, than it had ever been against any other labor effort? Because the strike was wrong. Press and public alike were in favor of labor organization and collective bargaining; but they will not sanction seeking them at a time like this, by deliberate limitation or stoppage of production instead of peaceful propaganda and negotiation.

The coal men have had a very similar experience, for similar reasons. Any other body of workers that similarly defies public sentiment will suffer likewise, and hurt the cause of unionism instead of helping it. On the public mind, if the union men show a proper appreciation of the other mood and the economic situation, they will find all these forces, which seem so hostile, operating in their favor.

THE FRIENDLY ROOF

The housing problem in Berlin, reads a news dispatch, has reached such a point that the ministry of public works has decided to utilize 150 sleeping cars standing idle in railroad yards. About 3,000 beds might well be provided by this plan.

Occasional stories of the use of cars for housing are heard in this country, but their commission on any scale here would be impossible here because the car shortage is just about as acute as the house shortage.

Akron, Ohio, where so many of the rubber plants are located, reports that housing for 25,000 people is needed. Ten thousand workers could be taken on at once in the factories and workshops there, but there is no place for them or their families to lay their heads.

These are only two little stories of the kind. Not a day but brings forth the same situation from some other community. The whole world is short of houses—except perhaps in those far and friendly lands where a tent or a palm tree does the business. And here those places doubtless tent-textiles are short and palm trees grow up and need reforestation.

How does one plant a tent or palm tree? And who rears a roof in these tent-textiles, prosperity, oft-times life itself.

MUNICIPAL ZONING

When the principle of municipal zoning was first proposed in New York it was fought on the ground that it would deprive people of their constitutional liberties. But the plan is now being combated by many cities, large and small, over the country.

Now that people are getting used to the idea, the principle of zoning aside certain localities for residence purposes, others for small business, others for wholesale business and still others for plants and factories seems the most elementary common sense remedy for the evil over a good residence district would remain, nor was there any certainty of permanence in any sort of building.

The New York ordinance, after a year and a half, says the New York Tribune, "is regarded as the best measure for real estate improvement ever enacted in many years. It has established sectional zoning."

ORA C. MORNINGSTAR is the most scientific of the professional players today. Other professionals have been heard to say that they would rather take his opinion as to the theoretical correct manner of playing a shot than that of any one else. He is versatile and not expectably better in one department of the game than in another. Possibly he may be a little too technical in his play and try to play too perfect, life just dropping on the red ball and trying for extreme angles. He is capable when in a match and conditions are just right of playing the most scientifically correct billiard of anyone. In a match in Detroit with Walter Cochrane last year Morningstar, playing 282, ran 102 in the upper left-hand corner. At 100 there during the run was his last shot and he made it with a ball on the rail of the right-hand side rail. All the work was done by the cue ball at the head of the table. Cochrane

said it was the most scientifically correct and perfect billiards he had ever seen.

Morningstar uses a 22-ounce cue 55 inches long. He uses quite a few strokes, depending more on the forearm rather than the wrist for action. His stroke is smooth and rhythmic, a sort of fluid stroke, and is delightful to watch. If Morningstar had not elected to take up billiards as a profession he would probably have become even more famous as an artist, as he has painted several pictures that have received special commendation from competent critics. He has held both the 283 and the 282 championships.
