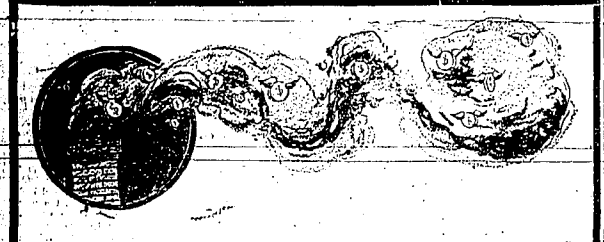

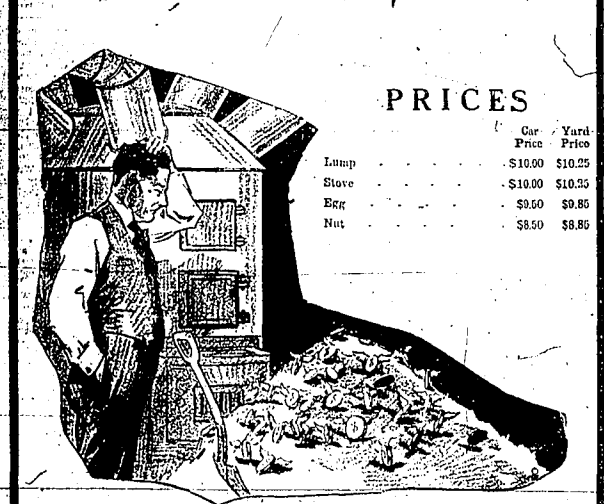

COMPANY GOOD THINGS.

For a company luncheon prepared with the best of ingredients, Mash with butter a little cream and seasoning. Put a tablespoon of the mash in the shell. Add some of the potato, brush the top with egg and set into the oven to brown.

Another attractive cheese salad may be prepared as follows: Cut one of the little refrigerator lemons in two and serve cold. Rub the inside with olive oil, fill the bowl with cream cheese, mix with cream to make it of the right consistency. Fill with chopped, salted celery salted with a little mayonnaise. Carefully turn out on a lettuce bed.

Grape Caviar Cream—Steam one pint of a package of granulated gelatin in cold water to cover. Strain over hot water, then add one pint of grape juice sweetened to taste. Place in ice water and mix with one pint of mayonnaise. Stir into it one and one-half cups of cream whipped. Decorate the sides and bottom of a mold with split almonds, dipping each into a little of the dissolved gelatin. Carefully turn in the mixture and set away on ice to harden.

In spite of its high seasoning, people who have acquired a taste for curry enjoy it at any season. Although curry powder is not expensive when obtained in bulk, it is not so expensive when prepared at home and used in small quantities.

Point all together in use and stir through a few slices; bottle and cork well.

To prepare curry, a rabbit, chicken or other delicately flavored meat is required. For chicken curry cover the chicken with boiling water, adding two large onions and a bouquet of herbs. Simmer gently for an hour and a quarter or until the chicken is tender, removing all fat.

Curry of Mutton—Put one large onion chopped fine in two tablespoonfuls of butter. Mix one tablespoonful of curry powder, one teaspoonful of salt, one tablespoonful of flour and stir into the butter and onion. Add gradually one pint of stock and one pound of brown beef in hot fat.

Curry of Eggs—Cook six eggs until hard, remove the shells and cut in halves. Put one teaspoonful of onion in one tablespoonful of butter. Add one tablespoonful of curried beef or two of flour, mixed with half a tablespoonful of curry powder. Pour over slowly one and one-half cups of stock, cream or milk; add salt. Shimmer till the onions are soft, then add the eggs. Simmer until hot. Serve in a shallow dish or arrange on toast.

# LINE FROM THE WORLD OF SPORTS

## Troop Of Cavalry For Twin Falls Is Being Considered

The war department has authorized Col. W. March, the adjutant general of the state of Idaho, to organize in the state units of cavalry, heavy artillery, machine gun or infantry and in the very near future an strenuous campaign will be made to locate these units in towns that desire them. The government is very liberal in making for these units a guard organization, for instance, in the organization of a troop of cavalry the government furnishes all horses and feed for the same, buys the life of men to take care of these horses, furnishes all saddles, uniforms and complete equipment and pays the men and officers for every drill period; experienced officers will be sent to instruct the men in modern equipment. The officers and men of the country as well as in all national guard organizations will draw one-fourth of the regular army pay which is estimated now amounting to about \$150 per month. The state of Idaho furnishes \$500 per year for armory rent.

In the event of the organization of these units the 125 man cavalry unit supplied which is the same outfit gunned-up by the 140th field artillery in France, or in the event of war conscription, to organize an infantry or machine gun unit, the same modern equipment will be furnished to the organization. All other military supplies in addition to available for the national guard of the various states to be used in target practice, which will be made a national objective by Colonel Fred Green, who is an officer of the United States regular army, assigned an inspector instructor to Idaho and who has a national reputation in marksmanship having held the world's record in certain phases of rifle and pistol firing.

It is the intention of the adjutant general, accompanied by Colonel Green to visit the larger towns of the state where sufficient number of men are available for the organization of these units and endeavor to place those which have been allotted to the state of Idaho. Towns especially interested in securing one of these organizations will communicate with the adjutant general at Boise, Idaho.

# FOREIGNERS JUN STILL TO EARN PASSAGE HOME

AKRON, Ohio, Jan. 19.—Many foreigners are manufacturing moonshine distilled liquor for the purpose of raising money to aid their return to the old country.

Our investigations show us that in a very large majority of cases the moonshiners are, not in the business with an idea of establishing an industry on a permanent basis, or for the making of money as a living. They are doing it to raise money quickly and for traveling expenses only, declared Assistant United States District Attorney Fred Counts, of Cleveland.

Attorney Counts arraigned twelve alleged moonshiners, all aliens, before United States Commissioner Ross W. Hartner here. Eight were held, the other four men were discharged.

"Some of these moonshiners say to make enough to get them to New York and to pay their income tax before leaving, while others figure to make enough to cover all expenses, including the ocean passage," continued Counts.

"We find that, in many instances, the stills have been owned by those who have already gone back to the old country."

It would appear that one man operating a still might be made enough to pay his way back. He sells the still to another who is yearning to return, and so it goes. Some of the stills we have authorized to have been used by as many as half a dozen who, we are informed, have gone back to the old country.
