WANTS HOOVER FOR PRESIDENT

NEW YORK, Jan. 21.—The New York World today came out in favor of Herbert Hoover as a successor to President Wilson. In its leading editorial, "Who will be next?" the World said that the best equipped and best qualified man to succeed Woodrow Wilson as president of the United States is Herbert Hoover.
"The world would be glad to support him as a Democratic candidate or as an independent candidate, or as a Republican candidate on a platform representing the kind of government Mr. Hoover has exemplified in his public life."
The partisan objections to Mr. Hoover are arguments in his favor. The American people are tired of professional politicians and disgusted with party politics. The battle of these warring politicians is a fictitious contest.

THE RULES FOR FOREIGN TRADE

Federal Reserve Board Mapping Regulations Under Foreign Trade Financing Act

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—The Federal Reserve board, which is clothed with absolute power to fix the procedure for organization of corporations under the Edge foreign trade financing act, has today issued regulations to govern those who are to operate under the new law. The regulations now under advisement are to be perfected as a general principle. Governor Harding said today in order that there shall be no further postponement of action by the board he desires to take advantage of the provisions of the act.
He said, however, regulations of the procedure relating to the organization of corporations under the act, the board is required to complete under which corporations may operate. They include the terms and conditions upon which such corporations may be organized and the conditions upon which debentures, bonds and promissory notes may be issued.
How far the proposed Edge act corporations will be able to furnish effective aid under existing conditions in Europe is open to considerable question. It is believed that the new concerns and the extent to which investors in this country are likely to take advantage of the act is the chief question.

Secretary of State Lansing, as a member of the peace conference opened an official trial of the Kaiser, but favored a political trial.

HUGHES POINTS TO DANGERS OF NEW PRECEDENT

Makes Plain Statement to Members of New York Assembly Who Suspended Socialist

ALBANY, Jan. 20.—The statement of Charles Evans Hughes, leading the committee of the New York bar association before the assembly here today, was a plain statement to the assembly and the socialist members suspended by that body, to which the assembly objected and would not listen to the address.

"We appear as a special committee of the bar association of New York. We don't represent members of the assembly, and we have no sympathy with the aims of that party.

"We appear solely as the representative of the bar association of New York, and in public interest to place before your committee for consideration matters which we deem to be of fundamental importance in the proceedings.

"In view of the gravity of the charges involved, and the serious questions which must follow any decision from sound constitutional principles, we respectfully suggest that the committee at once consider the propriety of suspending the socialist members of the assembly, and the immediate measures which are required in the light of the constitutional rights of these suspended members.

"We believe that the following measures are undisputed:

"1. That the members under suspension were duly elected to the assembly.

"2. That when these members appeared before the assembly, they were admitted to take the oath of office, and were admitted to the floor.

"3. That the members of the assembly participated in the election of speakers and otherwise acted as members until their suspension.

"4. That after having taken the oath, they have been admitted to the membership of the assembly, they were suspended without a hearing or opportunity to be heard.

"5. That your committee suggest suspension was not done against these members, and there is no charge against them that they are guilty of any crime or offense, or that they are in violation of any law.

"6. That by reason of the suspension, the members of the assembly are deprived of the right to participate in the election of speakers and otherwise act as members.
