GERMANS ASK SQUARE DEAL FROM BRITON

First Diplomatic Correspondence since in Five Years is Being Exchanged

LONDON, Jan. 27.—(Special Telegrams)—Direct diplomatic correspondence with England in five years is an earnest revival of a new square deal policy.

Chancellor Bauer seized the first opportunity personally to emphasize to the British government in the London-Kilmarnock that Germany has no intention of re-establishing her pre-war foreign political activity. It was stated today in authoritative circles.

Herr Bauer was said to have in-

formed Lord Kilmarnock that "Germany expects to fulfil all the terms of the treaty of Versailles."

Official dispatches from Berlin quote the chancellor as saying that the "new square deal" of the past few days, he explained that unless the Germans could get supplies, including raw materials, food and clothing, they could not fulfil a single requirement of the treaty.

The chancellor pointed out that Germany's desire to get her industries "going" will allow the Germans to recognize it only by increased production to the maximum that they say their reparations.

COUNCIL TO CALL \$25,000 BOND ELECTION TO BUY PARK SITE

Will Not Build City Library Now—Usual Amount of Routine Business Transacted

The city council last evening acted upon the suggestion of C. D. Thomas, representing the Chamber of Commerce, relative to the calling of a \$25,000 bond election to finance the purchase and improvement of a public park for the city. The maximum amount to be paid for a park is \$20,000 and the remaining \$5,000 will be used to improve the place. The St. John Skinner place, which the Chamber of Commerce has been negotiating for a park site, will cost about \$18,000.
Not to Call Election Now
Mr. E. Nelson requested that a \$25,000 bond election be called to build a new library. The council assured him that as the city could hardly afford a new library and also that the lease on the present building would run another year, the election should not be held now as building materials were very high and that while the cost of purchasing a suitable building would probably be cheaper to build a new one, it would probably be cheaper to wait a year.
The council accepted for admission into the city the old open addition on many lines rejected because no plans were provided for in the plans. In the new map presented last evening alleys were shown and the council accepted the tract.

May Open Street
A petition was presented last evening for the opening of Adams street in the Mountain addition. Herman Schurgen owns the property on which the road street will be located and the council referred the matter to the streets and alleys committee which will attempt to get a deed for the ground from Mr. Schurgen.
Additions Accepted
The Mortenson and East Lawn extensions additions were accepted for admission into the city. The former addition comprises 60 lots and the latter 100 lots.

DELEGATION OF TWIN FALLS RESIDENTS GOES TO BURLEY

American Falls Reservoir Proposal to Be Considered at Meeting of Reclamation Association

Planning to work hard for the opening of the Bureau tract, and having 200 members, including membership in the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce, approximately 100 Twin Falls residents boarded the train for Burley at 10 o'clock for the meeting of the Idaho Reclamation Association, which takes place at Burley today.

It is expected that the association will go on record at the Burley meeting in favor of the American Falls Reservoir and the "Twin Falls" canal project, for the irrigation of the tract like the French, which need only water to make them fully as productive as the best fields in the United States. It is also expected that the dam at American Falls is built, the major portion of the town being inundated, then the water would be used to irrigate great tracts of 55,000 acres, the size of the Bureau tract.

There is plenty of water, it is said, going to waste every year in the Snake river, which is saved, would irrigate several thousands of acres, and a large number of settlers in the southern Idaho and make Idaho a better agricultural state.

Governor D. W. Davis, who will preside at the meeting, is expected to make a speech in which he will expect that in his case the town of Burley is the center of the dam, in the neighborhood of \$2,000,000, as contemplated, a new city will be built and also a new power plant, with an annual capacity of 100,000 horsepower in the Snake river, at that point.

The plan of the dam is to store the water used for irrigation, to be used only in case of drought, but in the Twin Falls tract did not need the entire amount of water, it is understood that the Bureau tract is opened the owners will be required to pay for the water used for irrigation.

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INCREASES YIELD OF WHEAT

Experiment of Treating Seed Electrically Meets With Success in England.

An interesting experiment as to the effect of electrically treating seed wheat before sowing has been carried out at Blandford Green, Wiltshire, Eng., during this season, by W. F. Pledge of the Victoria flour mills, Abingdon, the London & River steamers, which is wheat chosen for the experiment was "red standard" and two additional plots were sown on November 13 and 14 last at the commodity of the wheat on the one plot being electrically treated and the other plots of the same rate at a distance of exactly nine miles through the year. Recently the growing crops were inspected by a party, including H. J. Babb, lecturer on agriculture at the Southwestern Agricultural college, York, Kent.

A marked difference between the two plots was noticeable, the wheat on the treated portion being much the more vigorous in growth and habit, and producing so far as the crops were concerned were able to yield a yield of 20 per cent higher than that of the untreated crop, in the untreated crop, and it was significant fact that the other plots of the same rate at the present stage, entirely free from this disease. It was the general opinion of those present that electricity is likely to become a very important factor in the cultivation of agricultural crops and that great developments are being made in the use of electricity in agriculture at this time.
