MISSOURI IS HOT BATTLE GROUND

Both Political Factions Throw Forces Into Campaign

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—The Senate on February 10, will have announced by the chief spokesman of the League of Nations who is the hottest campaign ever waged in the turbulent political history of Missouri.

On February 10, the voters of the third congressional district of that state will elect a successor to Secretary of Commerce Alexander D. Noyes, who represented it continuously from March 3, 1907, until he resigned from congress recently to step into the president's cabinet.

The district comprises two counties, Madison and California, respectively. It is the only one of the 113 districts in the United States in which the population is 100,000, which is a considerable increase over the 75,000 of the 1910 census.

FARMERS IN EAST LEAVE LAND, GO IN FACTORIES

Small Farmers Are All Getting the Worst of It, Says Investigator

CHICAGO, Jan. 31.—Because they are not getting their share of prosperity, farmers near small industrial manufacturing towns are quitting their farms and getting jobs in factories and the number of tenant farmers throughout the middle west is steadily on the increase, according to a report of an investigator.

The investigator says that farmers are getting richer, the average small farmer has been getting the worst of it, he said. "Everything he uses has come up in price, and the average small farmer from the hard labor and long hours of himself and family is but 30 cents a day."

Roumanian Premier Gives Idea of Proper Method to Be Followed by Allies

LONDON, Jan. 31.—A proposal that the allies make peace with the soviet before they attempt to trade with Russia and the declaration that Roumania will not fight the Russian Bolsheviks, except defensively, were made today by General Vaitoucou, premier of Roumania.

"I think we should be getting the cart before the horse if we try to trade with Russia without first making peace," said the speaker.

General Vaitoucou is a well known military leader and is now in power at Moscow and it is not our business to attempt to dictate internal Russian policies.
