URGES WILSON NOW GRANT WAGE INCREASE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—President Wilson has been appealed to by Representative Thomas L. Blanton not to allow a further increase in wages to the railroad workers.

In a letter sent the president today the Texas congressman says: "May I express the sincere hope that you will not permit Mr. Hines to succeed in pressing railroad demands. A shopkeeper must come down, or later, and now is the opportunity. The American people are ready for it. We must profit by Governor Coolidge's election as an expression of American feeling."

Blanton warns the president that the Democratic party is being condemned for railroad wage increases allowed by McKelton and Hines and that if another increase is granted the party will have difficulty in carrying Texas, which is 45 per cent Democratic. He further states that he bases his judgment on the tenor of more than 4,000 letters received from all over the country, some from every congressional district, condemning railroad and other organized labor demands.

INTERNAL PESTS INJURE POULTRY

Easier to Prevent Enemies of Farm Fowls Than to Get Rid of Any of Them.

Other Symptoms.

There are other symptoms, of course. Some of these are the shaking of the head, the contracting and the extension of the neck, the drooping of the wings and a peculiar staggering gait, sometimes caused by the choking and the exhaustion of the chicks.

Once in a great while gapping will be caused for a touch of bronchitis, but as a rule it is associated only with the attacks of the tiny round worms that fasten themselves in the chicks' throats. They not only choke the chicks, but they cause an irritation that leads to inflammation of the lining of the air passages.

Weak chicks, attacked by tape worms, will die nine times out of ten, as it is very hard to relieve them. The strong chicks may have vitality enough to overcome the trouble, but they will lose in growth.

The worms are sometimes extracted from the upper throat by means of a looped horse hair. This is a tedious operation and hardly worth while when there are many chicks to be looked after. The best plan is to locate the sufferers and move the remainder over from the mother where they have been feeding. Forcing the chicks to breathe live dust, fine, dry bird-bath lime, will force the worms to loosen their hold on the air passages. As a rule, though, the chicks are hardly strong enough to stand such measures.

Other Harmful Worms.

In older birds the tapeworms and round worms cause some losses. The round worm, in a cylindrical, unjointed form, is found in the crop, the gizzard and the rear. It is the most plentiful of the parasites. They are not very numerous, but they are very numerous.
