MAKE CONSUMER GOAT AS USUAL

Thirty Cents a Ton Is Tacked on Because of Wage Raise

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—Increased wages granted soft coal miners by agreement with Attorney General Palmer falls on the general public.

The increased wages amounting to 10 per cent, have increased the price of coal 30 cents a ton, which increase must be passed on the consumer.

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Call Prosecution's Bugaboo a Debating Society

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DEPRIVED BARRED ASKING WITNESSES IF THEY DONATED

Attorney Says Trying to Show Whether It Is Prosecution or Persecution

MONTESANO, Wash., Feb. 17.—Cross-examination of witnesses by Defense Attorney George F. Vandervoer took an entirely new tack this morning when the prominent attorney questioned as to whether or not the witnesses were union men and if they had contributed to the fund for the prosecution of the eleven men accused of murder in connection with the Centralia shooting on a crowded day.

Exhausted questioning of this sort brought objections from the prosecution, which were sustained. Superior Judge John M. Wilson finally rebuked the defense.

Vandervoer replied with the statement that he was preparing his ground to show that the workers men in Centralia and vicinity had been asked to subscribe to a fund for the prosecution of those charged with murder and that if he was allowed to show this he would at once compel subpoenas to obtain evidence on the point.

As Vandervoer put it, to show whether this is a public prosecution or a private prosecution.

The defense attorney this morning also accused the prosecution of making a list of "hand-picked" witnesses. This was denied.

Failure to Stop Will Cause Motor-man's Arrest

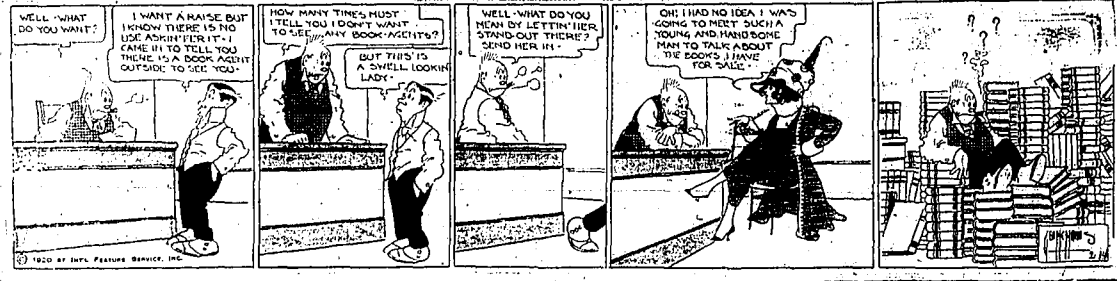

PARIS, Feb. 17.—The "Society of the Men with the Copper Masks" has just held its first annual convention at the Val de Grace Military Hospital. Paris society consists of French and foreigners suffering from facial wounds, who have been provided with a set of new features through modern surgery.

COAL PLANS ARE OUTLINED TO ENGINEERS

NEW YORK, Feb. 17.—Members of the American Institute of Mining and Metallurgical Engineers from practically every mining center in the United States are here today in attendance upon the first meeting of the institute. The meeting attracted the largest attendance in the history of the organization.

A constructive plan for the improvement of working conditions in the bituminous coal industry was the chief subject before the convention, government officials and bituminous coal operators participated in the discussion in response to resolutions extended to officials of every state mining association, the leading coal operators and many technical experts by officials of the institute.

The scope of the plan as presented to the convention comprises the causes of intramitigation; how and when intramitigation occurs; the actual number of days worked by men during each season of the year; a possible alteration in the wage basis; actual wages received by workers during each season of the year; the question of shortage in bituminous coal and as to possible places for storage such as at the mines, at industrial plants, etc.

Some taxation and the country petroleum supply were other topics in the forefront of discussion.

The report of the plan as presented to the convention comprises the problems of the bituminous coal industry were presented as follows:

"Problems of the Coal Industry," by Van H. Manning, director of the United States Bureau of Mines; "Fluctuation of Production in Coal," by George Otto Smith, director of the United States Geological Survey; "Storage of Bituminous Coal and its Possibilities of Stabilization," by H. H. Stock, University of Illinois; "Transportation as a Factor in the Regularity of Coal Mine Operation," by G. W. Reed, and "Stabilization of the Market," by Eugene McAdiff, president of the Union Colliery Company.

The convention likewise will witness the installation of Herbert Hoover as president of the American Institute. He succeeds Horace V. Whelple, retiring president. The plan for the improvement of working conditions in the coal industry was presented jointly by Mr. Hoover and Mr. Winchell.

Dempey Defended By Head of War Organization

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—The Private Soldiers' and Sailors' Legion, its headquarters in this city, is not in sympathy with the agitation against Jack Dempey, heavyweight champion, which has taken the form of an attack upon his war record by numerous poets of the American Legion. The president of the organization has come to the defense of Dempey and urges him to stand firm against the attack the American Legion posts have made against him.

Following is a telegram sent to Dempey by Marvin Gates Sperry, president of the Private Soldiers' and Sailors' Legion:

"The National Headquarters of the Private Soldiers' and Sailors' Legion heartily indorses telegram and letter sent you by our State Organizational Frank Poole and Local Legion, Seattle, Washington, January 24. We stand for justice and fair play for all civilians, as well as soldiers. Stand firm against unfair and bullying tactics of the Officers' American Legion. The American people want fair play for all."
