PARTY HEAD DENIES SOCIALISTS ARE BOLSHEVIKS

Payne Would Proceed With Sale Of Liners But Aide Is Opposed to His Plans

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—The shipping-board proposes to proceed with the sale of the former German passenger ships...

The conflict was the result of his opinion that the ships should not be sold, but would prove a profitable investment...

"It is true they cannot be sold now for what they are worth, but that is because there is no world market for them and there has not been for six years...

"These ships are worth from \$60,000,000 to \$75,000,000, in my opinion," Stevens continued...

"The board's experts insist upon charging off 50 per cent for depreciation on these ships...

"When the government buys ships it usually depreciates them at 50 per cent per annum and that is not a depreciation but on the depreciation value from year to year...

Stevens said the ex-German ships could be replaced for less than \$100,000,000, even allowed for depreciation at 50 per cent...

"I differ fundamentally with my colleagues on the board in the principle involved in the proposed sale of these ships," Stevens said...

In opposing the "bargain sale" of the thirty ex-German liners to the International Mercantile Marine for \$25,000,000 Stevens revealed that the decision of the board to auction off the vessels to private interests was not unanimous...

Hillquit Claims They Are Not Sovietists... Yet; Did Not Buy Bonds, He Admits

ALBANY, N. Y., Feb. 18.—A sweeping denial that the Socialists of America have taken the step of formally adopting a Soviet government for the United States was made today by Morris Hillquit, the party leader in Albany, looking out an expert in the proceedings against the five suspended Socialist assemblymen...

Hillquit testified as the official spokesman for the Socialist party of America, of which he is now and has been a leader for twenty years...

"Socialists in America are not bolsheviks," declared Hillquit. "We are in reality social democrats of the Marxian type."

"To say that a Soviet government for the United States is our aim or to say that a Soviet government is appropriate for the United States is infinite. The farmers of the United States are not comparable to the workers of Russia, nor is the United States to be compared with the industry of Russia."

"I am not in sympathy with the Russian revolution for the following reasons: "1. We recognize Russia as being governed by the working classes, and we people have the right to determine their own destiny. The Russians are doing this."

"We believe that a great social experiment is going on in Russia at present. It is neither a success nor a failure, but we believe that it should be left alone, without being interfered with."

"We are opposed to the blockade, the financing of counter revolutions in Russia, the practical carrying on of a war against a country with which we are not at war. Such a procedure is unapproved in history and indefensible on humanitarian grounds."

"Our sympathy with Soviet Russia does not mean that we approve everything which the Soviet government of Russia has done. We think they have made mistakes, and it would be a miracle if they had not."

"The cardinal principle of international socialism is that the people of every country must be left alone to determine the form of government under which they live, the form of government best suited to the needs of the greatest number."

Mr. Hillquit denied that the Socialist party was concerned with ethics, politics and marriage...

"The fact that even 25 per cent of the Socialists were agnostics does not make the Socialist movement a religion," he declared...

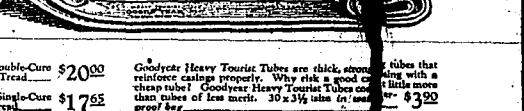

WILSON SAYS WANT RETURN OF U.S.

Wilson's Protest on Adriatic Situation Taken As Desire to Be Part of Supreme Council

LONDON, Feb. 16.—The allied premiers were said this afternoon to have adopted the view that President Wilson's protest against the Anglo-French Adriatic settlement has opened the way for a re-entrance of the United States to the supreme council.

The premier are giving extra credit to the preparation of a reply to President Wilson's note, emphasizing the importance attached to the incident.

Several drafts have been drawn, but all were rejected as unsatisfactory after close scrutiny. An answer may be completed in time to hand to John W. Weeks, the American ambassador tonight.

JONES HAS TO STOP AUCTION

Anti-Saloon Worker's Bid to Prohibit Argument Used by Shipping Board

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15.—Charges of manipulating by destruction of open cars to coal mines as a "sand bag" to compel operators to sell coal for railroad consumption at a less price than is paid by the public were filed today against the railroad administration by Thomas H. Watkins, president of the Pennsylvania coal and coke operators of New York City in a statement to the bipartisan anti-saloon committee.

Watkins charged that John Skelton, chairman of the committee, was responsible for the practice.

Watkins charged that William G. McAdoo, an director-general, manipulated the practice, and said that he had lived up to it only a short time.

Maryland Turns Down Suffrage

ANNAPOLIS, Feb. 17.—Ballotism in Maryland of the Susan B. Anthony suffrage amendment failed this afternoon when the house of delegates voted against ratification, 62 to 36.

The house federal relations committee will file this afternoon and plans to report the suffrage ratification resolution unfavorably.

America Will Not Re-enter Supreme Council of Allies

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—The United States is unlikely to name a representative to meet with the council of allies, it is learned from the department.

This government takes the view that the supreme council has been dissolved and that further negotiations must be through diplomatic channels and that any action of the council of premier should be submitted to this government through channels.

President Wilson has understood to take the view that such communication can be easily established and would be more satisfactory than by the appointment of a representative with full powers to meet with the premier.

Appeal to Secure Release of Adams

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 18.—An appeal to the state department at Washington to procure the immediate release and safety of Wilson W. Adams and his wife, Edith Adams, who were held for 50,000 pesos ransom in Mexico, is made by Mrs. Adams and her friends in this city.

Mrs. Adams stated that she had received no information bearing on the fate of her husband since the brief notification from Sanlito that Adams had been captured by Mexican bandits. She has been trying constantly to get into communication with the American consul at that point, she said.

The providence mining company, by which Adams was employed as an engineer, and other influential parties of Sanlito, the state department are prominent action in demand for the release of her husband, Mrs. Adams declared.

House Committee Files Charges in Aircraft Probe

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—The reports of the house committee which investigated air craft and which were made public last night were formally filed in the house.

The majority report filed by the committee of which representative Prewer, of Wisconsin, is chairman, made charges of extravagance and inefficiency in the production of aircraft during the war with Germany.

THREE MEN DIE IN HOTEL FIRE

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Feb. 18.—Three men were killed and 17 others injured in a serious condition at a hospital as the result of a fire which destroyed the two upper stories of the Lorraine hotel today. Bodies jumped from a fourth story window.

The dead: L. G. Kume, Centerville, R. I.; Daniel Warwick, Harrisville, R. I.; E. F. Fisher, Boston.

The loss was estimated at \$75,000. A number of the guests were baroque scenes and actresses from New York. The hotel was formerly known as the Seaman.

The fire was discovered when every one in the hotel with the exception of a few employees were asleep. 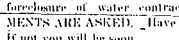

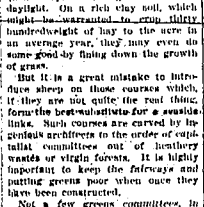
