

WAR DEVICES OF THE FUTURE FORETOLD

PARIS, Mar. 1.—As well as the destruction of life and property in the war which came to an end in November, 1918, it will be surpassed only by the wholesale butchery of the next armed conflict between the nations. Men who have devoted their lives to the study of the latest fighting devices, and who, owing to the immense and electricity they regard the possibility of another general war with unshakable horror.

ANARCHIST CLUBS ABOUT LONDON IN BYWAYS OF LONDON

LONDON, Mar. 1.—The anarchist clubs of London are scattered in the eastern and western districts. North and south are comparatively free of them. Charlotte street, W., and Bedford street, W., take the contrast and boundary of their ramifications.

Members of these London anarchist clubs are usually in the line of foreignness. Russians, proletarians, Spaniards, Italians, Germans are numerous, and Frenchmen are few. In all, the anarchists who are found in this strange company are usually proletarians. The police are aware of the existence of many of these clubs and have a comprehensive "Who's Who" of their membership.

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Where the authorities are in paying too much heed to the article anarchist and leaving the brains of the party—the hands performer—to now feel surrounded by a ring of political beliefs. In order to obtain a correct picture of the anarchist as he really is, it is necessary to become a partner of these Bohemian houses—not an difficult one, say, obtaining entry in a West End night club. Here one finds a mass of strange men of women who go toward the making of the turbulent atmosphere—passionate and there when a big fatal explosive takes place.

Some of these men lived by playing during the season in orchestras and on the legitimate stage. They were poets, dramatists and editors, who were bound out by an international Government to hatch their schemes of revenge abroad. But it was not always a "romantic" which brought these men from afar. They had fought relentlessly against a system of government which they deemed tyrannical long before the first of the law descended heavily upon them and had come over to England.

WHY SOME TEACHERS RESIGN
A story is told of a manual training teacher in a city high school who was ordered by the higher-ups in the school system to attend to the stage carpentering necessary for a big school parent.

The teacher in question started to work on the stage equipment. His services were demanded during the school day as well as in extra hours after pupils had gone home.

It happened that this man was a good teacher. He not only knew his work thoroughly, but he loved it and he loved the boys whom he taught.

Because he was all these things the young teacher woke up after a week or two of this work. He went to the office and offered his resignation, discouraged and heart-broken he was not allowed to teach.

There are many good teachers who are resigning from their positions for similar reasons. They do not complain about over-work or under-pay, but honesty and conscience will not let them stay in a false position.

In the meantime theorists and specialists in educational fields work out their individual schemes—the value of an exhibit here, of a play there. By themselves, the schemes are theoretically good. They do possess educational value.

ANOTHER OF THE ADAMSES
The political ability of the Adams family of Massachusetts is not yet lost, it seems. The family that has already given two presidents to the country and about twice upon the commonwealth of Massachusetts and the city of Boston by its brilliancy in public service and in literature has virile members.

Another of the Adamses—there always have been some of the Adams boys since the republic was founded—is out as a candidate. He is a Democrat Adams, and although his present abode is Chicago, he is a struck candidate of John Adams and John Quincy Adams. And his ambition is a modest one—modest, at least, in the view of the modern politician. He only wants to be vice president of the United States.

In these days, when the vice presidency is often forced upon some unwilling candidate, but faithful worker for the party's interest, Adams will not be accused of asking much. Maybe, too, he has hidden within him, as part of the Adams tradition, the force that could restore the vice presidential office to its contemplated dignity and power.

At any rate, a New England Adams in the political ring in the twentieth century is nothing to be sneezed at. It may even be considered something to be thankful for.

DANGEROUS ACROBATICS

A parachute jumper and aviator was killed at a southern winter resort the other day when he was giving an exhibition of jumping from one moving plane to another. This is the sort of useless waste of human life to which the law should put a stop.

Under army regulations most of the spectacular flying and gymnastic stunts which led to unnecessary loss of life have been forbidden. CIVILIAN should do the same thing for civil aviation.

Public Forum

Who Should Own The Capital?
I who in this Nebraska paper the following:
"Capital is Also Necessary."
There are a million men out of work in Belgium, Germany and Austria, are cursed by idleness. Newspaper reports tell of it, returned travelers tell of it, and letters from Germany to teach living in America. And it is due to lack of capital. If there was capital in Belgium and Germany, people could come back. But capital is shy and will not come out of its hiding place. And yet, we incur capital in America and in America talk about confiscating it. Capital is just as necessary as labor, both can be abused, and the use of both can be and is abused. What we need is a better understanding of both.

Well, my opinion philosopher of the matter, you are right on some points and wrong on others. You are entirely right in saying that we need a better understanding of capital, but wrongly wrong in saying the same of labor. We all have a pretty clear idea that labor means work sweat and toil and keep our noses out of the political mess-pan.

As to capital we are to a great extent, muddled. Comparative speaking, but few of us have a very distinct idea as to what we mean by the term capital. The definition of capital given by Henry George is, far and away, the best that I have ever seen. What I am sure is a credit to him to the extent that single centers are, holding that his theory contains the remedy for all our social and economical ills, yet I am convinced that his "Progress and Poverty" about the most philosophical discussion of economics that ever was published. This is his definition: "Capital is that portion of the surplus product of labor that is set aside for the purpose of facilitating, insurance and investment. It is the fund which is used to finance the activities of the individual and the community."

Why should we not begin, for instance save paper money, having on its face the words "This note is issued by the Kingdom of Belgium in exchange for services or supplies, and is a legal tender, at its face value for all debts, public and private," and proceed to open mines, build factories, restore public improvements, establish commerce and put in motion all the requisites of modern civilization? Only one thing stands in the way, and that is that owners of private capital, "big boys who are dark and rich and are vain," have succeeded in making governments believe that the only way to get capital is by borrowing it of them and paying them interest on it, thereby allowing them to live by owning the capital.

This is the way that we come to have a capitalist class, and it is thus that we have come to use the improper expression "war between capital and labor," a condition that never was nor can be. There may be, and is a war between the capitalist and labor, which is a very different matter.

The Guernsey Market House.
The island of Guernsey, having a usual independent government, the people were desirous of having a market house, and were discussing the plan of sending to London to see about raising the money to build it. When a man with a little more grey matter in his head than the usual allowance, asked why it was necessary to borrow the money and pay interest on it. He argued something like this: "We have the rock and the lime, and the timber right here at home, and plenty of good strong, able-bodied laborers; let us put them at work, paying in certification good for coal and stails when the building is finished." So they agreed on what should be the rental for stails, and what a day's work should be for the men, and went to work. As nearly everybody wanted stails, those who could not work on the buildings were glad to catch the water commodes they had for these certificates, and so, by common consent they became, in a measure legal tender and the house was built without any burden of interest.

FOURTEEN YOUNG LIVES BLIGHTED: IS YOUR BOY OR GIRL ONE OF THEM?

Twin Falls has been shaken many times by the report of great national happenings or by the report of accidental deaths but certainly the town will receive no more painful or regrettable news than that which came to the public ear yesterday following the visit of the sheriff's forces to the home of Fred Fuss in the eastern part of the city and the finding of fourteen young people between the ages of sixteen and twenty-one who had spent a night of carnival in the home. Mr. Fuss is away and the empty house proved an attractive place to these young cupids. It is reported that after dancing until midnight at one of the local dance halls the entire party repaired to the Fuss home, entered by each and spent the night until taken by the sheriff's of-

life at ten o'clock Sunday morning when they were given a temporary hearing and summoned to appear before Judge O. P. Durall at ten o'clock Monday morning.
The above story will doubtless make the fair city of Twin Falls gasp for breath. The wantonness and daring of the episode indicates a condition in the city that should shock careless parents out of their apathy into a realization of the fact that they are criminally careless in their home life and the raising of their sons and daughters. The conduct and habit of most youth now but little restrained save their own wish and caprice, and in many homes fatherhood and motherhood means little more than the bogging of their children.

Twin Falls just put on a big program of public improvements and these will mean little unless at the bottom of all growth and progress there is a good foundation of sound family and home life.
Fathers and mothers must awaken from the present state of criminal carelessness in the conduct of their home life, put some gray matter into the consideration of their duty toward their children in encouraging them in right living, restraining them from wrong courses of conduct, accompanying with them at least to know where they are and where they spend their time.
As for these young lives, the light is on them. Society unjustly may not beget the action of the male culprit. The seven girls will pay a hard price for their fling and their future will be made harder for them.
Perhaps these are not the only ones in our city who spent Saturday night away from home. Fathers and mothers do you know—really do you care—where your girls and boys spend their time? You imagine you know, but do you really know. Was one of these, fourteen your child?

SCARF WITH LEATHER BELT

The great wide scarf which is held on the waist with narrow patent-leather belt is right up to its neck in style. The hand-knit ones have not been very much yet, but they will be ere long.
They are very long—extending to the hem of the skirt—and very wide. It would be a good plan to start one right now if you intend to have one when you will be wanting it most.
Victory blue, purple, tan and brown are among the most popular shades for this sort of scarf. Gray is also good, but of course.

Cast on 65 stitches. For about 3 inches knit 2x2 rib and then purll stitches to make a border parallel to the bottom. Then purll your ten, plain knit 20 stitches, purll ten and plain knit ten. That would give you the design in purll on either side of the scarf.

The idea is to work the design to the center of the scarf.
Suppose that it takes ten purll stitches to make a border of width equal to the width of the border parallel to the bottom. Then purll your ten, plain knit 20 stitches, purll ten and plain knit ten. That would give you the design in purll on either side of the scarf.

The other end of the scarf would, of course, complete this rectangular design, which is traced out with the purlling.
Make it of nice heavy wool and do not skip 1/2" in length, and you will be cast upon the work of your hands and knitting needles!
