MUST GO TO SCHOOL UNTIL 18

California has a new school law known as the compulsory p Contorna mas a new school law known as the compulsory part time act which will become effective Johl 1, and which extends the age of compulsory school attendance from 16 to 18 years for those boys and girls who have not at that age completed a high school course. Pupils between the ages of 16 and 18, however, are required to attend school only half time. They are permitted to work part of the day if they wish, but they must spend at least four hours a day is about.

in school.

Needless to say, the operation of this law will put back into the schools a great many boys and girls who had previously stopped going to school. Many of them have left high school courses unfinished, and a surprising number have not even finished the elementary school

course.

in-The successful operation of the law requires solving a number of new problems. In the first place, employers of hoya and girls beingerin 12 and 18 years will have to co-operate with the school authorities in arranging the hours of work and hours of Kañoling still infactorily to everybody concerned. Unless a perfect arrangement is is according to every being concerned. Chees a parter imageneous found it will probably be necessary to provide more part-time teachers than would be needed to teach the same number of pupils full time. Also, most of these boys and girls left the schools because they

were not able to maintain the minimum standard of achievement re whired of each grade. They need a special type of instruction and training. They do not fit into the group teaching of the public typining. They do not fit into the group teaching of the public schools, but seem to call for individual help and attention. It is important that only sich subjects and such training be given as will better prepare them for the duties and re-possibilities of citizenship. 
