

CONTENDS LEAGUE OF NATIONS MEANS HUGE SAVING TO U. S.

ALLIES WILL OCCUPY TURK CAPITAL NOW SEEMS LIKELY

Armenian Massacres Hasten Decision of Powers
SULTAN UNABLE TO PRESERVE ORDER
Military Control Will Give Protection to its Neighbors

LONDON, March 6.—Allied occupation of Constantinople, with general allied supervision over military forces throughout the Turkish empire, was considered in probability in well informed circles here tonight.

Reports of massacres of Armenians and other foreigners in Turkish Asia Minor with the apparent inability of the Sultan's government to preserve order have convinced Premier Lloyd George. It was said, that immediate measures must be taken to restore order and protect human life.

The British press minister, it was understood, is taking the initiative in appropriation providing for allied military control for the protection of the new Armenian nation to boundaries remain to be defined, and Armenians in Turkish territory, under the plan now proposed by the British.

Observers say in recent dispatches of additional French troops bound to reach French troops in Turkish Asia Minor, France's agreement to the British plan. The British authorities have assumed Premier Lloyd George understands that his fear that France would be left to bear the brunt of military operations in the near east is unfounded.

Diplomatic circles tonight expressed surprise to make some effort to determine the attitude of the United States toward the situation in Turkey. The attitude was not to become confronted with a second Adriatic situation and probably will proceed according to the usual course. It is naturally to have the approval of the Washington authorities.

Daniels Submits Request for Five Hundred Million to Build Largest Navy--League Would Cut This Down

Congressmen Openly Skeptical at Secretary's Contentment and Will Probably Turn Down His Request for Enormous Increase of Expenditures—Think England Would Restrict Armament

WASHINGTON, March 6.—Failure of the senate to ratify the peace treaty at this session would mean expenditure of \$555,000,000 during the next three or four years to increase the fighting strength of the United States navy.

Because of the delay to the treaty Daniels recommended that 69 vessels, including several large fighting ships, be authorized in addition to the three-year program of 1916, which has been only about one-third completed.

At the same time he declared if the senate definitely decided the United States shall not be a member of the league of nations, the nation must enter upon a huge construction program that will make our navy "incomparably" the greatest in all the world.

# PARIS PHYSICIAN TO KILL FLEU GERMS

### Paris Physician Meets With Success in Anti-Plague Experiments.

## 30,000,000 IN WORLD HIT

### New York Hospital Isolated Sleeping Sickness Germ—Paris Doctor Says Influenza and Sleeping Sickness Are Twin Diseases.

New York.—Three-quarters of the world's population have been affected with Spanish influenza, and it is now declared to be the same disease as the sleeping sickness; and a serum has been found to cure both, according to reports from Paris.

Simultaneously with the receipt of word from Paris that the germ had been discovered by Dr. Charles Volley which would cure both influenza and sleeping sickness, came a report from Bellevue hospital that the germ of the disease had been isolated from Mount Sinai hospital of the probable isolation of the sleeping sickness germ.

No produce a serum to cure the encephalitis epidemic, as the sleeping sickness is known to science. It would be necessary to separate the germ of the disease, as serums are made from the disease germs themselves, the first germ in the blood of the patient, and the injection into the blood of the dead bodies of the same germs.

The germ of Spanish influenza is known to have been carried on here and in Paris.

Use Flu Germ. Doctor Volley in Paris produced the serum for the cure of sleeping sickness without isolating the encephalitis germs at all, but by using a serum of influenza, which led him to assert that the two are twin diseases and caused by the same germ under different conditions.

The same serum which he cured many cases of influenza was found equally effective in curing sleeping sickness. This theory of twin diseases is borne out in the famous Mrs. Mata case here, where the patient followed a severe attack of Spanish influenza.

At the office of Doctor Sabin at Bellevue it was said that Mount Sinai hospital researchers were not ready to state positively they had separated the sleeping sickness germ, but they had formal announcement of the germ's discovery had been issued. A preliminary report had stated that the germ was isolated from the patient's blood.

Experiments with the germ show it was being carried on Mount Sinai, a complete report of the findings of the researchers there will be issued in time. It was said.

Doctor Volley said there are 20,000,000 cases of influenza annually and 30,000,000 this year because of the world-wide epidemic.

"It did not invent this antiplague serum, and it was only after I had made successful experiments on myself that I used it on others. Since that time I and other physicians have made thousands of cures, and I am convinced that this is the true cure of the sleeping sickness as the same disease."

Experts there is no danger in employing this treatment, there is grave danger from influenza due to the great number of cases, which are constantly increasing every day in all the quarters of the population of the world which has already been more or less affected with it."

# TESTIMONY IN NEWBERRY CASE NEARLY ALL IN

Trial Will Probably Be Completed by March 18, Attorneys Now Believe

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., March 6.—Attorneys in the Michigan election fraud trial here said tonight that they believed the testimony would be completed next week, allowing three days for arguments and court instructions, they believed the case would reach the jury about March 18.

Plans of the defense for making only a brief answer to testimony by the prosecution was changed, however, Judge Slossman in overruling a motion for dismissal of the charges, declared the jury would be sworn in by Friday, the defendants guilty as the testimony stood at that time.

The defense attorneys declared that it would be impossible to present a great many new witnesses that they had first planned on in view of the country's activities.

Several character witnesses testified today. These men called to tell of the character of Frederick W. Coyle of New York, Senator Newberry's "body double" who was permitted to testify because they were not personally in touch with Coyle during the senatorial campaign of 1914 when the alleged fraud took place.

Paul King, manager of the campaign to elect Newberry to the United States senate, told the jury that it was James W. H. H. who ran for the senatorial nomination.

King denied that Item's candidacy was financed by the Newberry committee, as contended by the government. He declared he received a letter from the senator, protesting against his backers sponsoring H. H. Item's candidacy.

The government attempted to show that the Newberry committee had a plan in an effort to split the democratic vote and defeat Harry Ford.

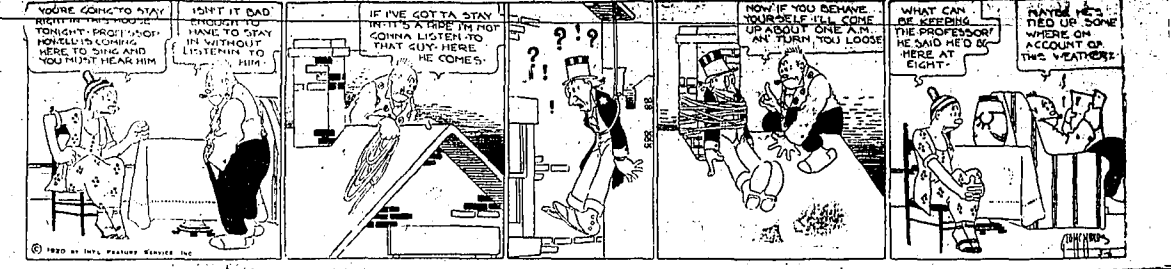

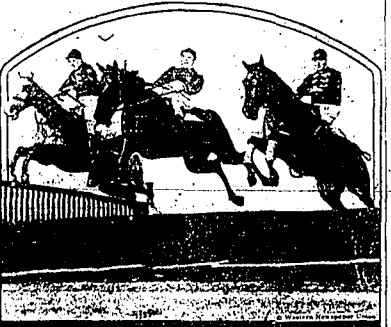
