THREE SHIPS STORM SWEEP SYM AT SEA CREWS SAVED

North Atlantic Gale Takes Heavy Toll From Shipping

MANY DISTRESS CALLS RECEIVED

Gullford, Le Jok and Eva Douglas Left to Fate in Waves

BOSTON, March 8.—Battered by the heavy seas, three vessels were abandoned by their crews and left to sink in the north Atlantic. Wireless messages today told of the danger of being lost with all hands and the great cutters and steamers going to their assistance.

The list of the disabled craft follows: United States Shipping Line steamer Gullford abandoned fifteen miles off Sable Island, 100 miles from the coast, rescued by steamer Panopticon and transferred to United States destroyer Dale which took them to New York.

United States shipping line steamer Le Jok abandoned 100 miles east of Bermuda Capes. Crew of 12 picked up by British steamer Vassar.

MAY GIVE UP SURFACE CASH

Women's Label League Allies With Farm Women---Co-operation Pledged For Securing Needed Legislation

Misuse of Flag in "Un-American Plan" Assailed—Mayor Whitaker of Pocatello, Rev. Moore and Other Speakers Address Huge Audience of 1500 at the Lavering

That the interests of the farmer and the laborer are identical in the great struggle to overcome the wrongs of industry, business and politics, that the country is now without legislation to protect the great mass of American people, that the so-called "American Plan" of the employers' association is the most un-American thing outside of Russia, and that the Women's Union Label League and its allied farm women will be a strong factor in correcting local conditions, were brought out at yesterday's big mass meeting at the Lavering theatre, where nearly 1500 farm and union men and women gathered to hear a series of speeches.

Sledge hammer blows were delivered by Mayor Whitaker of Pocatello, Rev. W. A. Moore of Twin Falls, and other speakers, against those who would tear down instead of build up, against those who put private profit above public welfare; who put selfish interests above those of humanity. Co-operation was the keynote of the meeting, with scathing denunciation of the interests which seek to array the farmer and laborer against each other and thus perpetuate their own grip upon the resources and essential industries of the country.

The employers' association and its plan for the open shop was attacked for its misuse of the American flag and for its disguised principles. The spirit back of such a movement was held up as injurious to the reputation of Twin Falls elsewhere in the state, this being illustrated by City Attorney Cummings of Pocatello, who in the course of his remarks announced that the reason Twin Falls failed to get the State Democratic convention this year was because "a certain Twin Falls editor" whom he later identified as the editor of The Chronicle, was one of the Twin Falls representatives who worked to get the convention. Mr. Cummings, who spoke from the authority of his connection with the State Democratic committee, assured the audience that the party had nothing against Twin Falls but that the presence of The Chronicle editor on the delegation from this city prevented the convention from coming here.

The country is at present without legislation to protect the great mass of American people, said Mayor Whitaker of Pocatello, chief speaker of the afternoon. "The grip of the profiteer upon the nation is founded, not upon contract, but upon the resources and upon control of the essential industries. Our only relief lies in legislation to break this control and place these resources in the hands of the people to whom they naturally belong."

Mayor Whitaker was given a splendid ovation when he arose to address the audience. "Famous speakers had no tribute to his ability and his wide knowledge of the situation," said O. G. Zuck of Kimberly, who introduced the speaker. He stated that he was proud to sit on the same platform with Mayor Whitaker, though there were "others" who had been invited to speak. He expressed the refusal of Mayor Edinger of Twin Falls to appear on the platform was received with much applause.

Mayor Whitaker reviewed his administration at Pocatello, where the municipal lumber yard was established to enable the laboring man to buy his home. He told of the closing of Pocatello for a week, where the city of the city. 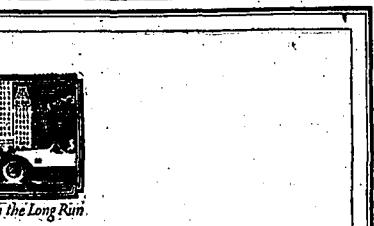

**BLESSING SAYS DEMONSTRATOR**  
O. C. Taylor Says Income Tax Will Force Farmers to Keep Records of Inventories

Inasmuch as the income tax laws forcing the farmers to put their farming on a business basis and to keep records of inventories, expenses and receipts, it is probable to have been a blessing in disguise, according to O. C. Taylor, newly appointed farm management demonstrator of the University of Idaho extension division.

"Any farm account should provide for an inventory of all real estate, livestock, machinery, tools and supplies on hand at the beginning of the year and at the end of the first year," says Mr. Taylor. "One of the first steps in the management of the farm is to keep accurate records of the farm's income and expenses, and to have a clear idea of the farm's financial position."

"Farmers will undoubtedly have to submit income statements next year, as in the past," said Mr. Taylor. "And from then on income reports will be required by law if it would be profitable from the farmer's individual standpoint to have such a net only for an inventory, but also for a list of all cash farm expenses and all the cash sales from the farm, to say nothing of the fact that it should be possible to show the farm's income and expenses in a clear and concise manner."

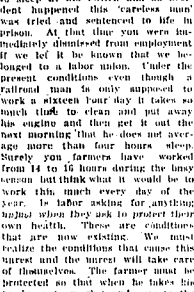
