ACID TEST WILL BE FACED BY CRAVATH

NEW YORK, March 8.—Garry Cravath's ability as a business manager will be subjected to the acid test this afternoon in the trial of the Phillips case.

Cravath, like most major league managers who have been looking for talent west to mend their fences, had had little luck in securing new players who had not depended on the hill. The Phillies, as a result, are not being considered as pennant contenders in the early season and it appears to a man up there that Garry Cravath will soon find that "miracle man" stuff he hopes to derive the Phillies into pennant contenders in 1920.

The Phillies are training at Birmingham, and will play a number of exhibition games before opening the season. They are not yet in the league, clubs that did not arrange a joint barn-storming trip with a club from the league.

With Bradley Hoop's announced determination to retire and practice law in Chicago, Cravath will depend upon Epps, Hickey, Leo Meadows, George Smith, Cantwell, Murray, Whort, and several other pitchers, among them is the right-hander who made quite a record with the Massillon, Ohio, team last summer. This season he will be depended on by one of the strongest in the National League, and unless Daniel Linger, Carter or some of the other youngsters can emerge and help Hickey and Meadows shoulder the pitching burden the Phillies will probably not be going pretty tough.

Jack Adams and Walter Truesher will be the catchers, and will be depended on from present indications the field will be made up of Cy Williams, Jack Duggan and "Tish" Havel. Not a bad outfield for the Phillies. There's hitting power and speed in this trio.

The third base question was the biggest. Hubbard's campaign on Cravath's trail who are starting Sholly, the Atlanta Braves, and the Philadelphia Phillies. The Philadelphia team is going to be weak from present indications, and Cravath will have to win a pennant without strong pitching, much less faith among the fans in the first division.

There's "no" to be said for Cravath, however, he is a better first baseman, and all the time. He is popular with his players and has set a maximum work out of them. And he doesn't succeed in fighting his way into the first division.

MAY PERFECT NINE HOUR CROSS-COUNTRY AIR PLANE

Expert Says San Francisco May Soon Be As Near New York as Pittsburgh

SAN FRANCISCO, March 8.—In the future, an airplane may rise in the San Francisco and cross the continent in 24 hours—and speed 200 miles an hour.

The preliminary work for such a feat is now being done in the engineering department of the University of California. Several private firms are also working toward it. A contract for the construction of the plane is a project which engineers firmly believe will be achieved as soon as the federal government has been authorized to finance the project. These factors have all been proved on separate planes.

The nine-hour transcontinental plane would have the following characteristics: It could pass the 30,000 foot level; it would have to have a useful load carrying capacity to permit it to carry fuel for nine hours, and it would have to be engine so as to have a speed of 200 miles per hour at 10,000 feet per hour at the flying altitude.

The climbing quality has been planned for the plane to climb the 30,000 foot level has been passed by the flyers of several countries. To reach the level was a stunt last year, and the plane will have to be able to rise to the 30,000 foot level in 10 to 15 minutes. Scores of planes have records of more than nine hours sustained flight, and the plane will have speeds of more than 100 miles per hour but this runs into difficulties with the engine and the propeller. When the several necessary factors are met, it is planned to start the plane at San Francisco and when it reaches the 30,000 foot level will find itself in the grip of a west wind.

THE RAILROAD

One of the planks in The Times' platform for a greater Twin Falls city and county, as set forth in the editorial columns for many months, has been construction of a railroad south to connect with overland trunk lines to the coast. It is with keen interest, therefore, that The Times views the Idaho-Nevada and Tidewater Company's proposal to link Twin Falls by rail to Wells, Nevada.

Such a railway line holds many important advantages for Twin Falls, perhaps three of which stand out with prominence. First, it would provide a direct outlet for shipping to the Pacific coast markets and seaports. Secondly, it would open up much new territory with Twin Falls as a trading and distributing center. Development of the Contract and District mining districts through advent of a railroad, should be considered among the promising prospects of this side of the case. Lastly, the establishment of a railway would here mean added population and industry in the way of shops and other railroad activities.

For these and other reasons The Times advises an open mind and a preparedness to grasp any practical and sound proposal that may be made to the desired end. It may be said that the Idaho-Nevada and Tidewater Company has laid its plans well, and to all appearances, the public, however, will be able to judge for itself when these plans are made known at a banquet to representative citizens tomorrow evening. If the proposal has the merit which it seems to hold, there is little doubt that united support will be given it. The Times merely asks that serious and careful inspection be given the plan.

CARE FOR THE MACHINERY

There are two ways of caring for any kind of equipment. One is to wait until the machine breaks down before repairs are made. The other is to keep it in repair from day to day, or from month to month, so that any weakness is promptly detected and remedied. That the latter is the better way goes without saying.

It makes little difference whether the machine is part of a shop or factory outfit, whether it is farm machinery or home equipment, or whether it is the physical body of the man himself. The proper method for its care is the one which keeps the thing constantly in good condition, instead of waiting until it breaks down before any mending, long, expensive repairs, while the entire job is paralyzed by the inactivity of one member.

It is just the practical application to all branches of industry of that old saw which formerly was reserved for the neobushings in made—"a stitch in time saves nine." If it is farm machinery, it should be inspected now, and then kept in good running order. The heavy pull of the year is coming on the farm. If it is shop equipment the same thing should be done; the country needs production, and breakdowns hinder production. Home and body have had the long strain of winter; both should be put in condition for the heat and work of summer.

SINN FEIN IN LONDON

U. S. INCOME TAX EXEMPTS NOBODY

Every Person Who Had Income in 1919 Must Determine Own Liability

MARCH 15 LAST FILING DATE

Free Advice in Doubtful Cases. Severe Penalties in Law.

Surest Way Is to Follow Form 1010A

Severe Penalties in Law.

Nobody is exempt from income tax. An obligation is laid directly on the shoulders of each citizen and resident to declare his own case and to get his return in on the 15th of March.

With each return showing a tax due, the collector will accompany the return in the full amount of the tax or at least one-quarter of the tax.

All returns for 1919 must be filed on or before March 15.

Must Show True Figures.

In figuring up his earnings for income tax purposes a person must take into consideration all forms of income, and each item itself must be accurate in amount. Gains and expenses must be recorded, for the return is made under oath.

Everybody who had an income during 1919 must now determine whether he or her net income was sufficient to amount to require an income tax return. The best way to find out is to get a Form 1010A and follow the instructions printed on it. That form will serve as a reminder of every item of income and if a return is due, it tells how to prepare and file it.

One of the important points to keep in mind is that a person's income is based by a computation prescribed in the law, and that each item of income from every source must be considered unless specifically exempted.

Another thing to remember is that the general exemption allowed taxpayers for 1919 is \$1,000. This exemption is not to be construed until it has been figured out his net income and determined whether it was sufficient to require him to file a return. If a return must be filed, he should read carefully the instructions for claiming exemption, and complete his return.

If in doubt as to what to do as to income or deductions, a person may secure free advice and aid from the nearest Federal office. Many banks and trust companies are also furnishing similar service during banking hours.

Heavy Penalties in Law.

For failing to make a return on time, the penalty is a fine of not more than \$1000 and an addition of 5% per cent to the tax, if any. For making a false or fraudulent return the penalty is a fine of not more than \$1000 or imprisonment not exceeding one year, or both; and, in addition, 50 per cent of the tax due and not more than \$1000 for failing to pay tax when due, and for understatement of the tax through negligence.

Many Sources of Income.

Aside from what one may earn by his services, there are many other sources of income. If he sold any property during 1919 he must figure out the gain realized. If he rented buildings, land, apartments or rooms he must figure out the net income received, and he may claim deductions for necessary expenses incident to the rental.

Interest on a commodity loan, or income on bonds taxable whether withdrawn or not. Any amount of interest credited to a depositor is income to the depositor.

Interest on mortgages and notes. If a taxpayer who cashed his received form during 1919 must report as income any gains received over the total of pending point.

Members of partnerships or persons of estate or persons who are beneficiaries of an estate or trust must report their shares of income distributable to them whether or not actually withdrawn.

Results of domestic corporations must be reported. Many other forms of income tax to Lewis Williams, collector of Internal Revenue, Boise, Idaho.

Those who must file returns but who do not have the returns prepared for them are warned that the revenue law imposes heavy penalties for failure to get returns in on time or for making payments on them.

Each filing and each payment are made in order to reduce the overall tax liability as much as possible in an amount on the 15th of March 15.

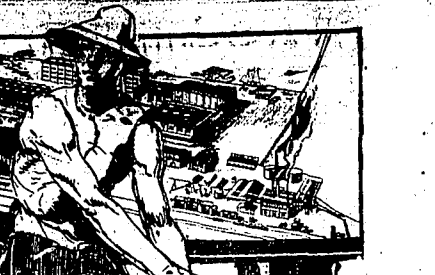
