ALBANY, March 12.—William D. Anderson, state superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League, which may be subjected to legislation of prohibition lobbying was today charged with forming a revolution against the United States as an Assemblyman. Louis A. Couviller, "We have been asked to throw out the socialist," said Couviller, "who would be a member of the Judiciary committee which conducted the socialist inquiry, is sponsor for the investigation resolution on the anti-saloon league. "We are asked to expel them for giving aid and comfort to an enemy outside the country but we haven't done anything yet with Anderson who is causing the revolution within the country by bringing the religious question to the fore.

"Mr. Anderson is six feet tall, 45 years old and his eyes are blue, but I did not see him in any way for his country," continued Couviller. "He is a moral and physical coward and the 25 executive committee assembly recent his threatening and building. Remember there was one man sent to the legislature for not siding the legislature. If the republican party had a leader in this state Anderson would be in jail today. "Mr. Anderson sent a letter to the legislature today, headed 'Some plain talk' and a square defiance to the assembly."

"The popularity with the assembly is the best evidence to most of the constituency of the anti-saloon league that their agency is making good. This threatened investigation is furnishing further proof that the activity of the league counts against them and huts the great. The Anti-Saloon League was determined to focus the attention of the state on the question of prohibition enforcement this year, regardless of the result. In addition to this, we succeeded in getting the gas let out of the investigation light, there has been much talk.

Bond Issue For Soldier Bonus

WASHINGTON, March 15.—Fighting of a government bond issue to raise funds to pay a bonus to soldiers was characterized as "dangerous" by the majority of our country's structure by Secretary of the Treasury Houston today before the House ways and means committee, considering soldier bonus legislation.

Houston further advised against increased taxes to raise the money. "Increased taxes would be the less dangerous plan," Houston said.

"The committee wishes to know of any plan you suggest to get relief from \$1,200,000,000 to \$2,500,000,000 for the soldiers," Representatives Kitchin, democrat, testified.

"I believe the committee knows the condition of finances. The proposal to spend a sum from a billion in two billion dollars would be a serious one at this time," Houston said. "An effort to sell bonds at this time would present a very dark possibility. The nation's finances are now in a critical condition.

"With priorities in handing our finances this nation can proceed in an orderly fashion. I think a proposal to float two billion dollars might be disastrous. I don't know if you can float bonds at the present rate of interest.

"If we increased taxes it would cause an increase in the cost of living. Wages would be forced upward.

"If we doles all we can to bring about a stable condition of finance. "We are having difficulty to do that now. The solution of a bond issue would contract this and make further progress toward normal conditions impossible.

"I would recommend increased taxes as the least harmful means of raising the money. Taxes are high now and our problem now is to relieve taxes and adjust them that they will be distorting to business."

"The only way you can raise the money for a bonus is by additional taxes on normal incomes," said assistant secretary of the Treasury, Leffingwell. "Whatever way you raise the money you will decrease the value of the dollar."

I feel satisfied that a substantial contribution has been made to the knowledge of flotation technique possessed by the mining men of the northwest."

Addresses delivered by A. Grant of Moscow, C. A. Wright of the U. S. bureau of mines station at Salt Lake, M. H. Sullivan,

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metallurgical at the Bunker Hill and Sullivan smelter; J. B. Parker of the Interstate-Columbia mining company and Dean Thomson were declared among the most profitable of the entire week.

All of those in attendance at the conference were entertained at luncheon at Hidenhough hall following this closing session.
