PARIS HEARS RUMOR TODAY EBERT AGAIN HAS CONTROL

Fighting Reported in Five-Cities of Empire

INFORMATION ON REVOLT VARIES

Bomb Reports Say New Government Is Winning

PARIS, March 15.—The French foreign office late today received a report that Dr. Wolfgang von Kapp has capitulated and invited President Ebert to return to power in Berlin. The only stipulation reported was that Ebert call new elections.

LONDON, March 15.—Premier Lloyd George informed the house of commons this afternoon that official advice to the government report fighting in progress in five German cities—Dresden, Leipzig, Kiel and Chemnitz.

Information to the British government, the premier said, was that the military coup had been successfully carried out in 25 cities and that the position of the new government appeared to be strengthening.

The allied governments will "remain at ease," Mr. Lansdowne, military secretary, announced in the house.

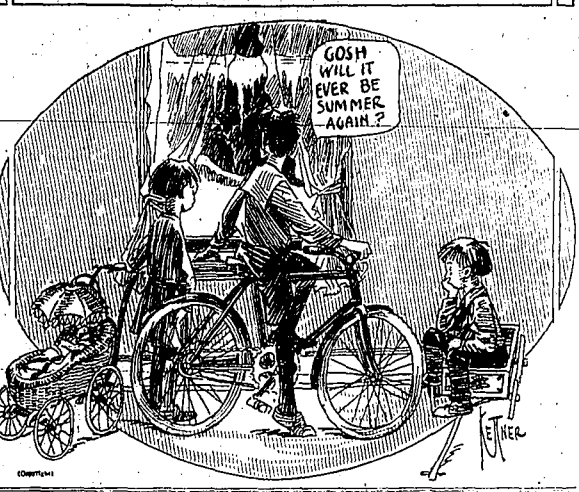

POLITICAL FACTIONS RALLYING IN GIGANTIC STRUGGLE FOR CONTROL GERMANY--FIGHTING BREAKS OUT

A strict censorship has been established by the new German government at Berlin and all of the press dispatches sent by telegraph, wireless or telephone pass through the hands of censors, supervised by Ignatz L. Lincoln.

Two German governments are engaged in a gigantic political struggle today for control of the German nation, the government headed by Imperial Chancellor Wolfgang von Kapp controls Berlin.

Unconfirmed reports were printed by the Paris Journal that violent fighting had broken out at some places in Germany and that fifty persons were killed at Kiel and thirty at Essen.

Warships are reported to have opened fire on parts of the city occupied by armed working men. The soldiers and sailors charged with the bayonet and drove the workers from their positions.

AMBASSADORS ADVOCATING OCCUPATION OF GERMANY

Allies Watch Situation Developing Across Rhine

ATTITUDE WILL BE DECIDED ON

Premiers to Meet at Paris This Week for Decision

PARIS, March 15.—Recommendations to the ambassadorial council included the occupation of Berlin, Essen and the Ruhr containing district in Western Prussia by Allied troops, according to The Journal today.

LONDON, March 15.—(I. P. M.) All of the allied ambassadors and ambassadors at present in London were called into conference by Premier Lloyd George this afternoon.

PARIS, March 15.—Premier Millerand has telegraphed to Premier Lloyd George and Premier Nitti suggesting a special meeting of the supreme council for an exchange of views on the developments warranting the occupation of Germany.

Premier Millerand, of France, is said to urge a "hands off" policy pending further developments. The French view is that the revolutionary movement cannot be certain of success of the attitude of South Germany. Mr. Millerand is reported to be urging the allies to close up their ranks and to renew efforts to bring the situation to a cooperative attitude in every way.

GDNDON, March 15.—Formal details of the German government headed by Imperial Chancellor von Kapp, was announced today.

Official advice reaching today from Cologne would hold a mass meeting of the German people on Monday and that a similar mass meeting was being planned at Stuttgart.

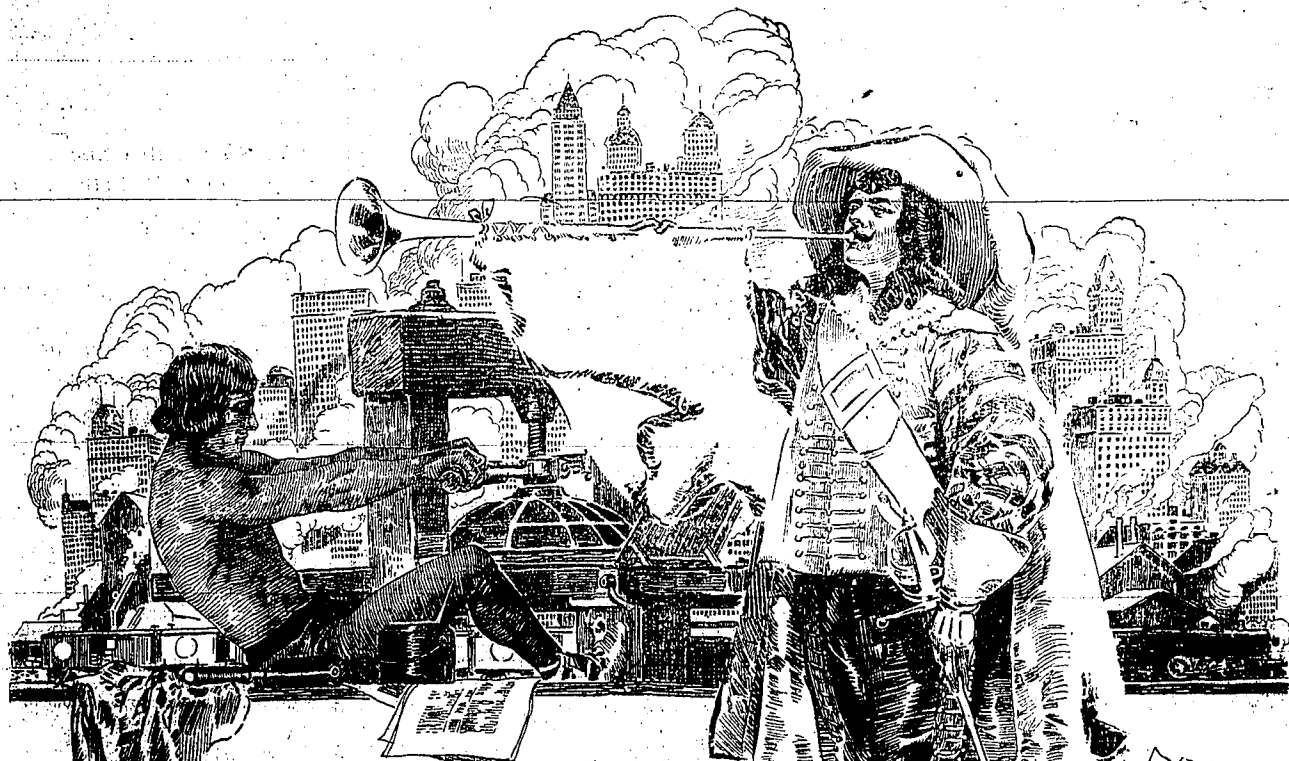

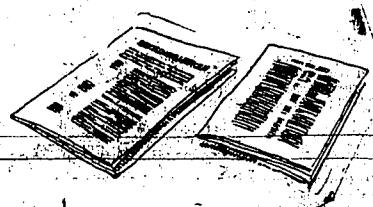
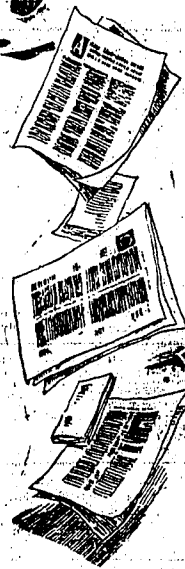

SHOWDOWN ON PEACE TREATY DUE THIS WEEK

Rejection by Senate and Injection Into Campaign Is Freely Predicted

WASHINGTON, March 15.—A proposal by Senator Kirby, Democrat of Arkansas, for a change in the substitute for the original reservation to Article 10 was defeated by a vote of 21 to 45.

By a vote of 29 to 46, the so-called "felt reservation" to Article 10 was defeated.

As a viva voce vote, another substitute proposed by Senator King, Democrat of Utah, was defeated by a vote of 19 to 45.

Senator Binamon, Democrat of North Carolina, then proposed a substitute.

WASHINGTON, March 15.—Defeat of the peace treaty and its injection into the campaign before the week end was the prediction freely expressed on all sides as the senate prepared for a final show down today on Article 10.

By unanimous agreement, all proposed reservations to the long disputed article, and all suggested substitutes and amendments, must be voted on before the end of today's session.

In order to get rid of Article 10, it is believed that a continuous session—until midnight, if necessary, it must be disposed of before the end of the calendar day, which starts today.

Debate is to be restricted to 15 minutes for each senator on amendments.

President Wilson has sent Senator Hitchcock another letter relative to the new Lodge reservation on Article 10, it was announced at the White House today. The letter was in reply to one from Senator Hitchcock, in which he understood the president.

It is understood the president maintains his opposition to such a reservation.
