ALWORTH BACK FROM MEETING

Well-known Twin Falls Man Very Enthusiastic Over Prospects of Reclamation

Bringing with him reports of an excellent trip, W. P. Alworth, president of the county farm bureau, returned yesterday from Washington, D. C., where he conferred with Secretary Agriculture E. T. Meredith, relative to reclamation of western lands, and from Chicago, where he went as a delegate to the national convention of farm bureaus.

Mr. Alworth spent some time in Washington, in conference with Mr. Meredith, and came back with the feeling that the new secretary is heartily in sympathy with the west and its reclamation needs. Meredith has been in this part of Idaho several times and has a genuine interest in the development of the farming country near Buhl as well as in other irrigable districts. All the Bureau tract needs to make the fertile is water and Mr. Alworth believes the problem will be taken care of in due time. Idaho about "ought" herself fortunate, according to Mr. Alworth, to have a secretary of agriculture who is deeply interested in the development of the western states; one who has spent considerable time west of the Rockies in an effort to learn the needs of the western people.

Whenever a western arid or representative propose reclamation of arid western lands, there are always a corresponding number of legislators from other states who put in a plea for drainage of southern swamps or reclamation of other eastern states. It is said, thus, the lack of securing reclamation of western lands is a big one but now that there is a secretary who knows the need of the west and will work for its development, the success of the undertaking is said to be dimming.

While going Mr. Alworth also attended the national farm bureau convention meeting at Chicago, at which much was accomplished although most of the work done was of general interest to the public. Ways of bettering the farm bureaus throughout the country were taken up and there was a large amount of routine business discussed. Mr. Alworth is enthusiastic over the work of the farm bureaus.

In his eastern itinerary most of the large cities were visited. He reported the weather here much better than in his east, which, he said was snowed.

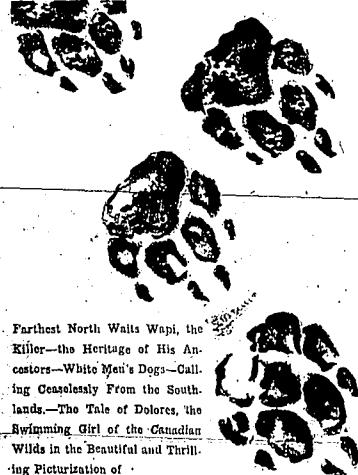

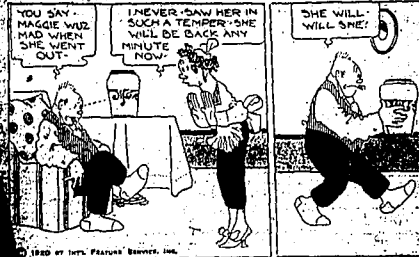

TO PROTECT MUSIA

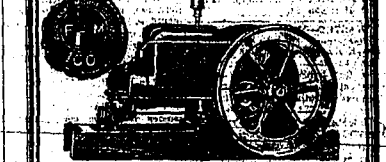
