North Side Has Grange Meeting

BEROKE, March 24.—A goodly representation of the members of the Beroke Grange, No. 100, met at the Grange building and Grandview Granges visited Appler Grange last Friday night, March 23. Assistant Engineer Bradley of the Reconstruction Service gave a detailed account of the moisture conditions on the Snake river watershed. He showed that although there was an abundance of snow in the mountains, there might be weather conditions this spring whereby a water shortage for growing crops would result. If enough moisture fell in April and May so to cause the ice and snow to melt fast enough so the low snow frozen ground in the mountains could not absorb it, then the Snake Lake would probably be overflowing and there would be enough overflow on the Snake to give plenty of irrigation water. If the weather conditions were such that the moisture would be in an east as melted it was uncertain when that moisture would eventually drain off by aprils in the foothills so as to be used for irrigation.

The Granges feel very grateful to Mr. Bradley for the interest he is taking in the irrigation problems of the North Side tract. The watermaster, Mr. Stocking, was also present and aided in presenting the water problems to the Granges. A number of the visiting patrons gave instructive talks.

The musical part of the program was enjoyed by all. Miss Mary Howland favored the audience with three piano solos and the Misses Elliott and Hughes played two beautiful piano violin duets.

Mr. Robinson gave a short talk on the short system four mill and the alfalfa feed mill.

Mr. H. C. Vandell declined to speak owing to the lateness of the hour. The committee on refreshments served an excellent feed in cafeteria style.

DEMISE BOU

Predicts He Will Put Champion Out in Six Rounds— Dempsey Laughs

NEW YORK, March 24.—George Carpenter, the champion heavyweight of Europe, landed here today from the French liner La Savoie and immediately declared that he was anxious to meet Jack Dempsey at any time at any place, preferably as soon as possible.

"And I think I can defeat Dempsey in six rounds," declared the Frenchman. "Dempsey is the rushing style of fighter with whom I have always been successful in the past."

Carpenter was met at the docks by Tex Rickard, the promoter, and Jack Curley, under whose tutelage Carpenter will now fight, and in some theatrical engagements. Several hundred "flat caps" movie men, actors, managers and others formed a reception committee to greet the Frenchman and gave him a rousing welcome.

Carpenter looks more like an actor than a fighter. He is dapper, although well built. He said today he weighs 172 pounds at present.

"I am very happy to come to the United States," he said. "I have always had great admiration and respect for the Americans."

"But why don't you ask me if I am happily married?" he queried through an interpreter, and answered the question himself, saying, "I don't believe any one is happier than I am today."

"I am glad the voyage is over," he said, "and I had some very bad weather and I was seasick during the first three days."

"Yes, I want to meet Jack Dempsey and that as soon as possible. I don't care where the bout is held, if it is in the world's champion's home, I will defend it at least once, and I believe can defeat the champion in about six rounds."

Asked what he thought of American boxers, he said:

"American boxers are very aggressive and some of them are very clever. I would rather box a good American fighter, like Dempsey, than a English fighter."

Decamps, manager of Carpenter, announced that just before sailing from France he signed a new contract with Cochrane, the British agent, which binds the French boxer to box for him until December 31 of this year. The contract stipulates that Cochrane must employ Dempsey's services.



Though Cochrane's contract with Carpenter is binding until the end of the year, the French boxer must meet Dempsey in a bout promoted by Tex Rickard or any other promoter who obtains the signature of the world's champion. It is understood in connection with Cochrane.

LOS ANGELES, March 24.—Jack Dempsey, world's heavyweight champion, laughed when he was told that Georges Carpenter said that he expected to beat the champion in six rounds.

"If Carpenter is as good a fighter as he is a leader, then he can defeat me," said Dempsey. "I feel sure I will beat Carpenter, but I have never predicted as to how long it would take. I can't believe Carpenter expects to stop me in six rounds. If he does expect to, then he is due to be disappointed. I have no thought of being beaten in any certain number of rounds. I hope they pull the fight at the earliest possible moment."

ASKS REPEAL LEVER ACT
WASHINGTON, March 22.—A joint resolution repealing the Lever act was introduced in the senate this afternoon by Senator Gore of Oklahoma.

"The Lever act is a war measure," Senator Gore said. "I think it is time to start cleaning up on all war legislation."

The bill was referred to the senate committee on agriculture.

ARREST HOT LEADER
TOPEKA, Kans., March 22.—Reputation of Robert Hill, alleged leader of the Elaine, Arkansas race riot, locked by Governor Brown of Arkansas today was refused by Governor Allen.

Hill was immediately arrested on a federal warrant charging impersonation of a government official.

WASHINGTON, March 22.—A bill authorizing the United States grain corporation to furnish 5,000,000 bushels of flour in European countries for relief food was passed without opposition by the senate this afternoon.

The measure was passed by the house March 17. It now goes to the president.

DUCHESS GETS HER FINE
LONDON, March 22.—The Duchess of Marlborough (formerly Consuelo Vanderbilt of New York) was granted a decree today for the restitution of conjugal rights. The Duke and Duchess have lived apart for some years. They were married in 1895.

The decree obtained today is the first step toward a divorce under the English law. It is expected that the Duchess shortly will file for final action.

SAFE IS BLOWN
LINCOLN, Neb., March 22.—The safe of the First National Bank of Greenwood, Neb., twenty miles north-east of Lincoln, was blown open and robbed of \$104,300 in liberty bonds and \$400 in cash by rogues last night, according to telephone advice received here early this morning.

The robbers cut all the telephone lines and telegraph lines out of town and made their escape on a hand car.

WASHINGTON RATIFIES TODAY
OLYMPIA, Wash., March 22.—The Washington state legislature will ratify the federal woman suffrage amendment today, making the thirty-first state necessary for ratification. No doubt is felt as to the result of the voting. Washington granted women suffrage in its state in 1910 and was the critical state which carried a landslide in favor of woman suffrage.

WE DON'T NEED ANY MORE
WASHINGTON, March 22.—The senate today unanimously adopted a resolution calling on the president to state if the Island of Yap has been ceded to Japan by the allies, as reported, and if so what action the United States has taken on it.

The resolution was introduced by Senator Lodge, republican of Massachusetts.

WOMAN ON COMMISSION
WASHINGTON, March 22.—President Wilson today sent to the senate the nomination of Mrs. Helen Gardner to be a member of the civil service commission, vice Galloway, resigned.

Mrs. Gardner is widely known as the authoress and magazine writer and has been a prominent suffrage worker. Her appointment is the first of a woman to the civil service commission.

Mrs. Gardner's home is in Washington.

WOULD REQUIRE MAJORITY ONLY
WASHINGTON, March 22.—Ratification of treaties by the senate by a majority instead of a two thirds vote was provided in a constitutional amendment proposed by Senator Owen Democrat, Oklahoma, in the senate this afternoon.

Under the Owen amendment "the president would have power by and with the advice of the senate to frame treaties and with the consent of the senate, a majority of the senators concurring therein to include the same."

WASHINGTON, March 22.—"I am not a candidate and will not seek the nomination," declared William G. Meadon here late this afternoon when he had lunched with President Wilson. The statement was in reply to persistent rumors that Meadon was about to announce his candidacy.

"I wish that the American people could understand that I am sincere when I say I am not a candidate," Meadon said.

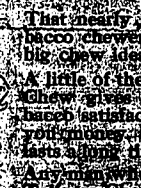
