SUDDEN SWEEP OF BLIZZARDS LEAVES TRAIL OF SUFFERING

Middle West and South Hard Hit by Late Storms

NOT PREPARED FOR COLD WAVE

Traffic and Communication in Many Districts Halted by Snow Drifts

(CHICAGO, April 5.—The entire middle west today is shivering in the wake of a "white Easter" blizzard that proved to be one of the worst storms of the winter. Coming unexpectedly from the Texas Panhandle and driven by a 50-mile gale, the storm piled this section of the country high with "snow drifts," seriously crippled railroad service, greatly interfered with telephone and telegraph communication and caused great suffering among hundreds of families caught with their winter supply of coal exhausted.

In Chicago, all transportation and communication service was seriously crippled. There was no Easter-day fashion parade yesterday, fashionable residents of the city attending church in Christmas gowns.

(LINCOLN, Neb., April 5.—Little damage was done by the unexpected snowstorm that descended upon Lincoln and southeastern Nebraska early Saturday, which continued until early Sunday morning.

(BALTIMORE, Md., April 5.—All April low temperature records in the Kansas wheat belt were smashed today, when six above zero was registered. The blizzard, which was not an attack, protected by efficient tactics of snow, is believed to have escaped injury.

(INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., April 5.—Northern and central Indiana today is "recording" from the worst Easter blizzard known in this section of the country. Accompanied by driving storm winds to ten miles an hour, it is the extreme northern part of the state and light snow fall continued in Indianapolis until early today.

Easter Day Is Met By Strife Instead of Peace

EASTERTIDE, the season that is supposed to be symbolic of peace on earth and good will to mankind, was ushered in with reports of strife and turbulence from all quarters of Europe. A new wave of violence is sweeping Ireland and the torch is being applied to public and private buildings throughout the island. British troops are being held in readiness for an armed uprising. Revolutionary rumblings are shaking Denmark. Eleven persons were reported wounded at Copenhagen in fighting between the police and communists. Fresh troubles are threatened in western Germany by the decision of the French government to occupy Frankfurt, Homburg, Darmstadt and Hanau with troops. The Ruhr district of Prussia is already seething with warfare and the extension of occupation of German soil by French troops may cause new complications. The Russian Bolsheviks are engaged in battle with the Poles and while the offensive has settled into a lull on some parts of the great front heavy fighting was reported in the Vohlynian zone. Turkey is described as a "volcano" with the nationalists carrying on ceaseless agitations against the allies in an effort to inflame the Moslem population to war. The workers in Italy are restive and are in a combative mood.

IRISH UPRISING THAT OF TORCH, NOT OF ARMS

Conflagrations Break Out in Every Section of Island in Retaliation of British Display of Troops to Awe People

(DUBLIN, April 5.—The threatened Easter revolt of the Sinn Fein in Ireland developed today into a rioting with the torch instead of the rifle. Conflagrations were reported from all parts of Ireland today, one hundred and government buildings were burned by the Sinn Fein in retaliation for the British military display. Among the buildings destroyed were police barracks, buildings of the Royal Irish Constabulary which the Sinn Fein had occupied. Republicans attacked and raked 21 British army stations in Ireland, burning the official records. The general postoffice announced that all the wires in the north of Ireland had been cut. Ten police stations in County Kerry were among those destroyed by fire. The courthouse at Ballybourn and the barracks at Drogheda were burned. The revenue office at Mullingar in County Westmeath was raided. In Baltimore, Stonyford and elsewhere the barracks were destroyed after the constables and their families had been turned out. Dunsink barracks and destroyed them. Cordons of police were thrown on the main roads of County Donegal and Tyrone to search all vehicles for incendiaries.

(Stratford, in County Tyrone (Ulster province) the Sinn Fein flag was hoisted by the town and in other places throughout the town. Crowds thronged the streets and many persons snatched the flag.

England Will Probably Not Join The French in Ruhr

(LONDON, April 5.—The British government probably will decline to cooperate with the French in the occupation of Frankfurt, Darmstadt, Wiesbaden and other cities in the Ruhr district of Germany, according to the Daily Express today. The British government is said to hold the view that the situation in the Ruhr district is a military intervention by the allies.

Cheap Help in Austria Since Exchange Drop

(VIENNA, April 5.—The Austrian krona has fallen to low value that the state chancellor, Dr. Karl Renner, got less than a dollar a day in American money, according to the rate of exchange today. His pay is fifty thousand kronen yearly. Most Austrians earn less than 1,000 kronen per month. The state has had to raise the price of wheat from five thousand to eighteen thousand kronen. A pair of shoes costs 1,500 kronen, while a kilogram of beef costs a worker ten weeks' wages.

Strikers Sued in Denver By the Builders

(DENVER, April 5.—A bitter and long drawn out legal battle in Denver labor circles is predicted by the announcement that the Denver suits will be instituted today by the Master Builders Association against striking members of the Building Trades Council, an employees organization of building craft workers. Master Builders allege that, carrying their case to the courts, an strike for 31 days ago, have violated an agreement reached between an executive committee of the union and the employers that the present wage scale would continue in effect until June 1.

Nine Insane Criminals at Large in East

(CHESTER, Ill., April 5.—Prisoners are awaiting the trial of the state today for nine insane criminals of the worst type, who are being held in the Chester state penitentiary for the crime of murder last Sunday night. A reign of terror exists in the neighborhood with the frightened wives and children of the farmers remaining in tightly barred farm houses.

The roads hit by the strike are the St. Paul, Northwestern, Great Northern, Illinois Central, Chicago, Burlington and Quincy, Grand Trunk, Rock Island, Chicago, Indiana Harbor Belt Line, Michigan Central and Pennsylvania.

"JAZZ TUNES" PLAYED BY WIRELESS

Army Man Invents Device to Send Music Through Air. Test Is Successful.

ATLANTA, Ga., April 5.—Means of sending music by wireless telephone, probably the first in the history of this form of communication, was demonstrated to the jolly strains of "Baronacht" today when a wireless telephone, which is being marketed by the inventor, was tested.

The inventor, necessitates the listener using a head set to hear, but Sergeant Brass is seeking to perfect an arrangement of sound, which will enable an audience assembled at a designated place to enjoy music from a distance without equipping themselves with individual trappings.

The demonstration was started at 7:30 o'clock when all radio stations in Atlanta were called and told to listen. As soon as complete communication Brass sent "Baronacht" to the listener. All were asked to report back what they heard with the result that the success of the invention was assured.

Several calls were made concerning the idea of a radio concert in this manner.

A station in Alabama that is using "speaking terms" with "Tech" Station has been having a very satisfactory result in hearing a conversation on the wireless telephone some time ago. After having the message repeated several times, the Alabama operator instructed to "sing it." Sergeant Brass, who has spent twenty-five years in the army and whose story days are not images of the past, declined to vocateer in the manner suggested, but promised to get a phonograph for him.

"You know," he said, "the idea struck me that it might actually be tried if I had a very powerful secondary transmitter, but it wouldn't be concentrated on the diaphragm of the work. Not enough sound could be transmitted. Then I got to work and fixed it."

When Sergeant Brass actually "sang" he was using a very simple program for a two-step amplifier to resolve set. This was done only after several weeks of experimenting and hard work on the part of the inventor. The work was kept strictly secret until the initial "try-out" was given at the Atlanta station where it was started. The transmitter set up and wireless music.

On hearing the music, one of the local stations promised to entertain with a dance, the music to be furnished by radio. 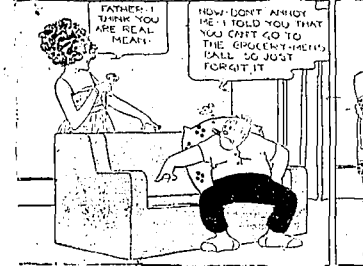

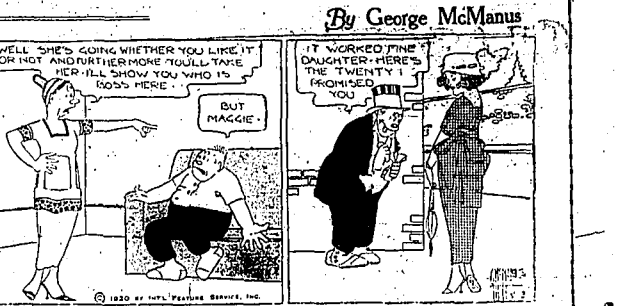
