## French Occupy Five Cities In The German Neutral Zone

### WORLD IS AT PEACE— ONLY TWENTY WARS RAGING AT PRESENT

America Completing Its Third Year of the War

### 17,000 YANKS ARE STILL ON RHINE

More Than Sixty War-time Laws Still in Effect— Taxes Are Still Soaring

WASHINGTON, April 6.—American today completes its third year of war.

The United States on the third anniversary of its declaration of war against the imperial German Empire finds itself technically, by far, struggling for freedom from the snarls of Mars despite the fact that hostilities ceased on the western front nearly 17 months ago.

The treaty of Versailles, rejected by the senate in the hands of President Wilson and with slight chance of any further action upon it in the year future. A resolution, declaring the war at an end and before the house of representatives, but it faces certain veto by the president.

World peace—one of the prime objectives of the entrance of the United States into the war—appears to be only an idle hope for the future. The military intelligence division of the war department has information that 20 wars which are being fought through the world.

More than 20 war-time laws are still in force, 20 of which are considered of great importance to the every day life of the American people.

There are 17,533 American soldiers in Europe, more than 17,000 of these are still on the western front.

Twenty-two vessels of the United States navy, with a personnel of more than 2000 men, are still permanently assigned to duty in European waters.

## United States Has Not Filed Rhine Protest

WASHINGTON, April 6.—The United States has not made any formal protest against the French occupation of cities in the neutral zone of Germany. It was officially announced today.

This statement followed Secretary Colby's refusal to comment on reports that the protest had gone forward. Secretary Colby did not meet the newspaper in the usual newspaper conference.

## No Resistance Encountered and Maneuver Is Carried Out Quietly—Allies May Help

### ENGLAND SAID TO HAVE REVERSED DISAPPROVAL AND WILL AID OCCUPATION—REPORT FOCH ACTED AS SURPRISE TO CABINET AND TENSE SITUATION RESULTS

PARIS, April 6.—French troops, under orders from Marshal Foch, moved swiftly into the German neutral zone and occupied five German cities today.

Frankfort and Darmstadt were entered at 5 o'clock, Homburg and Dieburg, were occupied at 9 o'clock. The French were under orders to take over Hanau at noon.

Early reports indicated that the various occupations were accomplished without any opposition from the Germans.

The Reichswehr, (German government troops) which were stationed in the zones about the five German towns were under orders from Berlin to retire at the approach of the French. They did so, according to authentic advices.

When the French entered Frankfort they found only the local police on duty and no soldiers in the streets.

There were some Reichswehr battalions at Darmstadt when the French arrived, but they quickly withdrew ten kilometers (between six and seven miles) from the town.

BERLIN, April 6.—After Wilhelm Mayer, German chargé d'affaires at Paris, reported today that he had received a note from Premier Millerand stating that French troops occupying Frankfort, Hanau, Darmstadt, Homburg and Dieburg, and will end on the German troops are withdrawn from the Ruhr district.

LONDON, April 6.—One hundred thousand French troops are being moved forward from the Rhine into the German neutral zone by Marshal Foch according to a report current here today.

It is regarded as significant that the Daily Express which is close to a home law, stated this morning that France would not move her troops from the Rhine without official approval.

The most reliable source it is learned that the advance order by Marshal Foch took the cabinet by surprise and may result in a tense diplomatic situation.

## German Troops Are Moving To Ruhr District

### Reign of Terror Reported With Slaughter by Reds by Government Army

LONDON, April 6.—A battle between German troops and Red forces in the Ruhr district is reported to have broken out in the Ruhr district.

Heavy fighting developed at several points where the Reds offered stout resistance.

According to an official statement given out at Berlin 200 men were killed in fighting around Weidenau. In Weidenau the Reds made a desperate attack against the station at that place.

German regulars are advancing rapidly and are taking in prisoners. They have already cleared Caenen and Laun, two important railway towns of armed workers, said another statement issued at Berlin.

The Central News correspondent at Copenhagen reports that the German troops are retreating along the Ruhr line to strongly fortified positions.

## JAPS AND RUSSIANS FIGHTING BITTERLY IN NORTHERN SIBERIA

### Vladivostok Is Seized and Japs Disarm Russians

### CLAIM RUSSIANS FORCED MATTERS Effort: Being Made Toward Settlement and Cessation of Hostilities

WASHINGTON, April 6.—Japanese forces now are engaged in bitter fighting at Nikolai and Kharinosk, north of Vladivostok, according to advices from the military staff of the Japanese embassy here this afternoon.

The Japanese forces in Vladivostok have threatened to withdraw from the city. Negotiations are under way for a peaceful settlement of differences between the two nations.

According to the proclamation of the Japanese government under date of March 17 negotiations between the Russian authorities at Vladivostok and the Japanese authorities with a view to securing upon a program of cooperation—was progressing very favorably, when upon April 5 a sudden aggressive action by a part of the Russian army forced a battle with Japanese troops at Vladivostok and Nikolai and Kharinosk.

LONDON, April 6.—A report that Japanese troops had seized Vladivostok and the foreign office was without confirmation.

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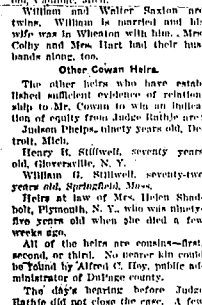

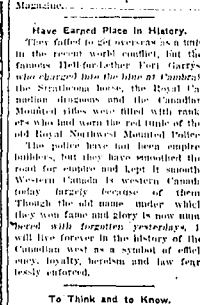

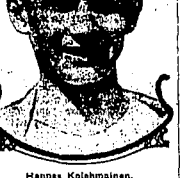

# DERBY OFFERS FORTUNE TO WINNER

 NEW YORK, April 8.—With the classic Kentucky Derby enriched by the raising of added money to \$100,000, which makes the race worth something like \$200,000, and other big stakes increased all along the line, a colt that could sweep the boards in the three-year-old class this year would win a handsome fortune for his owner.

Man o' War, S. D. Hildreth's 1919 champion two-year-old, has the earmarks of some such a colt, but his chances of breaking and records for winnings as a three-year-old have been greatly decreased because he is not among the entries for the Kentucky Derby, nor for the Latonia Stakes, worth \$100,000, to be run in October.

Sibon's winnings in 1916, amounting to upward of \$120,000, constituted the largest total in the history of the sport at that time, but the fact that his owner does not intend to hurry him by running him in the Derby, but stands a chance of bettering Sir Barton's earnings of \$85,250, and his performances will be watched with a great deal of interest by the owners, because he showed that something which indicates that he may be just as great in the three-year-old class as he was last year.

Man o' War is being trained for the Kentucky Derby, the Belmont and the Preakness, and the total prize money that he will receive there will be run before the meeting of the Kentucky Derby.

A really great campaigner, however, could make a veritable killing for his owner. There is a total prize money of \$100,000 in the Derby, in some ten races by three-year-olds, and this without stepping from the track at any time during the year.

Man o' War is being trained for the Derby by last year. If there was a colt with his class and the campaigning qualities of Spendthrift, his prize money would be \$100,000 in a two-year-old might easily be performed.

The Kentucky Derby is a "phenomenal performance." In the absence of Man o' War, the nominee of Harry Payne Whitney, New York millionaire-breeder, are being given considerable attention. Among the horses from which James Hove will select Man o' War's successor in the Derby are John P. Grier, Upret, Wildcat, Danamak, Amasa, Levathan, Cabana, Almonson and Dr. Clark. John P. Grier train will be sent to the post a favorite in the Derby, with Man o' War's name in the stable. John P. Grier was sent to the post five times last season and finished worse than second, placing three of his four starts.

Damak is another likely longshot. Derby candidate, along with Golden Rule, P. Grier, Upret, Amasa, Westwood, Constance, High Command and several others.

Though many colts, geldings and fillies are included in the list of one hundred nominees recently announced by the Kentucky Jockey Club, tradition favors the colts. The filly and five geldings have won the classic since it was inaugurated in 1875, while Omar, Khayyam, the 1917 winner, ranked as the most important animal to win the great stake.

Miss Jimmie, out of Hildreth's money, ranked as the best mare winner of 1919 next to Man o' War. She won eight out of twelve starts and took down \$20,000 for her owner, E. Hove.
