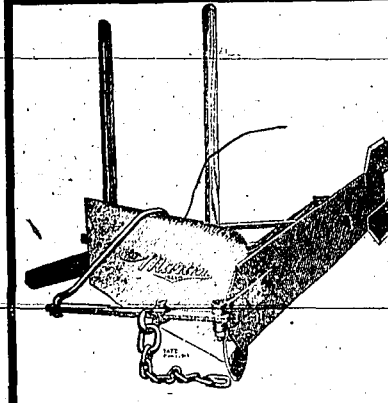

FRENCH PREMIUM ON CHILDREN

The French government is taking a Rooseveltian attitude regarding large families. The new inheritance tax puts a premium on children. If a man dies without offspring, the state will take 50 per cent of his estate. If there is one child, the inheritance tax will be 33 per cent; if two children, 25 per cent; if three 18.34 per cent; if more than three, nothing at all.

This arrangement is sure to appeal strongly to the thrifty French, who strive more than any other people, perhaps, to build up family estates and leave as large a heritage as possible for their children. This very characteristic has been most responsible for the extraordinary blooming of French families to two children.

So France proceeds to put into effect, in this and other ways, the biggest lesson she learned from the war. There was a time when there were more French than Germans. France limited her population while Germany multiplied hers. It was this numerical superiority that gave Germany her great opportunity and advantage.

THE BUSY AIRPLANE

In Arizona new uses for aircraft are being discovered almost daily. In one locality a progressive mine owner enters prospective investors out to look over the mines by providing an airplane for the 20-mile trip.

In Yuma county it is said that an airplane is being used for examining lands bought or leased from the state.

A plane with a carrying capacity of one ton is to be used to land asbestos from mines located far back in a rugged mountain region. The expense of wagon hauling, which necessitates good wagon roads, is very heavy, and the road building is very difficult. It is thought that the airplane can make a number of complete trips every day, depositing its load of asbestos at the nearest railroad at comparatively small cost.

At present this must require a safe landing place both at the mines and at the railway depot. When an airplane has been perfected which can start from and land in a small restricted area with comfort and safety to machine and driver, still further commercial uses for aircraft in rugged, dangerous regions will be found. The possibilities seem to be unlimited.
