LOCAL TWIN FALLS IS CHOSEN AS LEADER FOR IDAHO

Twin Falls Is State Headquarters for American Forced General Strike Hangs on Meeting of Railroad Men--Government May Intervene

JAPAN AID OF FRENCH INVASION PROMISED

Bracken Is Dark Horse in Contest Between North and East

KELLOGG TO GET NEXT CONVENTION

The selection of Lewis P. Bracken, local banker, as state commander and of Twin Falls as state headquarters for the coming year, the second annual convention of the Idaho Department, American Legion, closed yesterday afternoon. Kellogg won the next convention after an inter-sectional contest that was related not only to the election of the place for 1921, but which also affected the election of a department commander, bringing the Twin Falls men out on a full horse--compromise--between the northern and eastern districts of the state.

The final session yesterday developed the most of the action. Besides the organization work, the convention recorded its disapproval of the cash bonus in the form and its refusal to attempt to outwangle the legion in politics by defeating resolutions condemning the Nonpartisan League and commending the New York assembly for ousting the Socialists. A decisive majority voted to issue the following resolutions:

Kellogg's election as commander was the outgrowth of the Kallgren-Idaho Falls contest, for the next convention to be held at Pocatello, with the Boise candidate in the exchange for support of Kellogg for the next convention, caused the south-east district to form an alliance with Kellogg for the northern nomination. A result of the combination was that Kellogg was asked to put up a candidate. Previously Taylor was the local candidate in the event Kellogg was not chosen.

It was offered by the local post but when the developments eventually drew the Twin Falls men into the contest, it was selected, principally because of its defense of the Twin Falls post from charges of padding membership lists and because of his work on the last committee.

On the first ballot Bracken elected one vote of a majority but a second ballot was held and Bracken received 14 1/2 for Worthington. On the first ballot 11 votes were cast for Frank Estabrook ofampa and 7 for Lawrence Collins. In the second ballot Bracken was given 41 and Worthington 14.

Eight Allied Unions to Vote on Rebel Move and Decide Official Action

WASHINGTON, April 10.--Confidential information received here today indicates danger of a forced general strike extending to every railroad trade and that an attempt will be made to set up a national system in the nation, notwithstanding efforts of the railroad union chiefs to prevent it.

Everything depends on the action taken by the convention of the railway employees department of the American Federation of Labor, which opens in Kansas City next Monday, made up of delegates from the Switchmen's Union of North America, the Brotherhood of Railroad Clerks, and the iron stop craft unions.

The convention will make either a declaration against the present strike and take disciplinary measures against the members who are participating in it, or it will authorize a general strike.

INDUSTRIES SUFFER FROM RAIL TIE-UP

Pittsburg, New England, Pacific Coast and Other Districts Are Badly Crippled

PITTSBURGH, Pa., April 10.--One of the greatest industrial tie-ups in the history of the Pittsburgh district, even greater than that which occurred during the steel and coal strikes in 1919, has occurred in the railroad strike. Industrial leaders here declared today.

BOSTON, April 10.--In the face of a general freight embargo by large eastern railroads connecting with New England lines, the district today was confronted with the possibility of a serious food shortage through the strike of "rebel" trainmen in Boston. It is said to be less than two weeks supply of food.

DETROIT, April 10.--The freight tie-up is complete in this city as a result of the strike of 15,000 yard switchmen and the forcing into idleness of 1000 yard engines and Detroit authorities are setting about the task of securing supplies of food and other necessities that are needed at this time.

CHICAGO, April 10.--Definite signs of a break in the railway yard strike which for a week past has paralyzed freight traffic of Chicago and the middle west were today noted from officials of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul road announced that the freight embargo on their line probably would be lifted Monday.

It was plain that there was a disposition on the part of the officials to forestall government action as long as possible.

NEW YORK, April 10.--The "outlaw" strike among railroad workers spread rapidly here today and by noon had cut the freight and passenger volume on every road entering New York in a chaotic condition.

The tie-up, however, was fairly complete. Confirmed, first to the freight division, it spread rapidly to the passenger department and the forenoon the Pennsylvania railroad took the lead among the other roads by posting no deliveries through the Pennsylvania and two stations which had tickets would be sold subject to delay.

One Washington train and two Pittsburg express were cancelled by the Pennsylvania because the train crews failed to show up. The situation in New York was particularly difficult, because 2000 of the Hudson tug and through hundreds of thousands of New Jersey residences were cut off from the city and a strike the morning.

United States Has Not Announced Views of Situation

SEEK HARMONY AMONG ALLIES

AMBASSADOR COUNCIL TALKS OVER

WASHINGTON, April 10.--The United States will make no public announcement of its attitude toward the Ruhr valley situation, it was officially stated today.

PARIS, April 10.--Japan will support the French advance from the Rhine and the occupation of the German neutral zone by French troops, the Journal stated today.

The French government has received a note from Washington containing America's view point on the German occupation of the Ruhr district and the French occupation of the neutral zone. The Journal stated that the communication reiterates the position taken in the note of March 28, stating that the French should be authorized to intervene in the neutral zone if intervention is absolutely necessary, but that no intervention should extend between the Ruhr district and the occupation of Frankfurt and other cities.

An official report was current that France will be willing to withdraw her troops from Frankfurt providing the allies unite in a strong note to Germany threatening military action unless the Reichswehr evacuates the Ruhr district within a stated period.

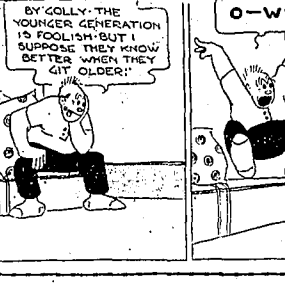
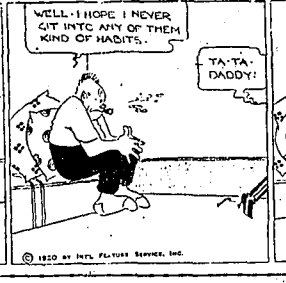

COMPERS ON UNION WAGE

Believing that it is "a matter of good common sense and good business to get a clear idea as possible of how the other fellow looks at the proposition," the editors of System sent an interviewer with 10 questions concerning labor problems to Samuel Compers. The answers indicate what Mr. Compers would do were he an employer in active business.

One of the public's chief indignations against union leadership has been that in setting a standard wage it forced the employer to pay the poor workers and the good workers alike. Besides being obviously unfair, this system has seemed to tend toward decreased production. There was of course a question hanging up this situation. Mr. Compers' answer, supposedly setting forth true union principles, denies this indictment. In part, he said:

"The union wage is a minimum wage, and it is arrived at as being in the nature of a safeguard against paying a man of evident skill less than a certain amount for his day. But, however erroneous may be some of the opinions on the subject, wages are paid out of the production and out of nothing else. Therefore, those who, in the name of unions, oppose the introduction of better methods of work are entering to ignorance and not to union principles.

"I should pay my wages on performance, and I should have a committee of the union with whom I could arrange the fair content of the day's work and thus guard against piece-work.

"If the union wage is to be regarded as a minimum it must be translated into a minimum amount of work, and that minimum amount of work is a matter on which the parties can fairly cooperate.

"Having fixed upon the minimum amount of work, I should arrange to pay my people in proportion to the amount of work they did above the standard—not at all in the way of a bonus, not as a gift, and not charitably; but with a mutual recognition of the fact, if he then does 20 articles a day the employer can well afford to pay the worker who produces 100 per cent more, 100 per cent more wages, because the overhead expense remains just the same.

"If the standards were fixed by the men themselves or by the union officers, they would be fairly fixed, and those who could not attain these mutually agreed upon standards would very properly be discharged.

To many persons this is a new view of the union wage. If employers and public and union men themselves accepted and acted upon such a principle there would be no further quarrel with it.

INSPECTOR TELLS FARMERS HOW TO SPRAY ORCHARDS

The local horticultural inspector, has submitted the following advice to the farmer for the spraying of his orchard:

Minimum requirements per acre of 250 degrees blue sulphur.

2000 GALLONS SULPHUR

Trees 2 years old - 50 tons to the acre, 20 gallon spray.
50 tons to the acre, 21 gallon spray.
70 tons to the acre, 27 gallon spray.

FRUIT INSPECTOR POINTS OUT NEED FOR SPRAYING

By J. A. WATERS

I have grown good orchards for many years and as common sense and ordinary business intelligence tells them they should, from the market value of the fruit and the duty to his neighbor.

We have plenty of examples of clean orchards, orchards that were properly sprayed in past years. The pest are scarce in them. We have also the other kind, those whose owners did not spray. These latter are the ones where the big expense will be necessary this year. One dollar spent in spraying this year will save you two or perhaps four dollars next year.

I do not wish to use harsh measures, but my instructions from the authorities at Boise are definite and positive and I intend to follow them to the letter. If any case should arise in which I, with my assistants, cannot enforce the law, it will be referred to the attorney general for his opinion.

I do not wish to institute legal proceedings for the "Abatement of a Nuisance." I appeal to all who have the welfare of the community in which they live at heart and who expect to be classed with law abiding citizens to get out of their spraying and when they are profitable return from their fruit.

It may be a drastic law, drastic in the sense that it is a law that threatens the Twin Falls fruit trade having singularly other branches of the local economy. Other branches have been spared from fruiting San Jose scale, Red Spider, Brown San Jose, Twineborer, codling moth and most other destructive insects. Spraying six times a season for Codling Moth and San Jose scale, and other insects, is a large expense of early money. Healthy trees, the most profitable, saleable fruit of eastern and southern states, are in many parts of the west. We have had codling moth and have a leaf hatched wasp attempted to hold them in check. They are getting more plentiful. The San Jose scale, probably the most destructive of all the enemies of fruit, is here. It has been found, though not in large numbers, in every part of the country. It multiplies by the million. Birds and insects carry it from tree to tree and from orchard to orchard and it not only kills the trees but also the fruit. It is not only the fruit that is killed, but also the tree itself, and finally to die.

Twin Falls district shipped a million dollars worth of fruit out of this county in 1919. 272 acres of commercial apple orchards, 279 acres of the small peach orchards, 177 acres of commercial nut orchards and 2244 acres of domestic orchards, and the trees are in their infancy. The yield is doubling up from year to year. It is not only the fruit that is killed, but also the tree itself, and finally to die.

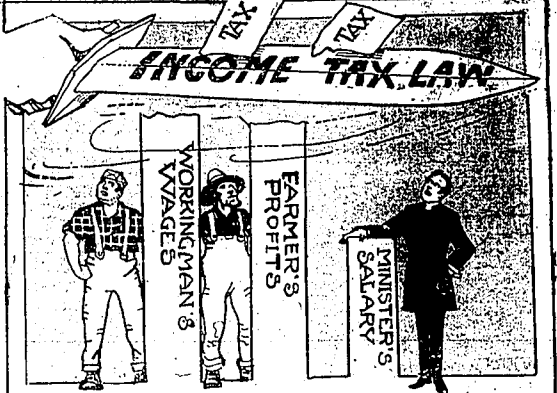
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Only 1671 out of 170,000 Ministers Pay Income Tax

DEAD-TOWN IS ALWAYS SHUNNED

Community With Such a Reputation Suffers as From a Pestilence.

RESTS WITH THE CITIZENS

People Can Create and Maintain Prosperity If They Will Keep Their Money at Home in Circulation.

"Stay away from that town. It's a dead one."
Do you want that to be said of your town? Of course you don't, for you wish, as a matter of local pride, for no other reason, to have your town stand high in the estimation of the world. But are you sure that you are doing everything in your power to place your town in the position which you wish to occupy? That is the question that every person should ask himself or herself at frequent intervals.

When things are running smoothly, when times are good, and when it is fairly easy to make a good living for the wife and kiddies, it is so easy for a man to forget that these things do not come to a town as a matter of course, but are the result of the right kind of effort on the part of the citizens of the community. It is so easy for a man to grow careless and think that because this condition existed it will continue to exist without any effort on his part or that of the other residents of the community. That is why it is important for every one to stop and think seriously once in a while about what it would mean to him if the prosperity that makes life worth while for his family should take wings and fly away.

Nobody Leaves a Dead Town.
Nobody likes to live in a dead town. No one ever likes what a dead town is. That is why you sometimes hear that warning, "Stay away from that town. It's a dead one." The town which has the reputation of being a dead one suffers as if from a pestilence. Business men seeking new locations will have none of it. The live traveling salesman, even, will give it a wide berth. Those who live in it will get away, they can.

When a town is live and prosperous, local business is good, real estate values are high and stable, labor is in demand and wages are reasonable. The streets are well lighted, the residents and their property are protected, fire

company and fire departments are maintained for the protection of the children. When a town is dead, there is little money in circulation, store buildings stand empty with "For Sale" signs hanging on the front door, there is little employment for the laboring class, the streets are dark, the schools are crippled.

What sort of town do you want to live in? There is only one answer to this question. You want to live in a live town and enjoy all the good things that come to the residents of such a community.

Answer Easily Found.
The only question then is as to how these prosperous conditions can be created or maintained and it is the easiest thing in the world to find the answer to that question.

If the people of a community will keep their money at home and keep it in circulation among themselves, they need have no fear of ever being compelled to live in a dead town. If the people will patronize their own business men instead of sending their dollars for the mail order houses, the prosperity of the community will take care of itself.

The local stores, to a very large extent, do not buy any goods from the outside. The taxes paid by the business men of the community are the practical support of the schools and public institutions. It is the taxes paid by the storekeepers, to a large extent, that make possible the public improvements, the fire protection, the street lighting and the many other things which make a town worth living in. The mail order houses does not buy any taxes in the town from which it gets its money. It does not help to support the schools or the churches. It does not help to light the streets or maintain the fire department. It is the aim of the mail order houses to drive small town merchants out of business, so that they will be compelled to send to the cities for their merchandise and they are spending thousands of dollars every month to accomplish this purpose. If they should succeed, who would pay the taxes that are now paid for the local merchants? It is certainly that the mail order houses would not buy them.

Issue is Clear Cut.
Every dollar spent at home helps to make the town a live one. Every dollar sent away from home to the mail order house helps to make the town a dead one.

The issue is a clear-cut one and is squarely up to every resident of the community, whether a resident of the town itself or of the country surrounding it. The man who does not care whether the town is a live or a dead town, if there is such a man, need have no thought on the subject, but the man who wishes to live in a live town cannot get away from the fact that it is up to him to make his town a live one or a dead one.
