

EXILES BRING TYPHUS TO SERBIA

Russian Refugees Arrive at Belgrade After Perilous Adventures

BELGRADE, April 10.—Serbia today is facing the grave typhus menace encountered since the armistice. Great numbers of typhus-infected refugees from the scattered armies of Serbia have reached Belgrade in the past six weeks and spread contagion through a score of towns and villages. The authorities, who are unable to cope with the situation, have appealed urgently to the American Red Cross Commission here, which, under the direction of Lieutenant-Colonel F. E. Hartman, M. C., U. S. A., is initiating a strenuous campaign to alleviate the danger.

One such party numbering 50 Russians officers, accompanied by their families, and consisting of men, women, children, and dependents, the black priests of the Russian church, and scores of persons of title and distinction recently reached Belgrade. They came unannounced, traveling for days across Serbian territory, avoiding typhus contagion as they went.

The story of their flight from the routes ranks of Serbia's defeated army cross South Russia to Belgrade through the Black Sea to Odessa, then through Bulgaria where they

crossed into Serbia, bringing their wives and families, was told by Lieutenant-General Chackmaroff, the spokesman for the leader of the disengaged party.

Teaching Odessa, safely, they arranged to embark immediately on the first vessel leaving port. As the party of officers at that time had been mustered into the army, accompanied by several hundred women and children of their families, hurried on the gangplank in the waiting vessel, a contingent of the regulars took possession of the ship and opened fire with a battery of machine guns. A wild scene of panic ensued.

The ship's captain immediately weighed anchor and put out to sea full speed. The British and French naval forces sent to intercept them took them on board. Some of those who reached the city in time were wounded. General Chackmaroff stated that many families were divided, husbands being left on the vessel, while the wife and children were separated. Fathers and fathers before them, or with their children remained in the ship-wrecked crowd at the quay-side. General Chackmaroff said also that when he was a boy his daughters used to fish with him, and the daughter had been left behind. The old officer arrived at Belgrade, (he, many of his companions, half crazed) with grief.



YOUR CHILD'S FUTURE

The school situation is not a joke. Talk about it in newspapers and magazines is not mere propaganda for slight increase of salary for teachers. At the risk of boring its readers, every newspaper with a sense of public duty is obliged to harp on the fact that the actual situation as it exists today all over the country is a national menace.

If the child of today is to become the useful citizen of tomorrow, he must have schooling today. The actual number of classes—not children, but classes from thirty to seventy children each—which will have no teacher at next year is not less than 50,000. The number of classes now being taught—and the number will be greater next year—by inexperienced teachers, untrained, half competent, who have been given emergency certificates to teach, is 120,000.

Only on-fifth of all the teachers in the country have had training equal to two years beyond the high school. Nearly half have had no training at all beyond the high school—which is to say, they have never been taught anything at all about pedagogy, school management, psychology. They do not understand the fundamental principles of education. Through hap-hazard experience some of them have gained some knowledge of how children's minds work, and how to get at the task of educating them successfully. But the first few years of their teaching have been raw experiment with the plastic material of the children's minds under their care.

The apprentice dressmaker begins her work by trying out a gown on cheap material, and learns her principles and practice before she dares to set her shawl into a good fabric. Not so the green teacher. She does her first crude sloshing on the mind of your child.

It is the fault of every single citizen that this situation has come about. It is up to every single citizen to set about the cure. This is no time for dallying.

A STATESWOMAN ON NAVIES

Lady Astor is an undoubted asset to the British parliament. She brings thereto a new and fresh viewpoint, and probably will prove a valiant representative of women in the councils of the empire. But it is to be feared that when she rises to speak upon sea power she does so with little knowledge of what she is talking about. Certainly on this point the members of Commons must contain many who could talk more wisely and be heard more appreciatively than the lady member.

When, a few days ago, she deemed it her duty to discuss relative sizes of navies and England's rights upon the seas, she must have been listened to with thinly veiled intolerance by men who kept their tongues in their cheeks as they heard her:

"It is all very well for other countries to talk. They would not."

Only one-fifth of all the teachers in the country have had training in an inherited thing. The sailors of the United States said that when they were at Plymouth. The seas, one might almost say, belong to England, and could not be in any better or safer hands. I don't believe the United States ever will build against England. It would be stupid if it did."

This was mere flattery. Lady Astor, an American by birth, surely knows that when America sets out to build a navy it will find the men. Early Americans were seafaring men; the flag was carried to every port upon the seven seas, and can be carried again when the necessity arises or the incentive appears. Other nations can build navies and man them fully as well as the British. They have been content to profit by the existence of the four-hundred British navy; but at any time that England gets weary of her job as policeman of the seas there will be found those who will be ready to take it up where she leaves off.

THE BEST PHONE SERVICE

Where is the best telephone service in the world? Few people would guess, and perhaps few would have the heart to try. The service almost everywhere, of late, is so unsatisfactory that the ordinary telephone user is likely to settle down to a sad conviction that there is no good service anywhere.

But there is, according to the testimony of a group of Red Cross nurses just returned from war service. And it is, of all places, in Siberia.

The telephone systems in France and England, they say, were abominable. They came back to America, expecting relief in that particular, but found the New York phones still worse. When they went to Asia, they expected nothing.

"You can imagine our surprise," they say, "when we arrived in Siberia, to find a perfect telephone system, not to be compared with those of this country or Europe. The operators are courteous and patient, and in the year that we spent there we never knew what it was to get a wrong number."

The obvious cure, then for American telephone ills, may be to import operators from Siberia.
