RELIEF OF STAGNATED RELATIONS INDICATED

THREE CAMPAIGN TYPES REVEALED IN TACTICS OF 1920 CANDIDATES

General Wood Seeks Both Primary and State Selections—Johnson After Popular Vote—Hoover Centers on Delegates

NEW YORK, April 10.—Three of the leading Republican candidates for the presidency have revealed their tactics in distinct methods of campaigning with only rare exceptions into their rival's field.

Senator Hiram Johnson—concentrates generally in the states where there are preferential primaries, hopes by such victories as he won in Michigan primary and California.

Herbert Hoover—has advised his supporters to keep his name off primary ballots and center their efforts in winning the unpledged delegates after they are selected.

On the basis of independent delegates, the campaign of the unpledged delegates, Landon at present is running second to Wood.

William O. Maclay continues in his refusal to go out after the delegates until he has secured a large support in all parts of the country.

William Jennings Bryan and Jas. W. Gerard have received the endorsement of North Dakota and South Dakota respectively without any effort on their parts.

Many political leaders believe the democratic candidates are holding back until definite word is received from the White House as to whether President Wilson will support the democratic candidates.

Both Republicans and Democrats are now in a state of collapse, the only thing that is holding them together is the hope of a coalition.

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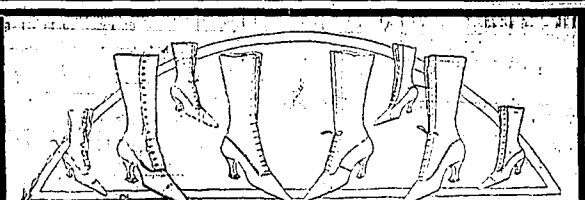

YOUR CHILD'S FUTURE

The school situation is not a joke. Talk about it in newspapers and magazines is not propaganda for slight increase of salary for teachers. At the risk of boring its readers, every newspaper with a sense of public duty is obliged to harp on the fact that the school situation as it exists today all over the country is a national menace. If the child of today is to become the useful citizen of tomorrow, he must have schooling today. The actual number of classes—no children, but classes of from thirty to seventy children each—which will have no teacher at all next year, is not less than 50,000. The number of classes now being taught—and the number will be greater next year—by inexperienced teachers, untrained, half competent who have been given emergency certificates to teach, is 120,000.

Only one-fifth of all the teachers in the country have had training equal to two years beyond the high school. Nearly half have had no training at all beyond the high school—which is to say, they have never been taught anything at all about pedagogy, school management, psychology. They do not understand the fundamental principles of education. Through hap-hazard experience some of them have gained some knowledge of how children's minds work, and how to get at the task of educating them successfully. But the first few years of their teaching have been raw experiment with the plastic material of the children's minds under their care.

The apprentice demagogue begins her work by trying out a gown on cheap material, and learns her principles and practices before she dares to set her shawl into good fabric. Not so the great teacher. She does her first crude stitching on the mind of your child. It is the fault of every single citizen that this situation has come about. It is up to every single citizen to get about the cure. This is no time for dallying.

A STATESWOMAN ON NAVIES

Lady Astor is an undoubted asset to the British parliament. She brings thereto a new and fresh viewpoint, and probably will prove a valiant representative of women in the councils of the empire. But it is to be feared that when she rises to speak upon sea power she does so with little knowledge of what she is talking about. Certainly on this point the members of Commons must contain many who could talk more wisely and be heard more appreciatively than the lady member.

When, a few days ago, she deemed it her duty to allude to relative sizes of navies and England's rights upon the seas, she must have listened to with thinly veiled intolerance by men who kept their tongues in their cheeks as they heard.

It is all very well for the senators to talk. They would not. Only one-fifth of all the teachers in the country have had training. It is an inherited thing. The members of the United States said that when they were at Plymouth. The seas, one might almost say, belong to England, and could not be in any better or safer hands. I don't believe the United States ever will build against England. It would be stupid if it did.

This was mere flattery. Lady Astor, an American by birth, surely knows that when America sets out to build a navy it will find the men. Early Americans were seafaring men; the flag was carried to every part upon the seven seas, and can be carried again when the necessity arises or the incentive appears. Other nations can build navies and man them fully as well as the British. They have been content to profit by the existence of the four-hundred British navy; but at any time that England gets weary of her job as policeman of the seas there will be found those who will be ready to take it up where she leaves off.

THE BEST PHONE SERVICE

Where is the best telephone service in the world? Few people would guess, and perhaps few would have the heart to try. The service almost everywhere is of like, is unsatisfactory, that the ordinary telephone user is likely to settle down to a sad conviction that there is no good service anywhere.

But there is, according to the testimony of a group of best (cross-nurses just returned from war-service. And it is, of all places, in Siberia!

The telephone systems in France and England, they say, were admirable. They came back to America, expecting relief in that particular, but found the New York phones still worse. When they went east to Asia, they expected nothing.

"You can imagine our surprise," they say, "when we arrived in Siberia, to find a perfect telephone system, not to be compared with those of this country or Europe. The operators are courteous and patient, and in the year that we spent there we never knew what it was to get a wrong number."

The obvious cure, then for American telephone ills, may be to select operators from Siberia.

MOVIES AID EDUCATION OF PARIS YOUNGSTERS

PARIS, April 10.—Moving picture films will play a very important part in the education of Paris youngsters under the project now before the municipal council is adopted. It is proposed to make movie excursions a regular part of the school curriculum. Once a week every pupil in the Paris schools will go to the movies, the visit being preceded by an explanatory lecture. The course or movie programme, will include films instructing in natural history, geography, history, science, and industry and fiction films designed to inculcate good morals. If the plan proves successful the question may be used every day. A report presented by M. L. Hitor, who is pushing the project, declares that the moving picture film is "an active aid in developing the young mind."
