### Supreme Council Preparing to Take Up International Problems at Once

PARIS, April 10.—The foreign office today authorized the statement that France, Belgium, Italy and England had agreed upon the demand that Germany should accept measures for immediate disarmament of her army as provided in the treaty. If Germany refuses, the allies power have agreed to suspend diplomatic relations with Berlin. Furthermore, the allies are united upon the proposal to put a new blockade in force if a new German militarist coup is successful.

# WATERWAY MOVE WILL BE HEARD

## Public Utilities Commission Seeks Data on Proposal of Im- portance

The Great Lakes-St. Lawrence Riverway Association, a voluntary organization of fourteen states, viz: Illinois, Michigan, Indiana, Ohio, Wisconsin, North and South Dakota, Ohio, Minnesota, Wyoming and Idaho, which is advocating the building of a waterway through the St. Lawrence River and the Wellfleet Canal, connecting the Atlantic Ocean with the Great Lakes, this morning with the Great Lakes St. Lawrence Commission, advised that hearings before an International Joint Commission for the purpose of considering the advisability of such an enterprise will be held in various places throughout the United States and the three territories set for hearing, viz: the Idaho interest on May 2 and 6, 1920, at Boise. The following brief suggestions indicate some of the benefits of the proposed waterway to the Idaho shippers.

"Reduce the actual mileage from lake ports in Northern Idaho by more than 500 miles.

"Eliminate transfers and all other costs and delays between the head of navigation and the seaboard.

"Extend to all the region between the Rock Mountains and the Alleghenies the benefit of the cheapest transportation in the world.

"Give ocean vessels easy access to the lake ports.

"Cut the rate of transportation between inland and coastal waters.

"Offer unlimited carrying capacity to move the crops when the market comes.

"Relieve eastern roads of the congestion that chokes them every year during the crop movement.

"Believe the eastern roads from an expenditure of billions to take care of their peak load and rest the rest of the year.

"Ease the New York gateway, where half of our commerce flows, of the congestion that hinders its trade and manufacture.

"Make the ship handling the laborer part of the Atlantic seaboard.

"Put the Rocky Mountain slope as near the sea as Kentucky and Tennessee are now.

"Reduce power that will pay the entire cost of the job.

"Give Western production an unobstructed way to the market. Like cutting a slice through a dike."

It has been the experience of this state that each fall when crops begin to move there always has been a congestion which has resulted in great loss to producers, which would be immediately relieved if the crops could move to a Great Lakes port such as Duluth or Chicago for export, making somewhat in the freight rate, as well as a loaded and empty car movement of one thousand miles each way, thereby releasing a great deal of equipment and relieving the congestion of the rail lines at the eastern terminals. A study of our economic and marketing system, as now illustrated by a commodity like potatoes, of which there are approximately 10,000 carloads per year, usually shows that the greater part of the loss is due to the difficulty of disposing of that product. Illustration: The rate from Idaho to the Missouri river is \$11.2 cents against 25 cents from Minnesota and Wisconsin. Therefore, the Idaho potato cannot gain at the Missouri river, and it is contended that by the building of this waterway the enormous crops of Minnesota, Wisconsin and Michigan would be available to Idaho.

BOISE, April 16.—Boys and girls would like to compete in the 1920 pig club contest, for a free trip to the International Livestock show in Chicago next winter, must enroll by May 1, according to an announcement from the office of the university extension division. The prize, allowing \$175 for the trip and expenses, is offered by Armour's farm bureau, to the farm bureau junior club member who exhibits the champion pig club pig over all breeds exhibited in the club department of the state fair at Boise, September 27 to October 2.

A similar prize was offered last year, and was won by William Stuart, of Weiser, who made the Chicago trip last December.

"The purpose of these prizes" it is announced, "is to increase the knowledge of farm boys and girls in the state regarding livestock production and diversified farming, thereby maintaining soil fertility and making the business of farming continuously profitable, knowing that upon the prosperity of the farmer depends the prosperity of the whole country and its industries."

Club members entering this contest, it is announced, must enroll in accordance with the regulations of the state club leader. An affidavit of completion of the work must accompany a report to be sent the state leader not later than November 15. The winner will write a story of his experience on the Chicago trip, of from 200 to 400 words.
