SAN REMO, Italy, April 23.—The supreme council has decided to destroy all the Turkish fortifications along the Dardanelles and the Bosphorus and to intern... (text continues)

The Dardanelles and the Bosphorus can only be impeded in the future by the league of nations. A dardanelles commission has been created to regulate matters relating to the straits.

SAN REMO, Italy, April 23.—Premier Lloyd George and the allies are not considering a renewal of the blockade of Germany, it was learned this afternoon from a source close to the supreme council. It was declared that the allied statement do not desire to blockade Germany because they hold that "Germany has been starved enough."

SAN REMO, Italy, April 23.—Robert Underwood Johnson, the American ambassador to Italy, has arrived here to attend the inter-allied supreme council meeting as an observer. British press reports in connection with the decisions reached by the council.

The San Remo correspondent of the Chronicle quoted Premier Millerand as saying: "We are in full agreement regarding Germany. Premier Lloyd George is still holding against any revision of the treaty." According to the Chronicle the inter-allied supreme council, whose report is now before the supreme council, has every where met with bad luck on the part of the German Allies which the Germans were pledged by treaty to turn over or destroy.

SECRECY SURROUNDS THE SITUATION—THOUGHT AN OUTBREAK IS EXPECTED

Tense Situation in Mexico is Covered by Shielded Attitude of Press but Americans Are Anxious—Rebels Beaten at Tuxpan

LOS ANGELES, April 23.—The United States destroyer Salm and McWay will leave San Diego harbor at 1 o'clock this afternoon bound for Mazatlan, Mexico, pursuant to orders from the navy department received today.

Admiral Rodman made that announcement here at noon from his flagship, the U. S. S. New Mexico, lying in the harbor. The Admiral has no other information save that the orders had been received and would be at once obeyed.

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., April 23.—All Mexican federal army officers on leave of absence, have been summoned to report for duty immediately. The Atlantic fleet at Guantanamo Bay in readiness should it be necessary to send warships to the Atlantic coast of Mexico. The warships Taconia and Niagara, from which marines were recently landed at Guatemala...

WASHINGTON, April 23.—The state department this afternoon requested the navy department to send two light draft gun boats to Mazatlan and Topolobampo on the west coast of Mexico. No outward incident has occurred, it is understood, but reports have been received that a big battle between the federal troops and the revolutionists is impending at Mazatlan.

WASHINGTON, April 23.—American representatives at the Mexican port of Topolobampo, Mazatlan and Frontera have asked that a warship be sent to those ports; the state department announced today. The state department refused to make any statement as to the incidents which have led to the request for warships.

The matter of sending warships is now under consideration the state department announced. The general attitude of the state department was that the request for warships was a matter not to be taken too seriously and it was evident that the state department was not anxious to create any unusual commotion on the matter.

"It is a very reassuring thing to see the American flag flying," was the comment made by one high official in connection with the request for warships. Private dispatches received in Washington also indicate that American officials in Mexico are becoming anxious over the situation and reports were received unofficially that warships had been asked for.

There are indications at the state department that a strict censorship has been set up in Mexico. No Mexican newspapers yesterday printed any articles bearing on the revolution, despite the fact that reports here indicate that the revolution is creating a serious condition of affairs.

MEXICO CITY, April 23.—Rebels under General Adolfo Gomez, who were trying to capture the great oil port of Tuxpan, have been decisively defeated and dispersed by federal troops commanded by General Hermilio Alvarez. General Juan Espinosa and General A. Gonzalez, it was announced today by General Juan Barrios, chief of staff to President Carranza.

The attack was begun by the rebels. According to the official announcement the attackers were not only beaten off but were put to flight, taking refuge in the nearby mountains. General Barrios, announced also that Colonel Romeo Plazero, governor of the state of Queretaro, has joined the revolutionary army in Soconusco. Mexico City continues quiet.

GAILLAUX IS SENTENCED TO TERM OF THREE YEARS WITH ONLY MONTH LEFT TO SERVE

PARIS, April 23.—The French senate, sitting as a high court of justice today imposed a sentence of three years imprisonment upon Joseph Gaillaux, ex-procurator of France, following his conviction of having had correspondence with the enemies of his country during war time.

PARIS, April 23.—It was unofficially reported this afternoon that the French senate, sitting as a high court of justice had reached a decision to impose a three year sentence of imprisonment upon former Premier Gaillaux, who was found guilty of having corresponded with the enemy. According to this report, Gaillaux's previous detention would now mean freedom for him in about a month. The court is to announce the sentence this evening.

PARIS, April 23.—The French senate today announced that it had just today to formulate a sentence for former Premier Joseph Gaillaux, who was convicted of having conspired and correspondence with the enemy. The fact that Gaillaux was sentenced to three years of imprisonment and of having reasonable intercourse with the enemy in war time, was greatly indignantly received by the findings of the court. She declared that the verdict of the court was a "shameful travesty on justice."

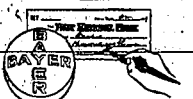

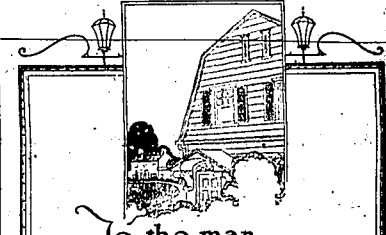

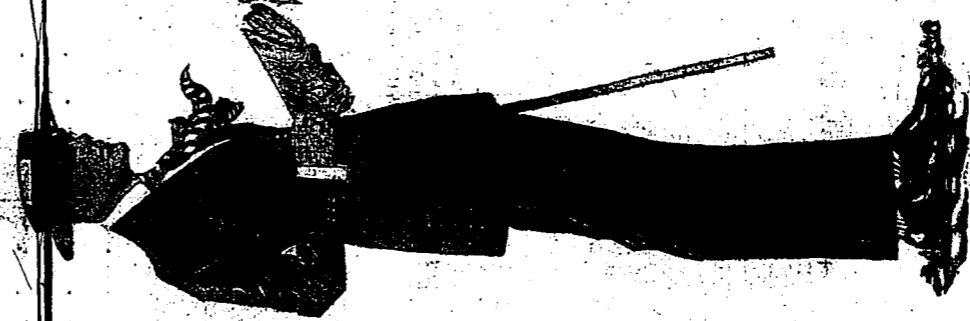

TAX ON CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTIONS

One of the most appealing plans for limiting the size of campaign contributions is that proposed by Senator Thomas as an amendment to the pending deadweight bill. Instead of establishing an arbitrary limit, it levies a federal tax of 100 per cent on all political donations in excess of \$1000, whether given by an individual, a firm, an association or a corporation. Such expenditure would have to be itemized in connection with the income tax return, and would be subject to publication. The law would apply alike to pre-convention campaigns and election campaigns.

This may seem drastic when compared with the old regime. And yet it is reasonable enough. It would amount, practically, to placing a limit of \$1000 on campaign gifts. That, as most citizens will agree, is about as much as anybody ought to pay to influence anybody else's election. If a campaign is to cost \$1,000,000, it is better to get the money from 1000 people, or 10,000 people, than to have a few very wealthy men contributing all of it.

Senator Thomas's measure, however, does not interfere at all with larger gifts, in case the donors are willing to split their excess 50:50 with Uncle Sam. Thus a \$10,000 gift would mean that \$5000 of it would go to the campaign and \$4500 into the United States Treasury, with guaranteed publicity of the figures.

At a time when there is much talk of lavish political expenditures, and when the government needs the money as much as the candidates or the parties do, the proposition is attractive.

MODIFYING THE BONUS

Those who have not liked the idea of the military bonus find the latest congressional plan less objectionable. Modifications of the original measure by the House committee make a considerable reduction in the number of eligible service men and give to the whole thing less of an atmosphere of "grab" and more of fair compensation.

The payments now seem more likely to go to those who need them. Officers are barred, and so are veterans who were assigned to shipbuilding or other war work in which they got special pay. There is no bonus for men who, while in the service, had their civilian pay continued by their employers. Men desiring the payment must claim it within six months. The needy ones presumably will do so, and many who do not need the money will probably pass it up. It seems proper, too, as long as exceptions are being made, to exclude those who belonged to the army, navy or marine corps before the war, because they entered the service voluntarily whereas the others were drafted.

The most commendable features of all are the provisions made for veterans who desire land, homes or vocational training.

The payment is expected to average \$300 per man. The total expense is now estimated at nearly \$1,000,000,000. This also is a feature that will make it more tolerable to the public which has to pay the bill.

UNWORTHY OF THEIR WINGS

An aviator and his mechanic were arrested on alighting the other day to pick up some wild geese which they had shot at an altitude of 1000 feet. They are charged with violating the game laws protecting migratory birds, and face a penalty of \$500 fine and six months in jail. The judge may see fit to lighten the sentence, but there should be assurance that no repetition of the offense will occur, and the case should have wide publicity.

A new menace to wild life lies in the airplane. Unless laws are expanded and enforced, many a crafty bit of shooting will be done from the air. America is beginning at last to appreciate what remains of the wild life of this continent and to enact laws for its protection. There have been long strides in the unification of state statutes to cover the migration of birds, so that wanton destruction in one state may not offset preservation in another. The aerial hunter must be compelled to obey the same regulations as his less elevated brothers. He must not take advantage of the wide freedom of the air to slay those whose natural element it is. It would seem as if sharing wings with the feathered fraternity would take from man's breast the lust for bird slaughter. Since apparently it does not, the law must be invoked.
