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# LAUNCH CRUSADE TO HALT BLOODLESS REVOLT IS EXPECTED

So Says Alvarado But Hear What Yankee Gunners Are Doing to Garza's Men

WASHINGTON, April 24.—The Carranza government will be overthrown by a "bloodless revolution," according to General Salvador Alvarado, former general in the Carranza army who is here today to act as representative of the revolting Mexican state of Sonora and to attempt to secure recognition of the United States for that state. General Alvarado stated that he also represented the interests of General Carranza.

"If the revolution is successful we will immediately hold a general election—a legal election," General Alvarado said. "No effort will be made to place General Carranza in office, although it is logical to presume he might be the choice of the people."

The states of Sonora, Sinaloa, Zacatecas, Michoacan and Guerrero have successfully revolted, Alvarado declared and others will soon join.

MEXICO CITY, April 26.—(Delayed)—Troop have been sent to arrest General Alvarado Obregon, candidate for the presidency of Mexico, who has been located on a train in the state of Guerrero and Michoacan. It was announced today that General Barragan, chief of staff to President Carranza.

SOBER STRIKES

It is interesting to note that all efforts to arouse the striking railway men to violence have failed. The three great strikes of the last year, steel, coal and transportation, have each been marked by the absence of any attempts to gain their ends by the destruction of life or property. Labor in general has a saner view in this regard than it used to have, and realizes that unjust and destructive acts on its part tend to befog the public mind and divert attention from whatever justice there may be in the strikers' demands.

Undoubtedly there is another element to which credit must be given for this more orderly conduct of strikes, and that is prohibition. Not that all strikes drink; but in any great company of men there are always, when liquor is available, some who indulge in it. When a man has been drinking he does not see clearly through to the logical end of any given act. He sees only the act itself, and that in a false light—"through a glass, darkly."

The fact that the strikers drift back to work, one by one, without waiting for the strike to be settled, is also due, probably, in a good many cases to prohibition. There are no saloons to gather in. Sober eyes can see the anxious look on the wife's face. Idle hours, with neither beer nor company to speed their passing, soon become insupportably tedious and the man returns to his job, trusting his cause to arbitration.

With this better understanding on the part of labor, it now behooves all agencies for industrial adjustment to act with promptness, fairness and wisdom.

DOUGHNUTS PAY TUITION

For students to work their own way through college or university is no new thing. "It has been done probably as long as there have been such schools. But it does seem that the modern student is showing a good deal of originality and business ability in his self-support.

There were the New England youths who paid their college expenses by profits from a thriving poultry business. Now it is reported that stout students at the Kansas Agricultural college are putting themselves through school by means of the well-beloved doughnut.

This is a no modest business venture. They are incorporated as The Perfect Bakery, with a capital of \$15,000. Export bakery turns out the doughnuts, hot rolls and other bakery products, which are retailed at the store and also supplied to many fraternity houses and boarding places.

The bakery is wisely located near the campus, where students can drop in for a sack of good things between classes. It has become the custom for "Aggie" men and coeds to munch doughnuts instead of chocolates during their hours of social intercourse.

There are still plenty of odd jobs to be done, and the college student is perfectly willing to do them. But at the same time he is quite ready to take up any promising business venture which will bring greater financial returns for the expenditure of thought and ability.

NEW KINK IN MEXICO

The Mexicans found a new way to start a revolution in Mexico. The secession of the state of Sonora and the setting up of a separate republic of that name can be viewed in no other way than as a revolution against the Carranza government. Therefore, rebel leaders have started their rebellions by attempting to take over the government at Mexico City. The fact, to be the only real government of the people, and until now nobody has thought of just quitting the old business and starting in for himself in a new state.

Mexican revolution expressly forbids this proceeding, however, and soon there is bound to be a clash in Sonora. Then the rebel leader and the army in the movement will come to the front. In all probability it has some hidden connection with the approaching national election in Mexico, when the "election" of a president has come to mean guerrilla warfare for months before the ballots are cast, and murder, battle and sudden death probably for a year thereafter.

DEVICE MAKES MINES SAFE

Geophone is New Invention to Enable Miners to Detect Sounds Underground

WASHINGTON, April 23.—After a man of high technical ability has invented a geophone, a detecting device invented during the war by the French to locate enemy underground operations, the bureau of mines, department of the interior, announces that the geophone may be put to a number of remarkable uses in mining and other industries.

The most extraordinary result of these tests is that the bureau of mines men have been able to detect sounds which have actually traveled through the earth's crust for a distance of 150 feet. What his day means in the new future can only be conjectured. An engineer of the bureau was able through the use of the geophone to detect an iron pipe which was being used at different times, so that the sounds of the pipe were being made at the base of a tunnel, the workmen who were detecting heard workmen in another tunnel, preparing to blast and ordered them to retreat until the sounds had died away. The sounds were so clear he did not realize that the tunnel headings were over 300 feet apart.

The greatest value of the geophone in mining, so far as known, will be in the detection of underground mines. Quite frequently miners are enticed in coal mines following creeks or other surface indications. They are caught quickly and accurately through the geophone. In metal mines, also, the geophone may be used to detect hidden faults or be buried in some part of the mine in which they have penetrated in order to protect themselves from the fumes of a fire—these, too, may be recognized through the geophone.

When the bureau first began its experiments with the geophone it was questionable whether the device could carry sounds far enough away to make it practical. The experiments show that sounds can be detected through the earth a distance of 1500 feet in the case of the geophone and mine, through solid rock, 2000 feet, and through soil rock about half a mile.

The geophone also is of special value in metal mines where two shafts are connected. At times, in spite of an correct surveying as is possible, the two tunnels may be out of line. The geophone, recently bureau of mines engineers were in a mine where the two ends of the tunnel failed to meet and the geophones, located at the ends, showed the distance between the two ends of the tunnel. Observations with the geophones have been made at mines which were in the case of the geophone, the fire made noise enough to be heard some distance, either because of its traveling through the air, or because of its traveling through the earth.

Very satisfactory results have been obtained in attempts made to locate leaks in water mains. The water circulating in the ordinary city main can be heard with the geophones when they are placed on the surface, even to twelve feet above the pipes. In the business district of Pittsburgh one leak was located within a few inches, although the water department had been trying to locate it for two weeks.

Freedom Of Seas Navy Wanted Here

WASHINGTON, April 23.—Establishment of a naval policy which will guarantee the United States "the same freedom of the seas as now enjoyed by the Great Britain" was urged in the Senate today by Senator Reed, Democrat of Missouri.

"The treaty of peace is as good as Julius Caesar," Reed declared. "As long as this country is a powerful nation we will not be satisfied, but we should provide adequately for our army and navy."

"Conditions are the same now as before the war. When Great Britain is at sea, she is at sea. It is with the understanding that she would not take one step from her shores."

"She was opposed to any reestablishment of the old policy of the Great Britain," Reed said. "She has already enjoyed unimpeded freedom of the seas. I am in favor of the British State assuming a position similar to that of Great Britain."

PIRE IN OIL TANK

HOSTON, April 22.—Fire in an oil tank located in one of the buildings near the machine shop of the Water town Arsenal early today threatened to destroy several buildings.

Caillaux Gets Acquittal From Treason Charge

PARIS, April 23.—Former Premier Joseph Caillaux was today acquitted of high treason against the country of communicating intelligence to the enemy in war time. The verdict of the court of justice was for acquittal 21; against acquittal 2.

Following the verdict of acquittal on the first charges the court began deliberating the charge that the ex-premier had correspondence with the enemy. Caillaux was placed on trial on February 17.

From the beginning it was apparent that the government had a weak case. The conviction was made by a single statesman and he himself that was the victim of a political plot. Both Caillaux and his beautiful wife, who has been a spectator at every open session of the court have been confident that the verdict would be acquittal.

After the court announced Caillaux's acquittal on charges of high treason and of communicating intelligence to the enemy, he was the recipient of numerous congratulations. Caillaux was ably defended by the late Senator Raymond Auffret and by M. Dehaene, who defended Captain Joffre.

Caillaux admitted that he had worked for peace, but declared that his efforts had been inspired by patriotism and that he did not aim at anything but the considered benefit to his country. He gave long and impassioned speeches, and concluded with his wife and Lenoir, both of whom were executed for their treason.

When M. Lescoupe began his speech for the state he announced that he had no objection to the verdict of the court. He said that he was a Republican and he would support the government.

BEVERAGE FOR CHAIRMAN

CHICAGO, April 23.—A movement to make Albert J. Beveridge, former United States senator from Indiana, temporary chairman of the Republican national convention, was launched here today. It is held by leaders of the party who are reported as having high influence in Republican politics. That Mr. Beveridge's appointment would eliminate the contest for the position between Senators Lodge and Borah.

COLBY AND WILSON CONFER

WASHINGTON, April 23.—Secretary of State Colby called at the White House today and held a long conference with the president. When asked whether the president would send a note on the Turkish and the Greek situation, Colby replied: "It has not taken form yet." He said that he would determine whether the reported note from the San Remo conference has been received.
