## NEW SUGAR SALES PLAN FORCED ON REFINERS IS ENEMY TO HIGH PRICES

### Agreement Reached With Government Aimed at Middle-man Speculator Who Is Blamed for High Prices of Commodity

WASHINGTON, April 27.—Blindness of sugar speculators was said to be assured here today by an agreement between the department of justice and executives of the principal sugar refineries of the east.

The agreement prohibits the resale of sugar to middle men for speculative purposes and a program was adopted under which all sales will be made direct to jobbers and wholesalers.

Attorney General Palmer said he believed the result would be an instant check on profiteering.

Representative Howard, Oklahoma, will introduce in the house a bill covering heavy penalties for speculation in sugar. He announced this afternoon after he had conferred with Howard E. Figg, and stated he had been convinced that speculators in sugar had jumped illegally the price of sugar fully 10 cents a pound.

Eighteen eastern refiners, who control practically the entire distribution of sugar in the United States, committed themselves to the government's proposal to sell to jobbers under a plan which eliminates half a dozen margins of profit now tacked on to the price which the consumer has to pay.

The agreement was reached at a two-day conference with Assistant to Attorney General Howard E. Figg, in special charge of the fight to lower the high cost of living.

Figg, in a nation-wide probe found the cause for speculative prices was manipulation of the market by speculators.

The refiners pledged themselves to set up a system under which sales will be confined to a narrow field of business.

The department of justice will be able to tell refiners reports, submitted every 20 days, the actual prices of raw sugar, the exact location of all supplies distributed and at effective prices will be given upon the margin of profit by jobbers and retailers.

The department of justice, it was said, holds that not only the five cents represents a legitimate charge for refining and cost of handling, but an addition to the price of raw sugar.

Refiners report sales indicated to date more than 16 per cent of supply has been brought up by the manufacturers and only a small interest now having stocks laid in in warehouses, it was stated.

LONDON, April 27.—Five million more women voters are to be added to the British electorate in the next few years. The women voters will greatly outnumber the men, perhaps a million more.

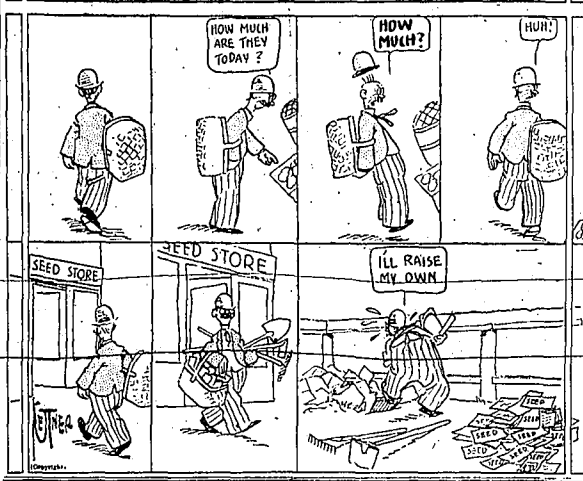

## Mexican Crisis at Hand With Rapid Growth of Revolt—Test Impending

### Americans Leaving Mazatlan Where Bloody Battle for Possession of Port is Looming—Seized Railways Will Be Returned

WASHINGTON, April 27.—A crisis in the Mexican situation is at hand, according to reports reaching here today, from there is indication that the final struggle, impending which will determine the strength of the revolutionary movement against President Carranza.

Vigilant dispatches of fighting in the vicinity of Mexico City and official reports that a great battle is impending for possession of the port of Mazatlan on the west coast of Mexico, brought the opinion here that within a few days there will be a turning point in the revolutionary movement which will lead to further successes or will more firmly establish the rule of the Carranza government.

Capture of Mier and Guerrero, reported to General Salvador Alvarado, representative of the Sonoran revolutionists here, and confirmation of reports that the forces of General Huertado have joined the revolution were the strongest evidences of new strength by the rebels.

General Huertado is reported to be in control of the state of Morelos.

Information that General Gonzalez has refused to join the rebels was accepted here as an indication of success by the Carranza government.

Mexico City newspapers of April 26, report that General Salvador Gomez with the garrison at Cuernavaca has gone over to the Carranza side. The federal garrison at Cuernavaca, near Mexico City, on the ground of neglect of duty. Colonel Lopez has rebelled with a regiment of cavalry at Veracruz, in Michoacan. General Aguilar has been put in command of operations against the rebels in Guerrero. 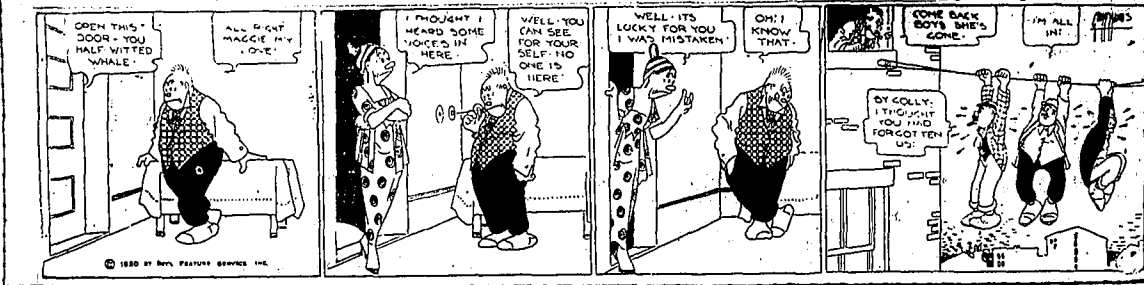

## MCGRAW SURE HIS PITCHERS WILL TWIRL WINNING BALL

NEW YORK, April 27.—No matter what the experts may say or think about the 1932 Giants, Manager McGraw opines that his entry in the National League pennant scramble will have something to say about the final disposition of the pennant—his year, especially if his "three aces"—Douglas, come through.

These three hurlers constitute one of the sturdiest trios in either league. In short, Neft, Tony and Douglas are gluttons for work. They have the poise and strength necessary to shoulder the pitching burden all Summer and an all three got away to a good start down South. McGraw believes they are due to hit a winning trail for the Giants. And their pitchers will have plenty of help, for Hube Denton and Jess Beane are in the box.

Art Neft has spent a lot of time this Spring perfecting his low ball Neft's throw is, in reality, a finger ball, and as long as Artie doesn't dig his nails too deeply into the handles, correcting of the ball he will not fracture the new pitching rules. NEW HIGHWAY TO THE SEA

An International Joint Commission is now at work studying the engineering features involved in making ocean ports of the cities along the Great Lakes. Eighteen states in this country have formally indicated their interest in and approval of this plan.

There are many things to be gained by opening up a deeper waterway from the Great Lakes to the Atlantic ocean through the St. Lawrence river. In the first place there is room on the lakes for practically unlimited traffic expansion.

Aside from the cheapness of transportation along the lakes and out through the St. Lawrence river, there is the factor of annual railroad congestion. Beginning with the harvesting of western crops and lasting for ten months, there is a severe car shortage in the grain regions and an equally serious congestion of cars in the East.

In the East the new waterway is opposed by some American and Canadian railroads and by many cities in New York state, because they believe it will lose them business. It is quite likely to work out the other way.

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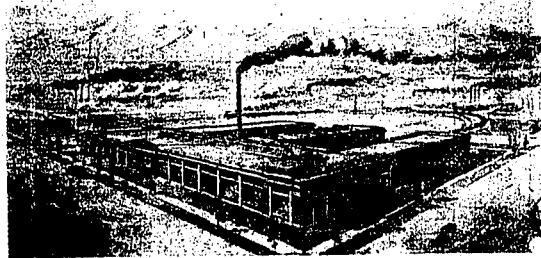
