### LOOK OUT FOR IMPOSTERS SAYS AGENTS

#### Mrs. Ludwig Wishes to Warn Farmers Against Purchasing High Priced Goods

The Farm Bureau has just completed an investigation regarding some agents who are representing themselves to be with the State Poultry Association and are inspecting poultry on the Twin Falls tract. It seems as though the agents is an insect poultry and before leaving attempt to induce the farmer to purchase that powder, spray and internal remedies. Reports come to the Farm Bureau office indicating that a number of farmers are falling for the game.

The prices quoted are 60c for the dust powder, 35c a gallon for spray and \$12 a gallon for internal remedy. Investigation proves that these prices are excessive. Dust powder, equal in value, can be purchased for 20c a spray for \$2 a gallon and internal remedies for many times less than these concerns are charging from local dealers.

The Farm Bureau wishes to state that these people are not with the State Poultry Association, are in no way connected with the Extension Service and the prices they are charging are very unreasonable.

An investigation is being made by the Farm Bureau officials to learn if these people are subject to prosecution under the laws of Idaho.

### TIPS FOR EUROPEAN TOURISTS

There are probably more persons in moderate financial circumstances who are desirous of taking European trips now than there ever were before. Teachers and lecturers know that a personal visit to those regions where so much history has been made, and it is the making, would be the source of valuable experience and inspiration. There are many families whose ardor about the continent and these families, especially the ones that have determined not to bring the bodies home, have a natural longing to visit the graves of their beloved.

Two suggestions from an authority who has devoted careful study to the matter of prices and fares for European travel, today should be of interest to persons desiring to visit Europe now, but hesitant because fearful of the cost.

First, Americans starting for Europe would do well to change all their money into European currency beforehand instead of doing it a little at a time as it is needed. Although foreign money now now below normal value, they may come back to normal very rapidly, while prices based on these decreased values may be much slower in coming down than the currency in going up. For instance, the present valuation of the franc in American money is about 15 francs to the dollar as against a normal of a little over five francs. It can be seen readily that an article cheap at 10 francs, present rate, would be expensive at the normal rate of exchange.

Next, having done his foreign currency shopping early, the American tourist need not hesitate to go on with his plans for a trip abroad, if he can afford about 25 per cent more than he would have allowed for the trip in 1914. There is excellent foundation for the estimate that a trip on the same scale will cost just about one-fourth more than it would in pre-war days.

### THE LUNCH BOX

After overalls comes the lunch box. It is a natural sequence. The lunch box is not so distinctly a sign of manual labor as overalls are. In fact, workmen in recent years have taken to carrying their lunch rolled up in a newspaper or else going to a restaurant for it. The "dinner pail" of Mark Hanna days is no more. More recently, however, its place has been taken by the neat and serviceable box of tin or leather, holding a thermos bottle with hot tea or coffee along with the children. In such a respectable man, he makes a lunch good enough for anybody. There is one reason why any person, working in an office or anywhere else, should be ashamed to carry the box or ashamed to be seen eating its contents.

Perhaps there has been less proffering of food than in clothing, especially in the non-day meals served to business men and workmen. Still, if men, are going to start economizing, they may as well go through with it. And a quarter or half-dollar a day saved by carrying one's lunch is worth while, in itself and in the wholesome sense of self-respecting economy it induces.

The latter consideration is the more important of the two. The psychology is the main thing. Once let a man get into an economical state of mind, and he will find all sorts of ways to cut down expenses. That is exactly what the American people need today.

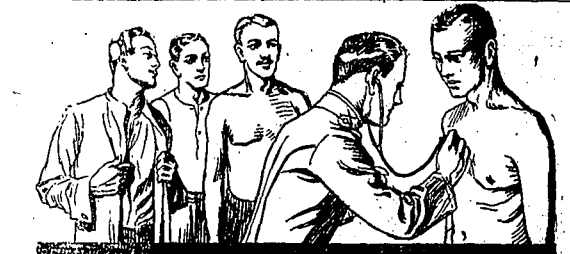

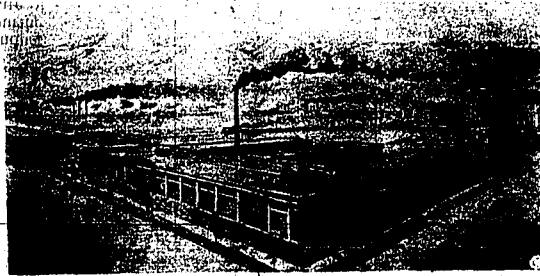
