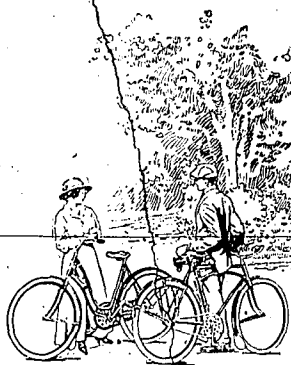

## WOMEN TO USE BALLOT TO AID REFORMS, LEADER SAYS

**NEW YORK, May 7.**—"What will they have it?" That question is very much in evidence today as 25,000,000 women start to the polls, opened to them by the ratification of the Federal Suffrage Amendment by the 55th State. The answer is that women will do very much what they have been doing with the ballot for suffrage for women is not experimental; it is proved. Women have voted for fifty-one years in Wyoming for twenty-seven years in Colorado and New Zealand; for nearly a quarter of a century in Denmark; for eighteen years in Federated Australia; for fourteen in Finland; for thirteen in Norway. In all these lands women have sought and gained specific reforms by means of the ballot. Without the ballot, they contend that their efforts at reform have been unfruitful.

There was one woman campaigning for the vote in France and Italy before the war, now there are hundreds. The reason for the present of the French suffragette being that "we now understand that the ballot is the foundation necessary to all the reforms women desire, and that without it, in any case, no effort, the fight against immorality, infant mortality, depopulation is futile, because we are not authorized." Through the fifty years of the fight for federal suffrage in this country, suffragists have given the world a hard to get on working for the vote when there were so many things they wanted to do with the vote. For all these fifty years, the National American Women Suffrage Association has been helping women to know how to use the ballot. This is why the League of Women Voters, which is the outgrowth of the National Association, is already a nationwide working force. Although in point of time it is only a year old, in point of fact, the League of Women Voters is the spirit of the old association in a new form, and steps forth in force with a national membership of over two million, rapidly growing in every little city and every small town in the land.

Why? Because it offers a well-worked out program, along lines women want: A knowledge of citizenship; an improved electorate; better care of children; protection for working women. The need of these improvements had become acute in women's minds during their fifty years of passing on from mother to daughter the torch of liberty. Now they not only know just what to work for, but they have power in their hands. First of all they will try out the old parties. They will never work separately as a sex. They have seen enough of sex discriminations. They want to work side by side with men, but they have a definite plan, a definite purpose. There is no need to wait and guess what women will do. They are busy on the high-way, they are doing it. Immediately, they are changing their presidential candidates, with order for the right man. God gives them to see the right. They are turning a force thousands

along into their campaigns. There are more than 17,000,000 women of voting age in States which have already enfranchised women for the 1920 presidential election even before ratification for the Federal Suffrage Amendment was completed. They are bound to be a mighty force this year. Realizing this, they are giving deep thought to who shall be the first President of the United States ever chosen in any true sense "by the people."

## PHENOMS OF 1920

**ST. LOUIS, May 7.**—Jimmy Burke, manager of the Browns, can't talk a German machine runner for strengthening the St. Louis team's 1920 pitching staff. It was a machine gun bullet that made a great curve ball batter of young Bill Burwell, the Browns' sensational recruit right-hander, who already has won a place in the rotation with the Browns, Westman and Gaffin, the four aces of Burke's mound crew.

Burwell was struck with an infantry outfit in the San Michel drive when the advance of his platoon was checked by the withering fire of a German machine gun. A squad was sent out to surround the strong point. Burwell was one of the volunteers. It was a risky task, but they accomplished their mission and soon withdrew the machine gun by picking off members of its crew.

Burwell took a bullet clipped the corner of Burwell's right hand. It shattered the last joint, but Burwell refused to leave "the ground until the diet German was 'out.' Then he went to a dressing station. The surgeon who bandaged his shattered right hand told him to leave the hospital. His control is perfect and he has a great change of pace. Willard is a smart pitcher, a fast and sure holder and a fair hitter.

Versatility is Burwell's middle name. He is not only a great all-round ball player, but a singer, musician and composer of music. When his teammates discovered that he possessed a rare tenor voice they induced him to organize a quartette with Pat Collins as baritone. Hence "Loverette" as Ross and Earl Smith as second tenor. Bill's musical specialty

is the piano. His latest song creation is the "Noodle Soup Rag." Burwell resembles Earl Bliss in build and general appearance. He has a side-arm pitching motion that closely approaches the submarine delivery of the Yankee star.

Physician Visiting Spot Finds Bones and Arms Lying Around Loose

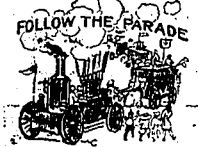

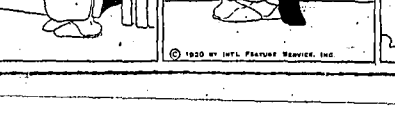
