RADICAL WING SOCIALISTS WANT PEPPY PLATFORM

Illiquid Group Wish Conservative Words to Catch Independent Voters

NEW YORK, May 11.—The conservative element of the socialist party appeared to be "flashing the ax" today when the national convention was resumed at the British consulate hall.

There is a definite split in the conservative element of the socialist party, an "elder statement" as they are contemptuously termed and the extremist element composed principally of the younger members of the "fire eating" variety.

The split came on the question of adopting the party platform and a declaration of principles and it will be a matter of time before the two factions will be organized into two distinct parties. Both documents were written by the conservative crowd headed by Alvin Karpis and are marked with a scholarly presentation of socialism. Both documents state the fact that violence has no place in socialism. The writings are what could be called "mild and progressive" from a socialist standpoint.

The extremist element, getting its strength principally from the Chicago contingent, doesn't care for violence in any of its features. They want a platform which will have some "puff and fire" and are prepared to fight for their beliefs on the floor.

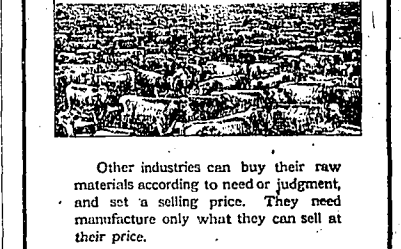

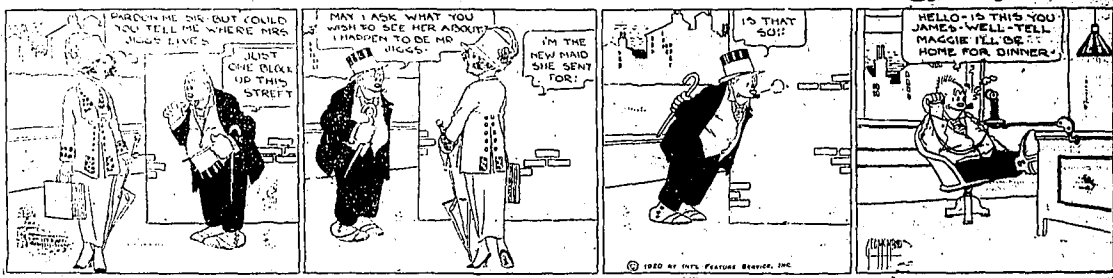

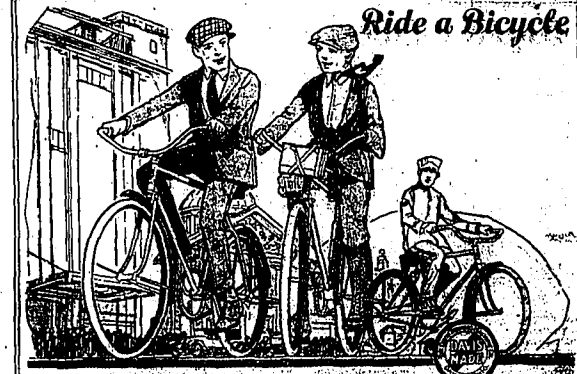
