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EXPERT TELLS HOW TO CLEAN YOUR CLOTHES

Miss Wood Gives Directions For Renovating At Big Meeting

Fourteen women attended the dry cleaning demonstration at the home of Mrs. W. F. Atworth where Miss Catherine West, clothing specialist, showed the women how to get satisfactory results and make dry cleaning work easy as well as labor saving bills. Garments which would have cost \$175.00 to clean in the cleaners were cleaned for \$25.00.

Plumage experts, K. W. Switzer, geologist, and Miss Helen Klumman, ladies' milk bath, men's felt hats, woolen skirts and women's suits were cleaned in the galleys of the building. The woman's dry cleaner was used in the first part of gasoline and then two others were used for the remainder of the afternoon. The above articles were cleaned in the order of lightness and the amount of soil. All garments cleaned the gasoline used for rinsing was cleared by making a paste of a tablespoon of gold dust and water for every quart of gasoline used. This was allowed to settle. Two gallons of gasoline were thus saved to be used to start cleaning another line.

A delicious picnic lunch was served while the articles were being cleaned. The remainder of the afternoon was spent in buying plumes, steaming and pressing, subjects as well as other articles.

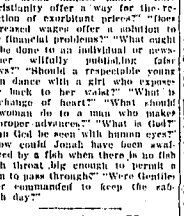
PASTOR WILL ASSUME ROLL ANSWER MAN
