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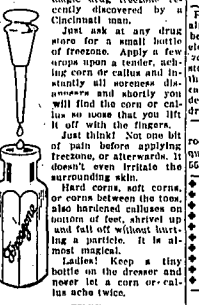

Wilson Taking a Hand in Delaware Suffrage Battle WASHINGTON, June 2.—President Wilson has taken a hand in the fight for ratification of the suffrage amendment by the Delaware legislature.

DOVER, DEL., June 2.—Little hope for favorable action on the suffrage amendment was held out today when the legislature convened for its final session. Suffragists had been defeated for the past three days, but the indications were that they had failed to overcome the hostile sentiment of the legislators.

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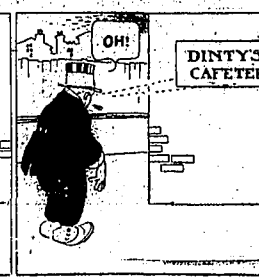
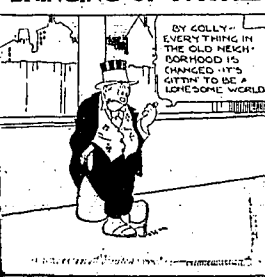
