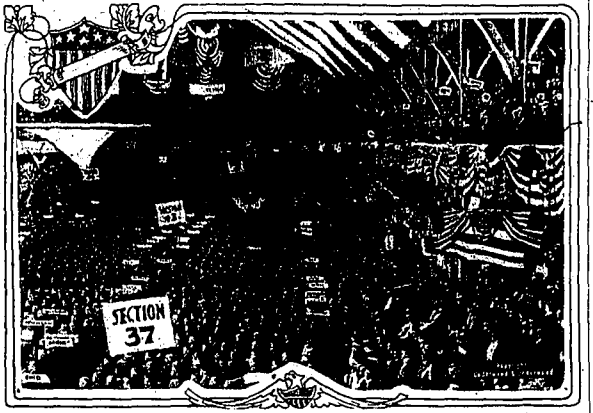

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WOOD SPEEDS FOR CAMPAIGN

Treasurer Testifies in Senate Probe That Expenditures Reach \$1,252,910

WASHINGTON, June 5.—A total of \$1,252,910 has been spent thus far in financing General Leonard Wood's presidential campaign, Horace Shublin, former treasurer of the Wood campaign testified today before the senate committee investigating campaign expenditures and contributions.

Shublin presented to the committee a list of accounts which covered the accounting previously rendered by Albert A. Sprague, Chicago, wholesale grocer and the Wood campaign treasurer of the expenditure of a total \$1,174,910.

To the Sprague account of \$1,174,910, Shublin brought an additional \$78,000 of Wood expenditures which brought the complete total to \$1,252,910.

Shublin testified that the accounts were prepared by the Chicago firm of E. P. Kaelen to Ferguson & Lam Co., 420 E. 75th St. in Park Forest, Ill., and that the accounts were prepared by J. H. Lehigh in June 1920.

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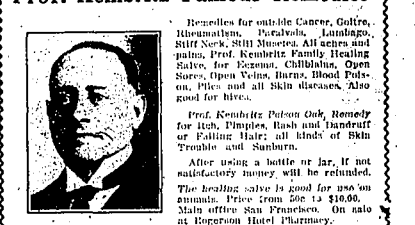

PROVING THE TIMES INDEPENDENT

No better evidence of The Times' complete independence from faction or influence; no stronger verification of its stated policy could be offered than that presented in the recent offensive conducted by The News against The Times policy, which culminated yesterday in the publication of a letter from P. D. Turner, executive secretary of the Building Trades Council, which directed criticism against The Times.

In its own anxiety to place The Times in the category of the left press, The News actually furnished proof of The Times' sincerity. In eagerness to insinuate Nonpartisan League domination over The Times, The News in reality made itself the vehicle for disproving its insinuations that The Times was controlled by Union Labor; its continual worry over The Times' policy, The News merely reveals its fear of The Times, based upon its knowledge that The Times is the only sincerely independent newspaper in Twin Falls, a fact well known to the public.

As to the charges made by Mr. Turner that The Times did not allow a letter dealing with The Times' policy, addressed to it by George Taylor, an alleged Nonpartisan, The Times merely wishes to be that on the face of the letter itself, as published in The News, it is shown to be nothing of new value or interest to the public.

In addition, The Times wishes to notify Mr. Turner or any other individual, organization or faction, that its square deal policy toward them, as toward any other element or issue, will remain unchanged. The Times will not, however, accept dictation of policy from Mr. Turner or any other individual or faction. There will be no surrender, now or later, from The Times policy of complete independence.

BRING FORTH THE REPORT

The Interchurch Movement intends in good faith to show the people that it is out to effect practicable reform—not merely out to sweep in the dollars while the people are psychologically attuned to being thus separated from their wherewithal—if religious movement really intends to attempt the accomplishment of an improvement in the industrial situation, let it bring forth the 100,000 report which its select committee made on the steel strike.

Recently the Interchurch crowd held a meeting at Cleveland, and the report was unanimously adopted. For appointing the committee to investigate the steel strike the Interchurch folk were, by the vocational manufacturers' association, called "holtsheviks" and "anarchists."

It matters relevant—most pertinent—to ask if the verbal assurances the manufacturers caused the Interchurch group to drop the steel strike matter, but it stop the flow of dollars into the unimportant hands of the steel-religionists?

In other words, is the Interchurch movement a sincerely-willed effort to bring about industrial improvement along with church money? Do the master minds of the movement intend to "tackle" the practical questions which are stentorian in their demands for reform, or do they intend to stand nonchalantly aside and wait for developments in the struggle—and it is nothing less—to show them where they can make such a show of effort as will not hurt themselves, however the outcome?

The report of the Interchurch committee on the steel strike cost \$20,000. Have not the people who contributed the money enough right and title in the work done to have the report made public? Evidently nothing of supplementary work remains in order to the completeness of the report. Why not bring forth the report and let the people who are interested in getting the "truth" see the whole truth and nothing but the truth, entirely free from propaganda, in regard to that phase of the industrial situation have the benefit of seeing what special investigators found to be the facts of the recent turmoil?

Either let the report be made public properly, or let there be no satisfactory showing that it has not been suppressed from the eyes of the people by the flunkeys of the Interchurch movement.

SARTORIAL STATESMANSHIP.

CHLOROFORM IS USED ON IRISH

RESOLUTION IN HOUSE, CHARGE

Speaker Gillett Will Refuse to Recognize Anyone Trying to Introduce It There

WASHINGTON, June 5.—Charge that the republican house leaders had "chloroformed" the Mason resolution on the Irish republic was made by Representative James P. Gullivan of Massachusetts today.

EXPERIMENT WITH IRRIGATION

MONROVIA, June 5.—Experimentation toward determining definitely the value of irrigation as a supplement to rainfall in the cut-over regions of the Snake valley has been begun on the University of Idaho's substitution farm at Sandpoint, according to an announcement made today from the office of Dean E. J. Iddings of the College of Agriculture.

Five acres of the cut-over land of five acres divided into 10 plots of one-half acre each. Five plots will be irrigated and the other five will be irrigated. Clover, oats, potatoes and watermelons will be grown in rotation or in succession on the experiment. Water obtained from the city mains at Sandpoint will be used on the five irrigated plots.

"LOVE CHILD" WILL GET BETTER CHANCE

LONDON, June 5.—The "love child" is to be given a better chance in England. Under a bill in the House of Commons these changes will be made in existing law.

1. The mother in registering the child's name shall have the name of the child's father and state whether she has admitted paternity.

2. The child when he or she is asked whether he will contribute to the maintenance of the mother, an action brought by the government, is admitted.

3. A putative father may be ordered (nominally ten dollars) weekly upkeep. That quadruple the present legal rate.

4. Every legitimate child under sixteen shall be the ward of a juvenile court which is empowered to appoint a guardian of the child in an order or substitution of the mother, if the child shall be illegitimized by the subsequent marriage of its parents.

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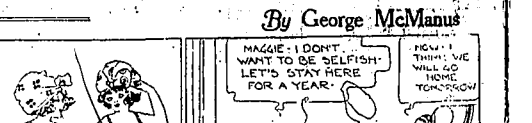
