PROHIBITION AND ITS ENFORCEMENT UPHOLD WOMEN TO PESTER CONVENTION FOR EQUAL RIGHTS

CALL CONVENTION TO ORDER 11 A.M. TOMORROW, DECIDE

No Change in Situation and Anybody May Win in Sentiment

CHICAGO, June 7.—It was definitely decided today that the republican national convention will be called to order at 11 a. m. (Central time) tomorrow. The duration of the first session probably will be not more than three hours.

CHICAGO, June 7.—With the opening of the republican national convention but 24 hours away party leaders are in a state of intense activity. The situation, as it affects the presidential possibilities is unprecedented.

"It is a very delicate situation," said Chairman Wm. H. Hays. "You must realize the situation with all the skill and astuteness you possess and the one definite thing will be that no one, nor set of men, are running this convention. This is absolutely an 'unbiased' convention."

CHICAGO, June 7.—There was no appreciable change in the relative positions of the eight avowed republicans with the exception of those who were in the position of more than 12 states in season during the forenoon.

There has been talk for several days that the Chicago state delegation proposed to keep Borah out of the platform situation but it brooded with no apparent effect.

The fact that Penrose would be increasing in popularity with the delegates is a matter of course. Penrose is a person who is an entirely different person than Penrose as the editor of a standard writer of Copper wire.

CHICAGO, June 7.—Grave fears are being expressed by the delegates as they confer concerning the possibility that Penrose will be elected as president of the convention.

That was before Borah's entrance yesterday into the pre-convention crowd that has engaged the lobbies and corridors leading to the headquarters of the various presidential aspirants at the crowded Congress and Auditorium hotels.

BORAH ON RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE, IS COUP IN FAVOR JOHNSON CHANCES

Watson Making Fight for Chairmanship but Idaho Senator Talks Straight to Him on League of Nations Plank—Platform Outline Made Showing Policy Favored

CHICAGO, June 7.—There were unmistakable signs today that however the republican leaders were split on the choice of a presidential candidate they were rapidly approaching an agreement on a platform that would be agreeable to all elements of the republican party.

A series of conferences between progressive and old guard leaders culminated in a heart-to-heart talk between Senator Borah of Idaho, and Senator Watson of Indiana about a league of nations plank which lasted until an early hour this morning.

It was then that Senator Borah, leader of the senate "irreconcilables," flatly informed Watson, spokesman for the old guard, that an unqualified reaffirmation of the doctrines of Washington and Monroe regarding entangling foreign alliances must be written into the republican platform in language that would leave no doubt as to its meaning and intent.

The conference between Borah and Watson took place in Borah's room at the Congress hotel. It created a buzz of talk among swarms of delegates and near-statenmen crowding the lobbies.

Watson was understood to have informed Borah that he and National Committee Chairman Will Hays, and other republican leaders, were desirous of drafting a league of nations plank on which any one named as the republican candidate for president could stand.

Watson is ambitious to become chairman of the committee on resolutions on which will devolve the responsibility of drafting the platform on which the republican party will go before the American people with whatever ticket is named at the convention.

Borah is said to have assured Watson of his support on the condition that the league of nations plank adopted was satisfactory to him and to Senator Hiram Watson of California and to other aggressive progressives who are bitterly opposed to President Wilson's league of nations.

It is known Watson is not unmindful of the support of Borah and Johnson. Chairman Hays sought to have Ogden Mills of New York named chairman of the committee on resolutions. He was opposed to Watson heading the committee because of Watson's close association with the old guard.

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Delegates of Idaho Placed On Committee

CHICAGO, June 7.—Following a caucus of the Idaho delegation the following committee representation was announced: Resolutions—Senator Borah, (Caucus)—John J. Gray, of Coeur d'Alene; Order of Business—John Thomas, Boise; Organization—Henry M. Jones, Lewiston.

DRY LAW IS HELD VALID BY HIGHEST U. S. COURT

WASHINGTON, June 7.—The validity of both the eighteenth amendment and the Volstead Enforcement Act was upheld today in decisions handed down by the supreme court of the United States.

There were seven cases in dock at the court involving the constitutionality of the so-called dry amendment to the federal constitution and the national prohibition act which was passed for its enforcement. Two of these cases were brought by the states of Rhode Island and New Jersey respectively, and were on the original docket of the court.

The cases on the original docket brought by the states of Rhode Island and New Jersey were the most important of the entire batch and were argued by counsel several months ago. Both cases attacked the constitutionality of the dry amendment and sought to enjoin the attorney general and other government officials from enforcing it.

Suffragists Stand Firm On Threshold Awaiting Recognition from Party

Have Resolution Demanding Equal Representation in Leadership, on Committee—Will Picket Coliseum Unless Ratification Steps Are Taken Before Hand

OHIO, June 7.—The republican national convention, as it swings open its doors, will find upon the threshold a gathering of women anxious that their impending enfranchisement shall carry representation as members of the executive committee of the national committee.

"Whereas the women of America owe to a republican congress and in the next part to republican legislators their impending general enfranchisement. Whereas it is necessary for the republican national convention by rule to provide for organization necessary to bring into activities of the republic the suffrage of new voters.

Therefore be it resolved by this convention that a committee of five be appointed by the chairman to present to the national committee and to the rules committee of the convention the urgent claims of women for representation among the officers of the national committee and equal representation of women as members of the executive committee of the national committee."

THOMPSON HITS AT LOWDEN—IS BEING BOOMED

Johnston Gains Promise of Unexpected Support From Missouri and Alabama.

CHICAGO, June 7.—William Hale Thompson, mayor of Chicago, today opened a vigorous offensive on the presidential candidacy of Gov. Frank Lowden, which may end in the presidency of Thompson's name as a presidential candidate.

Thompson is said to be controlled by the majority of delegates and the supporters of the mayor declared they are strongly in favor of placing his name before the convention as a candidate for the nomination.

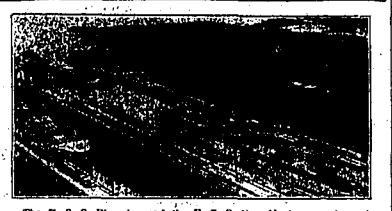

### NOTHING ON RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE IS GOING IN FAVOR JOHNSON CHAIRS (Continued from page 1)

Noting that the Idaho delegation was not going to get behind Hurnback's motion, a number of the committee then will be able personally to participate in every move that is made in framing the platform. Other state delegations will insist upon to maintain their voice in the committee, and at every stage. It is apparently the consensus of opinion among republican leaders from western, middle western and eastern states who are already on the ground that an agreement to let Hurnback's motion stand is the "irreconcilable" and "unreasonable" and the "plague" of the committee. The resolution should take toward the league of nations and the treaty of Versailles.

Senator Capper of Kansas, a progressive who voted for ratification of the treaty with the Lodge reservations, and Senator McCormick of Illinois, an "irreconcilable" who accompanied in his opposition to the league, were among the senators representing the side opposite of those who presented the treaty issue would be eliminated by the convention.

It was suggested the league stand would set forth four outstanding features on which the republican leaders were building their case: 1. A denunciation of the league of nations covenant sponsored by President Wilson.

Second—Unqualified approval of the stand taken by the republican majority of the senate in refusing to commit the American people to the league of nations without the Lodge reservations.

Third—The creation of an international court of arbitration in lieu of the league plan as formulated by President Wilson and others of the league party in Versailles.

Fourth—A ringing reaffirmation of the doctrine of Washington and Monroe which the Americans have kept out of compelling foreign alliances, such as would meet the views of all members of the republican party. It is predicted, and would enable Senator G. Underhill in his keynote address as temporary chairman of the convention to clearly announce a treaty and league house on which the republican party will be prepared to rise or fall.

With the treaty plank out of the way, the committee on resolutions is expected to have any serious difficulties in drafting the other planks which are to constitute the platform. Most of the planks have already been tentatively agreed upon. Others which were introduced today to be rapidly hearing their shape were:

One that would deal effectively with the question of the high cost of living. In this plank some republicans propose to write a terrible rebuke to the president's charge that the republican controlled congress adopted a plank on the high price of commodities confronting the consumer. They intend to advance the argument that prevailing high prices for the necessities of life are due to the failure of the executive branch to use its legislative branch of the government to function. It is also proposed that repeal of war-time legislation especially with regard to the restrictive to the construction, liberties of the American people shall be restored.

Second and other influential republicans on the scene are also insisting upon another plank dealing effectively with the industrial situation and disputes between capital and labor, and still another dealing the republican party to the condemnation and elimination of the use of "dash funds"

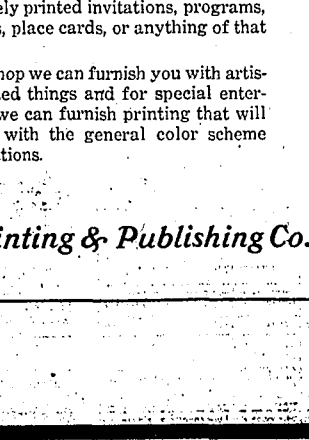
