Petitions Presented at Last Night's Council Meeting Will Be Taken Up When Additional Signers Are Secured

Petitions to pave Blue Lakes boulevard and certain streets intersecting with the boulevard, at the last meeting of the boulevard meeting of the city council which had them over until additional signers could be obtained so that there would be no doubt as to whether or not the majority was in favor of the paving. A petition for the paving of Third Avenue North was also presented. Councilman L. H. Brockway stated that the reason people were sending petitions is because they realize that the unpaved streets will be continually muddy owing to the drainage from the paved streets. This matter is expected to come up at the next session of the council.

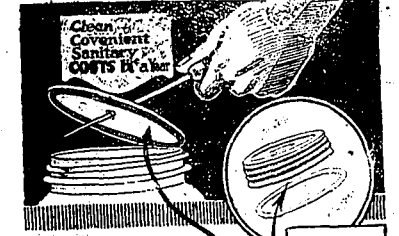

The contract awarded to the bidder, which will copy his ash into it, was brought out that the cement pit would not have to be emptied once in a year, so it was thought it would not be objectionable. The entire matter, however, was turned over to E. V. Berg.

Warberg came before the council stating that many people had lost their lots to the city rather than pay for the paving of Blue Lakes boulevard as advocated by several petitions presented last evening. Council considered the matter but it was eventually laid over until the next meeting when the petitions will be considered finally.

Attorney Shad Heekin for the Elites Millinery, which claims \$5,000 damages against the city when a water pipe broke, flooding his basement with water, appeared before the council stating that he would be glad to withdraw the suit, but that the only thing which prevented a settlement was the price. The city has offered the Elites \$2,000, which was accepted by Attorney Heekin that an arbitration board composed of one man appointed by the city, one by the Elites and one by the two jointly fix the amount but the council decided to go to court with the case.

**ONION SHOOT UP
BE CONTROLLED**

After Experiments Solution of Formaldehyde is Recommended by Specialists

YOUNG SEEDLINGS ATTACKED

After Plants Are About Three Inches High They Become Infested by Infection—Care Necessary in Applying Treatment.

Approved by the United States Department of Agriculture
The spread of an epidemic from the northwestern coast southward is increasing rapidly each year and emphasizes the importance of an efficient means of control for this disease.

Onion must be treated by a fungicide which lives in the soil and when once introduced, spreads slowly to adjoining areas. In the spring of the time when the onion roots are germinating, the most serious of seed blights, also germinates and before the young seedlings, coming from the black elongated blisters within the scales or leaves, which appear to be expressing the favored disease, the young plants are slightly thickened and after a few days they die.

Controlled by Formaldehyde
A powerful and important fact which must be noted is that the onion must be attacked by a fungicide which lives in the soil and which attacks the young seedlings when they are about three inches high. However, because of the fact that the most serious of seed blights, also germinates and before the young seedlings, coming from the black elongated blisters within the scales or leaves, which appear to be expressing the favored disease, the young plants are slightly thickened and after a few days they die.

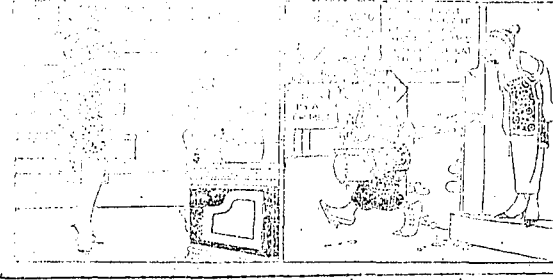
transplanted to the soil and will not contract the disease. The disease is most common in the northern part of the state and the seedlings are most susceptible to the disease when they are about three inches high.

Care Necessary in Applying

Great care should be taken in applying this treatment. The application of a solution will prevent the seedling from germinating, while the seedling solution will not kill the fungus in the soil. Detailed directions for the conduct of the application of this culture in the Pacific States should be shown that the solution will give the most gain for the cost and that there is an advantage in this case in making a stronger solution than 2.25 (one pint of formaldehyde to ten gallons of water). When there is a serious objection to the amount of formaldehyde which is not sufficient, the amount may be reduced to 1.75 (one pint of formaldehyde to 100 to 125 gallons of water) in this case a one pint of formaldehyde to 100 gallons of water.

In killing onion seed for onion sets, as they are grown in the Wisconsin, Illinois and Indiana sections by the highest quality of seed, the solution on seed sets is not necessary in the case of large bulb production. This fact does not necessarily mean that quantities of formaldehyde solution to be applied, since the same amount of soil must be used. The use of formaldehyde in either case is necessary to be cured with the use of the above formula by onion sets.
