PROPOSITIONS AND THINGS

VERY little while some "artists" takes newspaper writers to task for their grammatical or rhetorical sins. There are plenty of such faults to be found even in the best edited papers, but critics are not always happy in their choice of things to criticize. For instance, the frequent objection made to ending a sentence in a preposition. A correspondent, in a recent communication, writes that this is a "very sloppy" thing to do, and asks the editor to be more careful.

Well, the editor, referring to a college professor who is an authorized authority on the use of correct English, is informed that the complaint has been committed regularly by nearly all the writers of English literature.

Take this sentence, from Shakespeare: "My master sees the danger that you, his friend, are in." Or this from the Old Testament: "The messenger showed David all that Joah had said him for." Or from Addison: "Everything she admires or takes delight in, she thinks from Wordsworth: "A principle that ought never to be lost."

Or this from Matthew Arnold: "The universal order of life is man's happiness to go along with or his misery to suffer it."

These passages sound all right, do they not? And with very good reason, for the use of a preposition in this way is idiomatic in English language, and is in the German. To show the absurdity of any other view, try turning the examples given into the artificial "the purposive" rewordings.

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MOST OF TEACHING FORCES OF 1919 TO REMAIN NEXT YEAR

Several Teachers Resign to Accept Positions Elsewhere; Some Fall Victim to Cupid While Others Will Take Rest

An interesting fact relative to the school year opening next September is the return of sixty-four teachers, employed in the schools. Last year eighty-four teachers were employed regularly in the schools. The return of 76 percent of the teaching staff not only sets a high mark in the history of the local schools but gives an indication that the school year of 1920 will be one of the most successful that has yet been known in this section. There is a great deal of unrest and indecision in the teaching ranks of the entire country and Twin Falls is indeed fortunate that so many of its teachers have signed contracts for the next school year.

The administrative forces in the schools will see two changes that will be a keen loss to the school and to the community. Miss Helen Jorgensen, who has closed her fourth year of service as Principal of the Hickel School, will not return next year. Miss Jorgensen has had a splendid influence as a teacher and administrator in the community. She has been extremely successful and the closing days of her service revealed a well nigh perfect organization with respect to the school. She plans not to teach next year. Miss Ruth Hewitt, who has been connected with the Twin Falls schools for six years and who has closed her third year as principal of the Lincoln School, will also leave. Like Miss Murray, Miss Hewitt leaves from the rank of a teacher to a position of school administration. She is a woman of splendid organizing ability and was especially successful in guiding and advising the parents and problems arising in her particular school situation. She has accepted an appointment as principal of a grade school in Livingston, Montana.

In the High School, Mr. George E. Johnson, Head of the Department of Agriculture for the last three years, has resigned to accept a position as Supervisor with the Northern Agricultural Experiment Station in Idaho high schools. Another resignation which reveals a keen loss to the High School and to the community is that of Miss Ellen L. Gobel who has just closed five years of service in the High School. Miss Gobel is a woman of fine teaching ability and wonderfully rich teaching experience. She hopes to secure a position in the near future in Iowa. In the High School for the last three years she has ranked as one of Twin Falls' superior teachers. She plans to secure a position in Iowa.

In the Seventh and Eighth Departments—Grades—the Intermediate School—there will be a loss of three teachers, who have rendered three years of very effective service. Miss Mabel E. 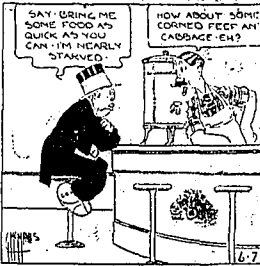

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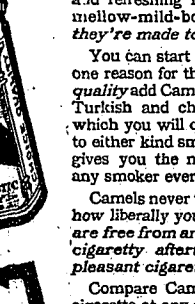
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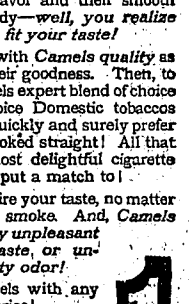
