Every power must maintain a relative standing in military strength. In view of these premises the president is authorized and requested to give, at an appropriate time, not later than the close of the war in Europe, and the great governments of the world to send representatives to a conference which shall be charged with the duty of formulating a plan for a court of arbitration or other tribunal, in which disputed questions between nations shall be referred for peaceful settlement and to consider the question of disarmament and to make their recommendations to their respective governments for approval.

The president attaches his signature to this declaration but has inclosed the request suitably and has authorized the release of his own which is at utter variance with the plan thus outlined which, in common with both political parties and the whole country he then favored.

"That the policy initiated by the congress is one to be the policy of the republican party. We believe that the purpose then and now in mind can be attained without compromising our national independence and without depriving the people of the United States of the right to determine for themselves what is just and fair when the occasion arises and without involving them as participants in a multitude of quarrels the merits of which they are unable to judge.

"We rejoice, therefore, in the effort now making among other nations to effectuate peace, sound and durable basis of international law, and of peace among peoples among individual states, and it regards this as a good object, at this moment when we require and support one of the greatest statements of any time, in his own way to participate in the great undertaking already undertaken to transcend the ill-conceived and ill-considered superlatives of Versailles whose terms are already being repudiated.

"We bid God-speed to the famous men including our own illustrious president who are about to engage in this laudable endeavor and we pledge the lasting republican sentiment of this nation to an association of nations designed to effect such agreements with other nations and to the maintenance of the right of American people to exercise their judgment and power in favor of peace and peace, and in the preservation of their own freedom and the freedom of all the world."

CHRISTIAN SCIENCE CHURCH CONCLAVE OPENS IN BOSTON

BOSTON, June 10.—As a result of the sweeping criticism of the business administration of the Christian Science Church by the committee on general welfare, an entirely new board of directors and other church officers, as well as trustees of the Christian Science Publishing Society, may follow the annual meeting of the Mother Church, which opened here today.

Members of the Mother Church are gathered here from all parts of the world—England, France, Germany, Switzerland, South Africa, Australia, New Zealand and China, many of them representing a large majority of the total membership of the church. Nearly all of the large hotels in the city are full, reservations having been made almost a year ago for the days preceding and following the meeting.

It is believed that the immense pressure which the church members will be able to exert, based on the report of the welfare committee, will be sufficient to bring about the changes suggested by the committee which was appointed to investigate the affairs of the church at its annual meeting in June, 1919.

If these changes can be secured through the demands of the church members, it is believed that it will cause an immediate suspension of all litigation now pending to the courts, which includes five separate lawsuits, prosecuted and defended by no less than twenty-nine lawyers.

The principal recommendation for such a revision is that of rotation in office of all church officials, including the directors.

The directors' term of office is now limited only by death, although there has been one instance in which a member of the board resigned. The portion of the report is embodied under the head of "Magnificent Changes" in the committee submit.

SOVIET CLAIMS SUCCESSES IN POLISH FIGHT

Also Reports Advances Against Anti-Reds in Crimea, Says Moscow Wirelets

LONDON, June 10.—Succesful against the Poles and against the anti-Bolshevik forces, under General Wranglo, in Crimea, were claimed by the soviet in a wireless from Moscow, this afternoon, according to the radio news, the result of the Russian offensive in the Crimea has been frustrated.

On the Hrubo-Polish front, said the dispatch, the Russians repulsed Polish attacks, advanced near the Dvina river, captured Halyk, repulsed assaults near Kief and broke through the Polish divisions near SMIL.

Great advances have been made by the Poles in their counter drive and a Polish war office communique telegraphed from Warsaw this afternoon. Attempts by the Russian Bolsheviks to break through the Polish front in Ukraine failed.

LONDON, June 10.—The Polish cable has resumed, according to a news agency dispatch from Warsaw today.

WASHINGTON U. SUMMER COURSE OPENS JUNE 23

SEATTLE, Wash., June 10.—Conducted by some of the most famous instructors on the Pacific coast, the University of Washington summer school will open here June 22, and preparations are being made for the largest and most interesting summer session ever conducted by this school.

This summer school appeals particularly to graduate and undergraduate students who wish to take advance work, or to school teachers and other professional people. The session will be of special interest because of the full program of sports, dramatic and other activities which has been prepared by the Associated Students' body.

The university campus is the largest west of the Mississippi river, and the ideal climatic conditions of Seattle, the excellent transportation facilities for canoeing, boating, swimming and touring in the scenic Puget Sound country will give the student a wide range of recreational opportunities which will draw a very large attendance.

The fourth course of graduate medical lectures given through the extension service of the university, with the cooperation of the Department of Community medical societies, will be held at Ingleby Hall, June 15 to July 2.

The lectures will be given by Dr. Henry Aubrey Cooke of Boston; Dr. Burton Cooke Hurst, of Philadelphia; and a number of other well-known graduate surgeons and physicians.

BRITISH THOMAS LAND

DIHMAN, June 10.—A large number of British soldiers were landed from a warship at Castle Townsend near Sligo, in the southwest corner of Ireland, today.

In regard to Mexico it seemed pretty certain the steering committee would act together on a plank which practically would endorse the report which recommended the political independence of Mexico in a return to normal conditions in the country. New Mexican interests who are insisting that the plank include a declaration that the United States will recognize the "Full investigating committee no government in Mexico which cannot give complete assurance of protection to foreigners.

After the preamble which cites the fact that conditions never were more grave, the platform declared that "the responsibility will be undertaken by an executive autonomy and restora to the people the constitutional government and the police force which will be carried out by the federal and state governments.

There are no anomalies of the plank agreed upon by the steering committee.

Agriculture—Approves right of farmers to form co-operative societies for marketing; co-ordination of water, soil and irrigation; and the amendment of the farm loan act to permit better dispensing of tenants and tenants in the event of a crop failure for the present complex laws and recitals of a tax board to simplify the tax procedure without loss of revenue.

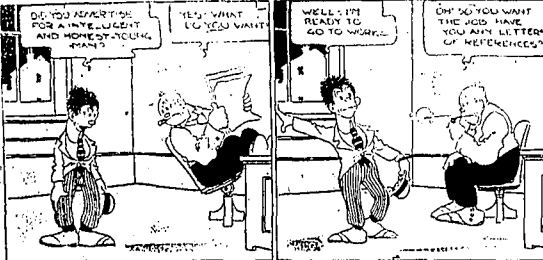

FLY ACROSS PACIFIC Giant Flying Boats Planned for the Trip.

Will Cross From California to China, 8,775 Miles, in Four Weeks.

New York.—Two giant flying boats for the first flight across the Pacific ocean are being planned, according to the Manufacturers' Aircraft association. These planes will be nearly twice the size of the NC-4, which made the first trans-Atlantic flight.

The proposed route lies from San Francisco to Hongkong, China, a distance of 7,515 nautical miles, or about 8,775 land miles. Stops will be made at Honolulu, Wake Island, Guam and Manila.

The flight has been made possible, the association says, by an invention of Edwin Gallander of East Greenwich, R. I., whereby three Liberty engines are coupled to one 19-foot propeller. The new boats will have three separate power plants, each containing three high compression Liberty engines, or nine motors to each ship.

The boats will be equipped with a wing spread of 120½ feet of the NC boats. Each boat will have a wing area of about 6,000 feet and carry a crew of 10 men. The hulls will be 67 feet long, 22 feet longer than that of the NC-4. The existing hulls is estimated at 2,100 nautical miles, nearly twice that of the NC craft.

Three high compression motors will drive each of the three propellers. Each unit of three motors will be installed in a separate nacelle, thus making possible repairs while in flight. Each propeller will be driven by two motors with one in reserve.

Enough gasoline can be carried to permit a cruising radius of 2,500 land miles without stopping.

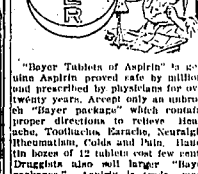

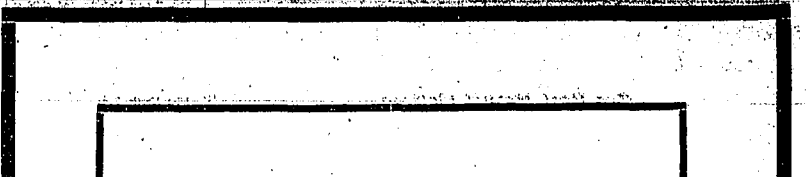
