





## SUGAR HOUSES HOLD GREAT SUPPLY

\$75,000,000 of Commodity Is Found Stored in Chicago by Investigator

CHICAGO, June 12.—The sugar trail—a pathway through the Chicago warehouses paved with approximately \$75,000,000 worth of cane sugar—in and out of every deep storage warehouse in Chicago, into the switching yards behind the warehouses, into the freight terminals, out into the railroads down the tracks to railroad stations, packed in heavy-laden vehicles and into factories.

Every vehicle, whether it be hand-truck, motor truck, horse-drawn wagon, or teamster's sled, is loaded, steaming, is packed with sugar. Incoming freight cars by the hundred repose on the railroad tracks for from fifteen days to a month, with millions of pounds on board.

On coming around a blind at random in the warehouse district without having the missile land on a million pounds of sugar.

With the million and millions of pounds of sugar imported to major brokers, shippers, flour companies, soft drink manufacturers, breweries, canneries and packers one is amazed at the small amount of sugar required in being consumed by the regular population of the world. It is a point to get their sugar into the hands of the retail grocers and thence to the public.

Out of our lot of fifty freight cars found deposited in various parts of the city, there were none that even came close to what was considered to wholesale grocers.

On the other hand, in the same let sugar brokers, manufacturers and others who have or take no option to buy sugar, paid in the retail trade of their so-called "sugar objects" were receiving the lion's share of the shipments.

In the West Side Warehouse at Grand Avenue and the Illinois Avenue, there are millions of pounds of sugar owned by various brokers and also by packers.

Moller Fox Brokerage Company, sugar brokers, have placed in their storage tanks alone within the last fifteen days about a sack of sugar or 2,000,000 pounds.

On the same day the last of this shipment came in on a freight of Duluth, from the freighter Arthur G. Morgan. The ship's master refused to disclose the name of the broker that was receiving the same. At the same time there were nearly 5,000 bars of sugar in the warehouse.

The same day a number of sugar wagons were seen at the Clinton, Hinton & Gilley docks by the Puget Sound Brewing Company.

In the warehouses of Griswold & Walker a large barrel in the two-story building, which the Government charges were hoarded and a \$200,000 profit received thereby, were found stored behind high.

Ninety-five per cent of sugar were stored in barrels at the Terminal Warehouse, where the Wall Commission Company has its warehouse.

On the Griswold & Morton docks a large consignment of sugar supplied by W. H. Hawley & Co., sugar brokers, was on. Other similar brokers were on. One broker, however, was found on the stocks here and an indication of the length of time the sugar found there has been in storage was given by a statement of ten bags of sugar, each weighing 100 pounds, which had been received because there was a shortage of 135 pounds in the allotment—the bags were black from age and the sugar was hard like rock.

The amount of sugar in the sugar situation I was aided considerably by the President of the Truck Drivers and Chauffeurs' Union. His drivers, having handled most of the sugar in the state, have informed me that the drivers have been stored.

"Replenish of large amounts of sugar by way lots to candy makers, bakers, and other than grocers is another trick of keeping the sugar from the public," said the spokesman of the union, adding, showing this glimmered when I found a large amount of sugar owned by a brokerage firm on the docks of a steamship company. It showed the amount of sugar taken in by the sugar situation I was aided considerably by the President of the Truck Drivers and Chauffeurs' Union. His drivers, having handled most of the sugar in the state, have informed me that the drivers have been stored.

"Little trouble in getting sugar, as experienced by the leaders of the sugar situation I was able to take the place of beer and wine. I found millions of pounds of sugar on its way to these concerns. The breweries are packed with sugar. Consumption of sugar houses, however, is far below the average size to set sugar at an amazingly low price if other goods are also bought at a high price were found to be overpriced.

### Sen. Poindexter's Nomination Speech

As Delivered at the Republican Convention by G. H. Walker of Washington State

Now, after seven years of waste,浪费, and inefficient democratic domination, we desire to help in aiding the country in the end that those deplorable national conditions may cease and the goodness of the country be restored to normal."

"In common with her sister states, Pennsylvania seeks the welfare of the seven years' old, albeit that her

## DRUMMER BOY HERO FINDS A FRIEND

Connie Lavender, 15 Years Old, Is Pathetic Victim of Great War; Looks Like Old Man

CINCINNATI, Ohio, June 12.—A physical wreck, little more than a child, Connie Lavender, World War hero, was arraigned in a County holding before Justice L. H. Jones, a man of forty.

Connie's teeth are those of a man, his skin nearly meaty. When laid thin, his head has the thickness of an old man's. His face is pale, his hands all shrivelled, his eyes dimpled, add to the severe shock received by his entire nervous system through the war injury he saw and felt.

Born in Belpointe, Ohio, Connie is an only child. He was at an early age drummer boy five years ago in St. Catharines, Ontario, and went overseas with the Princess Pat regiment.

A year later he was a medal as a sniper in France.

He never had the top times in his number and was hospitalized twice, wounded with shrapnel and then lay unconscious four months in a hospital at The Hague, a shell-shock victim.

Discharged because of disability in November, 1917, Connie accepted the advice of doctors that bilking was the best thing for him.

Stopping at a home near here, he was met by his mother.

But Connie had a bad Boyd's disease, heard of Connell's preachment. She had taken him in for a time when he appeared for medical aid a year ago.

Connell, an ex-minister, after hearing of his son's condition, was writing by telephone to the Army Board of Review.

"He was a good boy," wrote Connell.

"He was fearless. He had remarkable vision at night, the right or left eye, and could see in the dark in military parties. In his offensive and defensive engagements, I saw him in action, tire and time again, quick, and with the judgment and fearlessness of a man," wrote one Canadian officer.

"He was a good boy," Mrs. Connell added. Connie is writhing at my house. I had three sons in the war. Two came back and one didn't, and the woman's euphony put a stop to those words."

Judge Leaders permitted Mrs. Connell to speak to the Judge and Mr. Walter A. Olson of the Federal Public Health Service, appealed to the United States Government and to the Red Cross to aid the unfortunate war hero.

## EVIDENCE OF BEATING HIGH COST

**W**HILE we may not look alone to the "thrifty immigrant" for evidence that the high cost of living can be beaten, native Americans also breaking their records in bank savings and Liberty bonds, nevertheless the amount of money that immigrants have sent out of the country or to invest here must cause thought. Of course, a large sum of money mentioned in connection with the immigrants is not to be credited to permanent savings; much of it represents regular supplies sent by workers from home to keep their dependents abroad. Perhaps at the end of the year some who may be thought to be getting ahead may be shown only to have made both ends meet.

However, when we read in an article in the New York "Journal of Commerce" that foreigners returning home from the United States are taking with them approximately two billions of dollars, the conclusion that a vast part of this represents permanent savings cannot be escaped. It is set forth that 250,000 emigrants have departed since the signing of the armistice and the United States department of labor estimates that 1,125,000 more are preparing to go. With average savings placed at \$2000, the grand total is well over two billions.

But never overlook the great number of native Americans who have "getting ahead" at the same time.

Besides, it remains that we would not want to see Americans saving as some of the immigrants, by living more as b's than as human beings while having plenty of money to live decently.

Then there is the grave question of Americanization to be considered in this connection. An end should be put to the hand of immigration that looks upon this country merely as one for money-making purposes. Attention should be given to keeping in America a lot of this money that has been going to Europe.

Still it remains that these statistics have a value as reminding that there are many workmen who are beating the high cost of living game right along.

## WHY TEACHERS STOP TEACHING

**A** GOVERNMENT report shows that in Hastings, Colo., a 16-year-old boy employed in greasing car tires is paid as much as the school-principal; that the principal of a high school in the northern states receives an annual salary of \$300; that the average yearly salary for rural teachers in one of the southern states this year is \$354.

These cases are probably exceptional, but the normal situation is bad enough. Forty per cent of the rural teachers of the United States are receiving less than \$600 a year, and nearly 30 per cent less than \$500.

New York, which is said to pay its teachers as liberally as any city in America, spends \$36,000,000 a year on the teachers and \$250,000,000 on automobiles. ## Nicholas Butler's Nomination Speech

As Delivered at the Republican Convention by Ogden Mills of N. Y. Delegation

Following is the speech of Ogden Mills, nominating Nicholas Murray Butler as the most republican presidential nomination:

"The outstanding facts stamp this convention as almost unique in character and momentum in its consequences. That any man has been selected

"Never since the election of Lincoln have responsibilities of such vital importance to our national life demanded, wise leaders and a wise solution.

"We have just now had the opportunity to nominate a candidate but before no argument we shall have to really choose a president. This is an solemn responsibility as ever confronted a gathering of mighty men. But, think the foundations of civilization, the political structure of a great continent, shattered the highly developed and extremely social and political internationalism, and internationalism is fundamental and contains that the world today may be said to be groping in its search for light.

"Face to face with these problems what manner of man must this new president be? First and foremost, an American by birth or education.

"It must be a tried executive but one who has much more than administrative experience.

"No man should be president today who has not a clear cut conception of our international relations and of our traditional foreign policy. Our country is not in a position of isolation but it is in the future.

"Finally he cannot be sectional, but must be national.

"A man of vision but not a visionary; a man of action, but not a mere opportunist; a man who does not make dreams his aim; a man whose ambition is steady and sound; and who has realized the ambition of his people; a leader first and last in his party.

"Nicholas Murray Butler is a truly representative American, worthy of the high esteem in which he is held by his countrymen and of the high regard to which he aspires. With full realization of his responsibilities, the state of New York presents for your earnest consideration the name of Nicholas Murray Butler as the candidate of the republican party for the presidency of the United States."

HAVE you a canning method?

Women who are finding it easy to fill their pantries and relax with wonder and awe at the success of all kinds say they are more successful and the job is much easier and pleasant, after they adopt some system or method, tried and proven, rather than work by guesswork, and then turn to another to do this and that.

Food experimental departments have been working for years trying to prove an off round satisfactory home-canning method—one simple to understand, easy to follow, also one that requires no special or expensive equipment to make it successful.

So far there are three of these methods being used.

The hot-pack method uses raw vegetables, fruits, etc., in the不解冻 (uncooked) state, either in their natural form or in a syrup, then sealing these foods in sterilized jars. This method is very successful for acid fruits and vegetables, but will not do for non-acid fruits, such as peaches, pears, tomatoes and the like to perfection.

It is also hard to retain the shape and texture of the products caused by this method.

The three-day intermitting method was next introduced. It is done by packing the uncooked product in sterilized jars, filling the jars with water, adding salt, and then sealing the jars, where, placing the jars in a room on a rack, filling the vessel with water up to the neck of the jar and letting the water boil around the jar for one hour. The jars are then packed away.

The third day, after cooling, the water is added again to the boiling water for one hour again, it is then set aside for twenty-four hours, and the cooking repeated the third day.

This method is absolutely correct.

The first day's boiling destroys the bacteria—the second, the spores, and the third is not always necessary but it is prevention against chance growth.

The third day's boiling is necessary for sealing foods, so that flavor is destroyed, even though they keep perfectly. It is long tedious work, and unless the jars and lids are of the best material, the problem of cooking the food is still a problem.

## AMERICA'S FOREMOST JEWS LEAVE FOR LONDON MEETING

**NEW YORK.** June 12.—Nationally known American Jews sailed today on the Lapland for London to attend the International Zionist Conference, which convened July 4, considered one of the most important gathering of Jews in Jewish history. In the party were Jacob Louis D. Brandeis, of the United States Supreme Court; honorary president of the Zionist Organization of America; Arthur H. Fox, of the American United States District Court, president of the organization; Nathan Straus, Mrs. Mary Fols Jacobs, Dr. Louis Lipsky, organization secretary; Professor Felix Frankfurter, of Harvard University; Abraham Taffel and David Rosenblum. They are the advance guard of an American delegation of thirty-nine to the conference. The balance of the delegation will sail next Saturday from New York.

The first world Zionist conference held in six years since the outbreak of the war, the forthcoming convention is considered of such importance that it has been decided to deal with the question of the establishment of the Jewish National Home, England, authorized by the Peace Conference when it granted a mandate over Palestine to Great Britain. The conference will also consider the achievement of the political aims of Zionism, for which the movement was organized in 1897. Delegates will attend from every country in Europe, Poland, Australia, Canada, South Africa, Argentina, Uruguay, Chile, Mexico, Venezuela, etc.

Millions of Jews throughout the program-hunting countries of Eastern Europe, waiting for the opportunity to leave for Palestine, will attend the conference, and the conference will be interested, for the number and scope of emigration will be one of the topics discussed at the conference.

The American delegation has a plan for the restoration of the Jewish Homeland in Palestine, which will be before the conference. It is pledged to free immigration for Palestine, but recognizes that it will be necessary to

reconcile the landowner at large in order to bring into Palestine a large labor army to begin the immediate construction and engineering programs necessary to prepare the country for the great Jewish who is expected, and without whom there can be no home there. The American Zionists hope also that the development of Palestine will be carried on under the leadership of the British government and its agents, particularly the famous Pittsburgh programme, adopted by the 1917 Zionist Convention and ratified again at this year's extraordinary convention. This programme provides for the creation of a Jewish state, a guaranteed acre, and religion; establishment of the ownership and control of the land, all natural resources and public utility in the people's hands; and for retaining rates, use of the compulsory arbitration and prevention of the evils of land speculation and other forms of financial oppression.

It will also work for the establishment of a National Board of Health and Welfare, with the American Zionist Convention, to be established as soon as its foundation, in order to operate upon a nation-wide scale, the fight against disease. The establishment of experimental stations and technical laboratories for the study of agriculture of the country, resources will also be proposed by the American delegation.

To carry out all these projects, necessary for the development of Palestine, delegates from London, Paris, Berlin, and Amsterdam, will propose launching a fund of \$25,000,000 to finance them and other vast operations to be developed at the conference.
