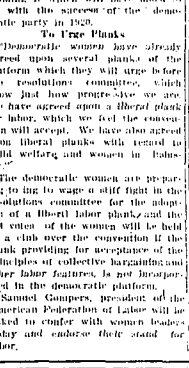
PEACE TREATY AND LEAGUE OF NATIONS MADE DOMINANT ISSUE IN KEYNOTE TALK

SAN FRANCISCO, June 28.—Making the peace treaty and the League of Nations the dominant issue of the opening presidential campaign, Homer S. Cummings, chairman of the Democratic national convention, today delivered the keynote speech. Cummings devoted half of his time to a discussion of the treaty and its reception by the party. Cummings praised the democratic achievements of the past eight years and uttered ringing denunciations of the republican party. Speaking of the League of Nations plank in the republican platform, Cummings said: "It prides itself on discrimination all the republican senators who participated in its defeat. Its words of condemnation fall alike upon the League, the mild reservationists and those who proposed a separate peace with Germany." It is enough to know that the "Old Guard" sold the honor of America for the privilege of nominating a reactionary "for president" after an unbroken session of the peace treaty, Cummings said.

IDAHO CENTRAL FILES ARTICLES Company Plans to Construct Connecting Link Between Rogerson and Wells

The Idaho Central Railroad company has filed articles of incorporation with the secretary of state at Boise.

This is the railroad that purposed the construction of a line from Rogerson to Wells, near a distance of about 100 miles, thus shortening the distance from Idaho points to the coast some 200 miles, and furnishing a direct outlet from the Twin Falls country to San Francisco.

Two Falls will be the principal place of business of the new line, according to the articles of incorporation. The five directors of the corporation are: George L. Davis and Joseph L. Stewart of San Francisco, each appointed for three years; Arthur Dunn of San Francisco's appointment for two years; and J. H. Stewart of San Francisco who will hold his position for one year.

The stock has been shown of common, \$100,000, and preferred stock of \$1,000,000. The amount actually subscribed at present is one hundred thousand four hundred dollars. Mr. Stewart has taken out of his pocket \$100,000 of the stock, and each of the other directors hold one share.

Dr. H. H. Linn railroad surveys were complete at one time for the Rogerson to Wells, Wyo., railroad but further work was abandoned when the survey was completed at Wells, Wyo., and Southern Pacific railroads was dissolved by the government through judicial action.
