GATEWAY FROM INLAND STATES TO THE SEA MAY BE DREAM COME TRUE

Great Lakes-St. Lawrence Tidewater Congress Will Assemble at Detroit on July 22-24 When All Authorities and Supporters of the Movement Will Consider Plan

Ever since the day, now some five generations ago, when the country realized that its advancement was being retarded by the fact that millions of men have dreamed of a gateway from the inland states to the sea. The question is as old almost as the earth for the historical "northwest passage."

Today, after years of discussion and study, it has become a matter of issue to determine whether the waterways which flow themselves by the Atlantic shall become connected for navigation purposes and form an outlet for the products and materials produced by the states west of the Allegheny mountains.

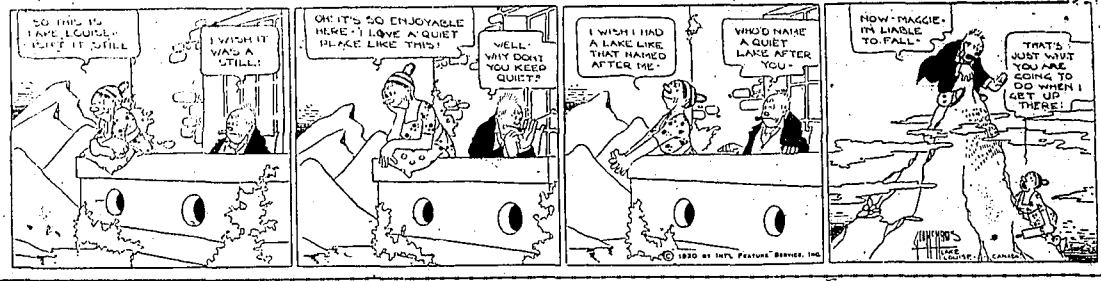
Metal Plane Is Wounded in New York

SECURITY AIM OF DEMOCRATS

Administration Forces Planning to Gain Support from Every Avenue

Administration leaders admit they entertain the hope that the refusal of the Republicans at Chicago to nominate Senator Brian Johnson of California and to adopt a "progressive" platform will swing Republicans over to the democratic side. Labor, economic and other domestic questions the democratic platform makes by Senator Carter (Iowa) of Virginia confidential advisor of President Wilson hopes to mould planks which will not only suit the democratic "old guard" but appeal to both "progressive" and "liberal" irrespective of party lines. SAN FRANCISCO, June 20.—Opposition to the league of nations cropped up before the resolutions committee during its public hearings. When U. S. Olson, state senator of Utah, and a delegate from that state, appeared before the committee with proposals for a progressive program, "we are not so much concerned as to whether democrats or republicans participate in making a peace treaty and a league of nations," Olson said. "As we are certain that such treaty shall give provision of a better world instead of one which will promote hate, and we believe this cannot be avoided by a league of nations consuming governments which are committed either to imperialistic ambitions or to the idea of the economic subjugation of people to industrial slavery which amounts to the same thing."
