For demonstrations. The Cox supporters brought in their usual repertoire in vigorous red uniforms and decorated 800 as much gold as a football team. Hundreds of women supporters of the Ohio governor were in attendance at the spectacle.

Georgia is named: This ended the Owen part of the program and the secretary resumed calling the roll of states. "Arkansas yields to South Dakota," "South Dakota then sent H. S. C. Berry to the platform to nominate former Ambassador to Germany Jas. W. Gardner of New York.

California and Colorado passed, putting it up to Connecticut. John P. Brady of Hartford, Conn., is placed in nomination. Homer S. Cummings, the national chairman.

PROFITTEERING CHARGE CAN'T HARM FARMERS

Study of Data Shows That No Such Allegations Can Be Made Hereabouts

HOLDS, June 29.—(Special Correspondent.)—The fact that farmers are not profiteers is established in a study of data collected last winter from 200 irrigated farms in Twin Falls county, showing that the farmer had received just about on the investment, the average of labor earnings on those farms for the year was 85¢. On the 26 farms that specialized in wheat, the farmers, backed into a market of receiving a reasonable wage for their labor.

The investigation was conducted by C. C. Taylor, farm management demonstrator of the University of Idaho Extension division, and assisted by Byron Minter, farm management investigator of the university, in cooperation with the federal office of farm management.

Profitable farms were the most profitable. Mr. Taylor's analysis showed that the most profitable on the largest farms, and unprofitable on the small ones. The cost of producing wheat averaged 75 cents per bushel, while the market price was 85 cents.

The figures, which are admittedly accurate, as applied to irrigated farms near Twin Falls in 1919, show that the farms which were in the state the most profitable farms in the area. There were three groups smaller in size which made smaller profits and one group which made 50 cents which made smaller profits on the average.

Farm profits are measured by their earnings, being the amount remaining for the farmer's labor after deducting all expenses and 7% interest on his investment. The net profit is the amount left over for the farmer's family.
