### LONDONDERRY

ONE reason why Ireland is not self-governing is furnished by the Londonderry riots. In this ancient town, which cherishes above most other things the prejudices of a past that ought to be forgotten, the two political and religious factions are strong enough to engage in a pitched battle, the military forces of the British Empire being powerless to restrain their sanguinary impulses.

It is these blood feuds that account in no small degree for the misgovernment of the island. Tyranny can ask no more inviting field than a nation racked by intolerance and sure to resort in a crisis to domestic violence or treachery. What the British have done to Ireland is a tragic record of oppression. What the Irish themselves have done to Ireland, a consideration too often lost sight of, would make a list of wrongs quite as formidable, with only folly and bigotry for excuse.

The crux of the Irish question is the Irish. They have an alien government because they will not unite to govern in their own right. Separation from Great Britain is a delusion, of course, but home rule in adequate form obviously waits upon nothing but a demonstration of the capacity of the people to adjust their differences in good faith and to give the empire some assurance that self-government will not immediately degenerate into just such rapacity as we now witness in Londonderry.

Ireland is dragged because it straggles, and it drags on not for unity and freedom but for hatred, revenge and tyranny. A century and more ago Henry Grattan told his countrymen that if they could not tolerate each other they would be forced to tolerate the British. That is a lesson that never has been learned.

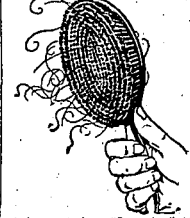
Mrs. Wilson, the child's mother, believes Knight took Florence away from Tacoma last Saturday, noon, she believes, in San Francisco.

## THOUSANDS TO GO BACK HOME

Foreign Born Residents of United States Await to Return to Land of Birth

NEW YORK, July 9. (UP)—More than two and one half million foreign born residents of the United States are waiting to go back to the land of their birth. P. A. Baker, superintendent of the department of immigration, said. Lack of acceptable passenger facilities, unsettled conditions in Europe and currency devaluations are some of the reasons for their being unable to return to their homes, he said. Of those who had gone to Europe with the intention of settling there, he said, a large majority return to the country within a few months. They have discovered the H. C. or I. H. has made the trip to Europe lively.

Since 1918, departures have exceeded arrivals and immigration has been not and cannot compare with that of pre-war days, he said. The reasons, he said, include more stringent passport laws, both here and abroad, and the present European unrest. What nationalities will comprise the new tide of immigration cannot be predicted, he said. Whichever country that stabilizes itself and its resources sufficiently to permit its citizens returning to America will probably form the nucleus of the next wave, Baker said.

## Friend of Carranza Condemns New Regime

(By A. L. Hunsford.) Called Press Staff Correspondent. WASHINGTON, July 9.—Senado Huerta, Mexican ambassador to the United States under the Carranza regime, was in Washington, attempting to persuade the state department to return recognition to the new government of Mexico. Huerta visited followed the receipt by Acting Secretary of State Davis of Fernando Hernandez Calderon, high commissioner of the new Mexican government. Huerta has charged the state department officials that General Alvaro Obregon, leader of the revolt against Carranza, was the instigator of the Carranza regime. Huerta charges that Rodolfo Herrero accused of the murder was merely a tool. Huerta has visited the state department twice. First he described the flight and murder of Carranza to officials and yesterday he presented a letter from Julia Carranza, charging Obregon with the responsibility for the murder of her father.

## TO RESUME DEPORTATIONS

WASHINGTON, July 9.—The state department's removal of Russian trade restrictions will allow resumption of deportations. Undesirable aliens who are natives of that country, labor department officials said. Numerous aliens were held for deportation to Russia. Point an ally, ussia. Deportees taken to Russia on the Buford were sent through Flamingo but that is now impossible because Finland and Russia are not on friendly terms.

## NEW WOMAN IS FOUND IN CASE

Post Mortem Investigation in Ellwood's Life Leads to Another Discovery

NEW YORK, July 9. (UP)—A "new woman" was introduced into the life of Joseph Downs Ellwood, white authority. Mrs. Marie Larsen, housekeeper for the ship panhandler, on her tenth examination by District Attorney Edward Swanwick told of the new friend of her former employer. This girl, she said, was in Ellwood's room the Sunday morning before he was slain. The district attorney's examination of Mrs. Larsen dealt mainly with her knowledge of William Pendleton, friend of Ellwood, whose statements have been disputed by other witnesses. Swanwick declared that he was certain that Pendleton's apt was in New York city the night of the murder, although this has been denied by the owner. Pendleton said the other witnesses told the truth with regard to the circumstances, but declared they were mistaken in the date. Mrs. Pendleton claimed her husband's story that he was at home the night of the murder and that his auto was in the garage was entirely true.

## Art Institute Gets Big Fortune in Will

SAN DIEGO, July 9. (UP)—The art institution of Chicago, was left \$50,000 in the will of the late Howard Baker, Minneapolis and Coronado millionaire. It was announced here. Charitable organizations in Minneapolis were left between \$15,000 and \$40,000. Over \$25,000 of the estate of \$1,200,000 went to charities the remaining to relatives.

## Captured Americans Sent Back by Turks

WASHINGTON, July 9.—Paul Nikcic and his wife, American connected with the mission school at Tarasus, Cilicia, Asia Minor who have been reported captured by Turkish nationalists, have been safely returned to Tarasus, according to reports to Rear Admiral Herbert American high commissioner at Constantinople, the state department announced.

The Woman's International Union Label League, Local No. 331, held a very interesting business and social session Wednesday afternoon at the Union hall.

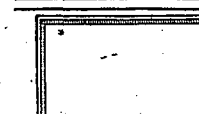
