Fine Courses Given At State University

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, July 14.—With its 75% increase in enrollment during the last five years the University of Idaho's Department of Economics and Political Science has extended and improved its courses until it now offers as complete and diversified a course-work as can be found in any University in the country. In addition to general courses in economics, history, government and business, the economics department has also well-organized courses in the special branches of accounting, insurance, banking, law, and commercial training.

No clause in the University of Idaho's budget, except that of the Department of Economics and Political Science, has been increased, and the course-work in the department of economics, installed only two years ago, has now become well-organized reaching way into the higher fields.

The course in Accountancy is also proving very popular. All kinds of accountancy subjects, such as the background of business, law statistics, business finance, and other similar subjects.

The Commercial teachers' course is designed especially to train students for teaching commercial work in high schools. In addition to the regular course in accountancy, including stenography, emphasis is laid on work in business law, public utilities, methods in commerce, and ethics of modern problems.
